-1 SEP1945 SAMMUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH FOR THE YEAR 1944.

Mr. Chairman and Councillors,

In presenting my annual report for the year. 1944 I have complied with the instructions laid down by the Ministry of Health in Circular 49/45 dated 19th March, 1945.

There have been no changes in the general provisions of health services for the area. The legislation in force in the area has remained the same.

There have been no marked changes or developments in the sanitary circumstances of the area during the year. For details see Sanitary Inspectors' Reports. The water supply was satisfactory in quantity and quality during the year. Twenty-eight examinations were made for plumbo solvency; twenty-seven of these were satisfactory and one unsatisfactory.

DIPHTHERIA IMMUNISATION.

During 1944, 243 children were immunised against diphtheria, of these 220 were children under five years of age, and 23 were children aged between five and fifteen years. I estimate that between 85 and 90 per cent of children in the Holmfirth district have now been immunised against diphtheria. This prophylactic treatment is offered by the Government free of charge to all children. In order to take advantage of it, all the parents have to do is to take their child to their own doctor or to the Medical Officer of Health.

FLOOD.

for exception, and a copy In the evening of may 29th a severe flood occurred in the district. This raised a number of immediate problems for the sanitary authority which had to be dealt with, such as the evacuation, housing, feeding and clothing of about 100 persons whose houses had been flooded and their possessions destroyed. The clearing of water and debris from houses, shops, roads, and both public and private places had to be watched, and the inspection and replacement of damaged foodstuffs carried out. As some of the main sewers had been washed away and many of the connections into them destroyed, some anxiety was felt lest there should be an outbreak of enteric disease, particularly as many people were outbreak of enteric disease, particularly as many people were working in and out of the river. We were fortunate in possessing such war time local organisations as the Civil Defence Services, Women's Voluntary Services, National Fire Service, British Restaurant and mobile canteens, and my thanks as M.O.H. are due to all those members of these services who voluntarily turned out to help, and to the many private citizens who also assisted to clear up their town and to help their fellow townsmen. Many visits, much advice and some help was received from the various representatives of different Ministries, and the West Riding County Council. Valuable help was given by the Regional Rescue Parties, and mobile canteens from Huddersfield and Wakefield, with the result that the immediate results of the flood were quite soon repaired. I am pleased to be able to report that no epidemic disease occurred as a result of the flooding. There were only a few cases of colds, laryngitis, lumbago and some minor injuries which became septic as a direct result of it. The work of restoring the sewers had been completed by the end of the week. The problem of the damaged houses and the rehousing of the families who lived in them still remains. Some houses that could

easily be rendered habitable were soon dealt with, and the tenants are living in them, but 10 houses at Scar Fold and 4 at Victoria which were of a very poor type before the flood damage are still unfit for human habitation. Closing Orders have been made on the 10 houses at Scar Fold. This has tended to make the housing shortage more acute and rendered the billeting of evacuees more difficult.

EVACUATION. During July, the Government reintroduced their Evacuation Scheme and two batches of evacuees containing 81 and 96 respectively arrived in the district at short notice. These were temporarily fed and housed at the Rest Centres at Holmfirth and New Mill until billets could be found for them. As a result of this and of persons who had privately evacuated themselves, the number of evacuees in the district rose from 186 (37 adults and 149 children) in May to 624 (223 adults and 401 children) in August.

This figure had fallen to 283 (104 adults and 179 children) by the end of the year.

I beg to place before you my annual report on the Sanitary and Cleansing Department of the district during the year 1944.

Farms and Cowsheds.

The cows and cowsheds in the district have been found to be in a clean condition and samples of milk have been taken for bacteriological examination and good results have been obtained.

Meat Inspections.

The whole of the meat supply to the butchers is sent from Huddersfield and allocated from Swan Bank, Holmfirth. Approximately 280 pigs have been slaughtered on licence from the Food Committee at various premises in the New mill and Honley area and have been inspected. Arising out of these inspections: 13 heads, 5 plucks, and 70 lbs. of Offals have been condemned and destroyed.

Public Cleansing Service.

This work has been done satisfactorily although considerable difficulty has been experienced during the past year in maintaining the motor vehicles, but it has not been necessary to engage outside transport.

There was a great deal of extra work handled by the men and lorries of this Department in connection with the Flood of Whit-Monday last.

By comparison with the previous years these weights and values show a decrease. The collection of kitchen waste was commenced on June 2nd, 1944, and a gradual weekly increase has been maintained, but the cost of collection is still in excess of income.

