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### HOLLINGBOURN RURAL DISTRICT.

Report of the Medical Officer of Health for the Year ended December 31st.1940.

To the Chairman and Members of the Hollingbourn Rural District Council. Gentlemen,

I present to you the Report on the Health and Sanitary Condition of the Hollingbourn Rural District, for the year 1940.

The urgent necessity in these war periods is for economy in labour and paper and for these reasons, the instruction of the Ministry of Health is that these reports are to be reduced in size as far as possible and only those items which are fresh developments in the public health should be reported in detail and that matters dealt with in previous reports should be omitted. The tables and statistics which give essential information of the work of the department are retained and only those which are of major interest are set out in this report, while the customary figures which were given in reports for other years have been compiled and are filed for future reference.

This report is very late in appearance, but the Council is well aware of the vast amount of additional work which has been laid on the Officers, a burden to which every circular and instruction of the central government departments makes addition.

The compilation of these reports has become one of those labours which in our school days we all heartily loathed - a holiday task, - and the completion of this one has been my Christmas occupation.

water. No further extensions of the public water supplies have been possible under war conditions. There is still need of extension of the public supply to many parts of the District.

Drainage and Sewerage. There were no extensions of the sewers during the year. There is still the problem of the large number of cess-pits throughout the area, but I fear that no progress can be hoped for at present, in dealing with this question.

Rivers and Streams. No action to prevent pollution was taken during the year.

### THE SANITARY INSPECTOR

for the year ending 31st December, 1940.

HOUSING. The programme of house-building has remained in suspense owing to the War, and reconditioning of cottages by private owners has almost come to a standstill for the same reason. Slight overcrowding has in some cases been brought about by refugees from bombed areas. War Damage in the Hollingbourn Aural District has amounted to 105 dwellings and 24 other buildings damaged; of the dwellings thus damaged, only I was totally destroyed and only 3 were incapable of repair.

CO. SHEDS AND DAIRIES. In the course of the year, 16 premises have been registered as dairies. Thirty persons have been registered as dairymen, including 15 who have premises in other districts but retail milk in the Hollingbourn kural District. The total number of registered milk-traders at the end of the year, after eliminating those who have gone out of business, is 153; of these, 17 are licensed by the County Council to produce Accredited Milk, and 5 to produce Tuberculin-Tested Milk. Sixty-one samples of graded milk were taken during the year, and two samples of mixed milk were taken for examination for the tubercle bacillus.

The standard of cleanliness in the production of milk, despite shortage of labour and increased work on the farms due to ploughing-up of arable farmland, continues to be generally satisfactory.

MEAT INSPECTION. Under emergency food control regulations, shaughtering has not been carried out in this District, with the exception of slaughter of pigs at the bacon factory at Lenham. Carcases inspected and condemned are shown in the following table. -

It will be noted that of the number of pigs slaughtered the number inspected is only 0.35 per cent, and of these 95 per cent were diseased,

either wholly or in some part or organ. With the limited staff available, it is impossible to inspect every pig slaughtered, and an arrangement has been come to with the management of the Bacon Factory whereby the Sanitary Department is notified whenever any unusual condition is observed. In view of the trust thus imposed upon the slaughtermen this cannot be regarded as wholly satisfactory.

In addition to the meat shown in the table above, the following imported bacon was condemned as unfit for human consumption:-

1 smoked ham; 7 tinned hams; 5 gammons; 11 fore-ends; 1 piece of back; 13 bales of Danish Bacon.

The total weight of meat (including bacon) condemned and destroyed during 1940 was 2 tons. 16 cwt. 2 qtr.  $15\frac{1}{2}$  lb.

HOP-PICKERS' ENCAPPENTS. One hundred and forty-one visits were paid to these encampments in 1940, 22 out of the 26 camps being occupied during the season. In the middle of hop-picking a large influx of refugees from London joined those already there, and when the picking was over they remained in the hop-fields, having no homes to return to. As this occupation continued into the autumn, many problems arose, such as firing and scavenging; but farmers were persuaded to let the refugees remain, and by constant vigilance the Sanitary Department staff were able to prevent conditions arising which were prejudicial to health, although it early became apparent that the encampments were in most cases unsuitable for continued occupation in bad weather. Eventually the refugees were evacuated to other districts about the middle of October.

SE ERAGE AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL. There were no extensions of sewers during the year.

NEW BUILDINGS. Thirteen plans of buildings, alterations, and additions, were submitted during the year. Of these, 9 were approved, 2 approved conditionally as referring to buildings of a temporary nature, and 2 disapproved - one of the latter being disapproved under the Council's Building Byelaws, the other under the Town and Country Planning Scheme.

ATER SUPPLY. Fifty-two samples of water were taken by the Sanitary Department during the year, and the following table shows the results obtained.

At the two hopper camps where the water was shown to be contaminated, the filter-beds were subsequently cleaned out and sheep prevented from having access to the streams.

- (i) The one regular camping site in the District, which is normally used throughout the season and caters for summer campers and members of the camping clubs, has not been used owing to suspension of these activities during the war.
- (ii) Six licences for the use of movable dwellings have been issued by the Local Authority, under Section 269 of the Public health ct, 1936.
  - C.3. (vi) SMOKE ABATAMENT. No action has been necessary during 1940.
- C.3.(vii) SWILMING BATHS AND POOLS. There are no public swimming baths, or privately owned swimming baths or pools which are open to the public, in the district. At Sutton Valence School, there is now an openair swimming bath, for which plant for the filtration and purification of the water has been installed, and the results obtained are satisfactory.
  - C.3. (viii) ERADICATION OF BED-BUGS.
- (1)(a) No Council houses were found to be infested with bugs during the year.
  - (b) One other house was found to be infested and was disinfested.
- (2) The method employed for freeing the houses from vermin is by spraying with an insecticide, the one employed being a proprietary preparation, called "Zaldecide".

#### SECTION E.

Inspection and Supervision of food.

Milk Supply. 309 inspections of cowsheds and dairies have been made, Samples of milk for examination under the Special Designations Orders are taken by your Officers for the County Council and examined at the County Laboratory.

Meat and Other Foods. Inspections have been made as fares possible but the small staff available for this work means that it is only possible to inspect a small proportion of the animals killed for human consumption. Details of the amount of meat found to be unfit on account of (a) tuberculosis and (b) other diseases are to be found in the report of the Sanitary Inspector.

Chemical and Bacteriological Examination of Food. This is carried out at the Laboratories of the Kent County Council.

### SECTION F.

Prevalence of the Control Over Infectious Disease.

The arrangements for the hospital treatment of cases of infectious disease have remained as described in previous reports, but as I have mentioned before, I cannot regard the situation as satisfactory. The shortage of nurses which has become more acute since the war has made the conduct of the small infectious diseases hospitals very difficult and should it become necessary to open the Council's hospital at harps wood for the reception of small-pox cases, I foresee great difficulty in obtaining the necessary staff.

The gratifying feature of this table is the absence of diphtheria, and I am certain that this can be attributed to the success of our efforts to further immunisation against the disease, which will be pressed to the fullest possible extent.
