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

# TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HUCKNALL URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen,

I have the duty of presenting the annual report on the health of the Urban District of Hucknall for the year 1960.

### Infectious Diseases

During the year 288 cases of infectious diseases were notified as against 412 for the previous year. Once again measles (135) accounted for the majority of diseases notified. There was a reduction from 60 to 30 in Scarlet Fever notifications but, alas, Whooping Cough increased from 4 to 51. This is a state of affairs which should not exist at the present time when immunisation against Whooping Cough is freely available at the Health Department or the General Practitioner's Surgery. Parents owe it to their children to spare them the suffering caused by this infection.

Tuberculosis notifications numbered 12, which was the same total as for the previous year.

The campaign of vaccination against Poliomyelitis continued during the year, and it is satisfactory to note that no case of Poliomyelitis was notified in the district.

2,879 persons received their Poliomyelitis injections during the year, of which 1,824 were arranged by the Health Department.

### Births and Deaths

223 deaths were recorded in the district during the year, compared with 233 the previous year. The chief causes of death once again being failure in the Cardio-vascular system, Cancer and Bronchitis. It is satisfactory to note that the notifiable diseases resulted in only one death from Tuberculosis. The total deaths under one year were 6 compared with 10 for the previous year.

This is the lowest figure ever recorded in the history of the town. Congestal malformations and pre-maturity accounted for all

these infant deaths. Prophylaxis in the form of ante-natal care, aseptic methods used in home deliveries and better housing conditions have no doubt played their part in achieving such gratifying results.

Total births registered were 407, being 53 more than the previous year.

I wish to record my appreciation of the support of my staff and the co-operation of the staffs of the other departments. In particular, I wish to thank Mr. Brogan, Chief Public Health Inspector, and Mr. Plummer, Deputy Public Health Inspector, for their assistance which was so readily given throughout the year.

# HEALTH SERVICES PROVIDED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL

Details of these services are provided for information by courtesy of the County Council.

### Watnall Road Centre

The Clinic, Watnall Road, is utilised for the Maternity and Child Welfare Centre, School Clinic, Dental Clinic, Relaxation Classes, Speech Training, Vaccination and Immunisation, Audiometry, Classes for Ineducable Pupils, Eye Testing, Distribution of Welfare Foods and District Home Help Office.

### Ante-Natal and Post-Natal Sessions

Friday, 2.0-4.30 p.m.

The Doctor is in attendance at these sessions.

### Child Welfare Sessions

Mondays and Thursdays, 2.0—4.30 p.m. Medical Officer in attendance.

Wednesdays, 2.0—4.30 p.m. No Medical Officer in attendance.

Health Visitors are in attendance at each Ante-Natal, Post-Natal and Child Welfare Session.

### School Clinic Sessions

Tuesdays, 9.30 a.m.—12 noon.

Fridays, 9.30 a.m.—12 noon, 2.0—4.0 p.m. Medical Officer in attendance Tuesday and Friday mornings.

### Dental Clinic Sessions

A Dental Officer is normally in attendance during the morning and afternoon sessions of Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of each week. Treatment is given by appointment.

### Speech Therapy Sessions

Two sessions per week: Monday morning and Tuesday morning.

### Vaccination and Immunisation

A vaccination and immunisation session is held on the first Tuesday afternoon of each month from 2—4 p.m. No appointment is necessary.

### Distribution of Welfare Foods

Monday to Friday, 2.0—5.0 p.m. Saturday, 10.0 a.m.—12 noon.

### Ruffs Estate, Hucknall

In January, 1960, a Child Welfare Centre was established at the St. Paul's Church Hall, Ruffs Estate, Hucknall.

Sessions are held weekly on Wednesday afternoon and a Medical Officer is in attendance on alternate sessions.