Non-Notifiable Infectious Diseases.

There was no serious influenza epidemic during 1944 though the few cases that occurred were of a virulent type. There were three deaths from this disease compared with 18 in 1943. In November the First Aid Post, Holmfirth was closed and since then there have been no public arrangements for the treatment of Scabies. Prior to November, 117 cases of Scabies had been treated at the F.A.P., a reduction in the number of cases from previous years, and there is reason to believe that the disease is dying out.

Notifiable Infectious Diseases.

191 cases of notifiable infectious disease were notified to me during 1944 compared with 379 in 1943. Excluding cases notified under the Measles and Whooping Cough Regulations, 1939, there were 61 cases of other infectious disease, compared with 109 in 1943 and 54 in 1942. These were comprised as follows:-

In addition, I case of disease was notified to me as diphtheria and later proved not to be due to B.Diphtheria.

Scarlet Fever.

36 cases of Scarlet Fever were notified during the year. 34 were isolated in hospital and there were no deaths from this disease. These cases were scattered throughout the district during the whole of the year, there being 12 from Holmfirth, 10 from Honley, 10 from New Mill, and 4 from Holme.

Diphtheria.

Six cases of diphtheria were notified to me during the year, and all were isolated in hospital and recovered. One of these cases was found not to be diphtheria. Of the five cases of diphtheria two were children from the Lee Homes, one a child from Honley Grammar School and one a child from St. John's School. One of these four cases had been immunised. The other case was a Marine on leave who was removed to a Military Hospital.

Pneumonia.

9 cases of pneumonia were notified during the year. There were 7 deaths from this disease.

Para-typhoid Fever.

One case of Para-typhoid B was notified to me during the year. This was a boy from Thongsbridge who was isolated in Hospital and recovered. The one death shown as due to this disease was in an adult from New mill who was removed to the Huddersfield Royal Infirmary undiagnosed and was later found to be suffering from Paratyphoid Fever. I was unable to trace the source of infection in either of these two cases.

Measles.

123 cases were notified during the last quarter of the year. 64 of these were in the old Holmfirth district, 39 from Honley, 20 from New Mill.

Whooping Cough.

7 cases of Whooping Cough were notified during the year. There was one death in an infant under 1 year of age from this disease.

Tuberculosis. ...

10 fresh cases of pulmonary tuberculosis and 3 of non-pulmonary tuberculosis have been notified during the year. There have been 7 deaths from this disease, 2 from pulmonary and 5 from non-pulmonary tuberculosis.

BIRTHS.

298 births have been registered during the year, of which 155 were male and 143 female, 10 of these births were illegitimate, 4 male and 6 female. The birth rate is 16.90 per 1,000 persons compared with a birth rate of 17.6 for the whole of England and wales. There were 11 still births, of which 7 were male and 4 female, registered during the year. One of these males was illegitimate. This gives a still birth rate per 1,000 persons of 0.62 compared with a still birth rate of 0.50 for England and wales.

INFANT MORTALITY.

There were 10 deaths among st infants under one year of age, compared with 8 last year. 8 of these were male and 2 female, all were legitimate. The causes of death were: premature birth 4, congenital malformation 4, whooping cough 1, broncho pneumonia 1. The infant mortality rate was 33.55 compared with an infant mortality rate of 46 for England and Wales.

DEATHS.

During the year 334 deaths were registered in the district, 90 of these deaths were persons belonging to other districts and were transferred out of the district; 36 deaths also occurred amongst persons outside the district, belonging to the district, and these were transferred back into this district. This gives a nett total of 244 deaths for the district; 107 of these were male and 137 female. The crude death rate is 13.84 per 1,000 persons, compared with a death rate of 11.6 for England and Wales.

Places of Death.

166 of the gross total of 334 deaths occurred in public institutions.

Ages ot Death.

Of the gross total of 334 deaths, 8 were persons over the age of 90 years (1 being 100), 225 of persons over the age of 65 years and 74 of persons aged between 45 and 65 years.

Causes of Death.

The chief causes of death were: heart disease 63, cerebral vascular disease 41, cancer 34, bronchitis 14, violence 9, pneumonia 7, digestive diseases 6, nephritis 5, suicide 5.

There was one death from puerperal causes, non sepsis, during the year. This gives a maternal mortality rate of 3.23 per 1,000 (live and still births) compared with a maternal mortality rate of 1.25 for England and Wales.
