

## TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HUCKNALL URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the duty of presenting the annual report on the health of the Urban District of Hucknall for the year 1959.

Dr. P. Brodbin resigned from the appointment as your Medical Officer of Health at the end of the year.

#### Infectious Diseases.

During the year 412 cases of Infectious Diseases were notified as against 514 for the previous year. Once again, measles (262) accounted for the bulk of these notifications, and fortunately was not the cause of any death.

The campaign of vaccination against Poliomyelitis continued during the year, and it is satisfactory to note that no case of poliomyelitis was notified in the district.

4,472 persons completed their poliomyelitis injections during the year, of which 3,977 were arranged by the Health Department.

It is pleasing to note that for the fifteenth year in succession no case of diphtheria has been notified. Unfortunately it is not sufficiently appreciated that this excellent state of affairs is in a large part due to the practice of immunisation during infancy and childhood. A growing number of persons have never seen a case of diphtheria and see little reason to have their children immunised. They owe their children and the community a moral duty to have this done, since if the proportion of cases immunised in the population falls below a certain level the disease will reappear amongst us. The

Ministry of Health recommends that 75% of babies should be immunised against diphtheria before their 1st birthday.

The total notifications of Tuberculosis were 12, as against 18 notified for the previous year.

#### Births and Deaths.

233 deaths were recorded in the district during the year, compared with 227 the previous year. The chief causes of death once again being failure in the Cardio-vascular system, cancer and bronchitis. It is satisfactory to note that the notifiable diseases resulted in only two deaths—one each from Tuberculosis and Pneumonia. The total deaths under one year were 10 compared with 12 for the previous year.

Total births registered were 354, being two less than the previous year.

I wish to record my appreciation of the support of my staff and the co-operation of the staffs of the other Departments. In particular, I wish to thank Mr. Brogan, Chief Public Health Inspector, and Mr. Plummer, Deputy Public Health Inspector, for their assistance which was so readily given from the start, and which helped so much during my first months in your district.

## HEALTH SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL

Details of these services are provided for information by courtesy of the County Council.

#### Watnall Road Centre

The Clinic, Watnall Road, is utilised for the Maternity and Child Welfare Centre, School Clinic, Dental Clinic, Relaxation Classes, Speech Training, Vaccination and Immunisation, Audiometry, Classes for Ineducable Pupils, Eyes Testing, and Distribution of Welfare Foods.

#### Ante-Natal and Post-Natal Sessions

Friday, 2.0-4.30 p.m.

The Doctor is in attendance at these sessions.

#### Child Welfare Sessions

Mondays and Thursdays, 2.0—4.30 p.m. Medical Officer in attendance.

Wednesdays, 2.0-4.30. No Medical Officer in attendance.

Health Visitors are in attendance at each Ante-Natal, Post-Natal and Child Welfare Session.

#### School Clinic Sessions

Tuesdays, 9.30 a.m.-12 noon.

Fridays, 9.30 a.m.—12 noon, 2.0—4.0 p.m. Medical Officer in attendance Tuesday and Friday mornings.

#### Dental Clinic Sessions

A Dental Officer is normally in attendance during the morning and afternoon sessions of Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of each week. Treatment is given by appointment.

#### Speech Therapy Sessions

Two sessions per week: Monday morning and Tuesday morning.

#### Vaccination and Immunisation

A vaccination and immunisation session is held on the first Tuesday afternoon of each month from 2—4 p.m. No appointment is necessary.

#### Distribution of Welfare Foods

Monday to Friday, 2—5 p.m. Saturday, 10 a.m.—12 noon.

#### Home Nursing Service

Two District Nurses (G. Saxton and R. M. Pleming, Nurses' Flats, Beardall Street, Hucknall) are now employed whole-time in general nursing, and, in addition, the part-time services of Nurse Sutton and Nurse Over are available for this service.

#### Maternity Outfits

Sterilised maternity outfits containing all dressings necessary for the conduct of a domiciliary confinement are supplied free of charge on the certification of the midwife engaged or the Health Visitor.

#### Care of Premature Births

The provision of draught-proof cots with hot-water bottles, blankets, etc., and an ambulance, is made for all premature infants requiring transportation to hospital. The midwife accompanies the infant on the journey to hospital.

Similarly equipped cots are provided for such infants nursed at home.

The services of a Consultant Paediatrician are available when required.

#### Home Help Service

Home Helps are available where domestic help is required owing to the presence of any person who is ill, lying-in, an expectant mother, mentally defective, aged or a child not over compulsory school age. The charge for this service is 3/3d. per hour, but where the recipient is unable to afford this standard charge, the County Council's Scale of Assistance is applied.

At the end of the year there was a total of Seventy-nine Home Helps employed on the joint district of Hucknall and Eastwood, forty-eight of whom are available for service in the Hucknall Urban District.

Cases in need of help should be reported to the District Office of 66 High Street, Hucknall (Telephone Hucknall 2093). It is particularly important that expectant mothers wishing to book a Home Help for their confinements should do so at an early date in order that adequate arrangements may be made.

## CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR AND CLEANSING SUPERINTENDENT FOR THE YEAR 1959

## TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HUCKNALL URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my report for 1959, a year during which a great deal of our time was devoted to housing matters. The demolition of No. 14 Portland Road, Nos. 88 and 90 Watnall Road, six houses at Forge Mills, and 15 houses in the Brook Street/Cross Street Area was completed. Demolition orders were served in respect of No. 20 Co-operative Avenue and eight houses in Allcock's Yard. No. 60 Whyburn Street and No. 30 Betts Street, were acquired by the Council and closed. An undertaking not to re-let three vacated properties in Byron Square was accepted.

The Eastwell Street Nos. 1, 2 and 3 Compulsory Purchase Orders were confirmed without modification, and the 24 properties involved were awaiting demolition by the end of the year.

A Compulsory Purchase Order was submitted to the Minister in respect of 16 houses at the Annesley Road/Spring Street junction and a public enquiry was held in October, concerning two objections made.

Detailed Inspections of the entire Butler's Hill Area were completed by the end of the year prior to representation, the declaration of a Clearance Area and the making of a Compulsory Purchase Order in respect of properties within the Clearance Area and other properties outside the area required for the satisfactory redevelopment of the site.

This is the largest scheme ever undertaken by this Authority, involving some 379 houses.

The majority of the displaced families from all these areas are being rehoused on the Welbeck Estate where the

road works and housing construction is progressing satisfactorily.

There is, inevitably, a certain amount of opposition to our Slum Clearance work, but in addition to the disrepair and dampness found in most of the properties, and the lack of privacy experienced in the common rear yards, the use of the galvanised bath on the living-room hearth is still the accepted practice. In these days when rockets are reaching the moon it is surely time we looked upon a bathroom as an essential for every family.

With the co-operation of the owners of properties in the Westville area, it was possible to connect some 36 houses to the main sewer and abolish the cesspools.

Part of the Slaughterhouses (Hygiene) Regulations 1958 came into force on 1st January, 1959. This mainly dealt with hygienic practices. The remaining sections dealing with construction and equipment will come into force at a later date to be specified by the Minister. Thus, the butcher with a private slaughterhouse will, provided he can meet the requirements of the Regulations, be allowed to continue slaughtering on his own premises.