### DISTRICT NURSE-MIDWIVES

### Home Nursing Service

Two District Nurses (G. Saxton and R. M. Pleming, Nurses' Flats, Beardall Street, Hucknall) are now employed whole-time in general nursing and, in addition, the part-time services of Nurse Sutton and Nurse Over are available for the service.

### Maternity Outfits

Sterilised maternity outfits containing all dressings necessary for the conduct of a domiciliary confinement are supplied free of charge on the certification of the midwife engaged or the Health Visitor.

### Care of Premature Births

The provision of draught-proof cots with hot-water bottles, blankets, etc., and an ambulance, is made for all premature infants requiring transportation to hospital. The midwife accompanies the infant on the journey to hospital. Similarly equipped cots are provided for such infants nursed at home.

The services of a Consultant Paediatrician are available when required.

### Home Help Service

Home Helps are available where domestic help is required owing to the presence of any person who is ill, lying-in, an expectant mother, mentally defective, aged or a child not over compulsory school age. The charge for this service is 3/6d. per hour, but where the recipient is unable to afford this standard charge, the County Council's Scale of Assistance is applied.

At the end of the year there was a total of eighty-seven Home Helps employed on the joint district of Hucknall and Eastwood, fifty-three of whom are available for service in the Hucknall Urban District.

Cases in need of help should be reported to the District Office, Child Welfare Centre, Watnall Road, Hucknall (Telephone Hucknall 3596). It is particularly important that expectant mothers wishing to book a Home Help for their confinements should do so at an early date in order that adequate arrangements may be made.

# TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HUCKNALL URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my report for 1960, a year during which further progress was made in respect of our housing problems. The demolition of twenty-six properties in Eastwell Street was completed. A Compulsory Purchase Order on sixteen houses at the junction of Spring Street and Annesley Road was confirmed by the Minister in January. An appeal against the Minister's decision was immediately submitted regarding two of the properties and the High Court action took place in London on 20th June, 1960. The appellants' case failed and costs were awarded against them. All the sixteen tenants were then re-housed and the properties were awaiting demolition by the end of the year. This was the final stage in the clearance of some seventy-five houses in the North Ward and it is hoped that re-development of the area will take place in the near future.

In January, the representation in respect of the 379 houses in the Butler's Hill area was submitted to the Minister and a Public Enquiry was held on 26th April when objections were heard concerning thirteen properties. Confirmation of the Compulsory Purchase Order was received on 14th July. Four of the properties submitted as unfit in our representation were re-scheduled by the Minister as fit, and well maintained payments were allowed in forty cases. The clearance scheme is to be carried out in three phases. The first phase commenced in the autumn and sixty-one families had been removed by the end of the year.

Whilst a great deal of attention is focused on the clearance of the very old properties, we must not lose sight of the fact that many of the more substantially constructed dwellings are still lacking modern amenities. Grants are still available to residents desirous of acquiring bathroom facilities and twenty-four applications were approved during 1960. It is hoped that many more applications will be received during the next few years. The time

may not be too far distant when a house without bathroom will be legally considered as "not being in all respects fit for human habitation".

A great deal of work was carried out on the three private slaughterhouses in order to meet the requirements of the Slaughterhouses (Hygiene) Regulations, 1958. The completion date for this area, as laid down by the Ministry, is 31st March, 1961. The quality of the meat inspected remained very high and the number of animals affected with tuberculosis was considerably down on the previous year. The attested scheme is no doubt responsible for this reduction; a just reward for years of diligent work by the Ministry Veterinary Officers.

### PUBLIC CLEANSING

Three Dennis Paxit vehicles were used throughout the year and the Ford side loader was retained as a reserve in case of breakdowns. Tipping continued on the Wigwam Lane site.

A Bristol 25 Angledozer was purchased in June for use on the refuse tip. This vehicle has proved exceedingly helpful in grading and consolidation and the risks of outbreaks of fire were greatly reduced. It is intended to purchase, in the next financial year, a scraper to assist in soiling over the surface of the completed areas of the tip.
