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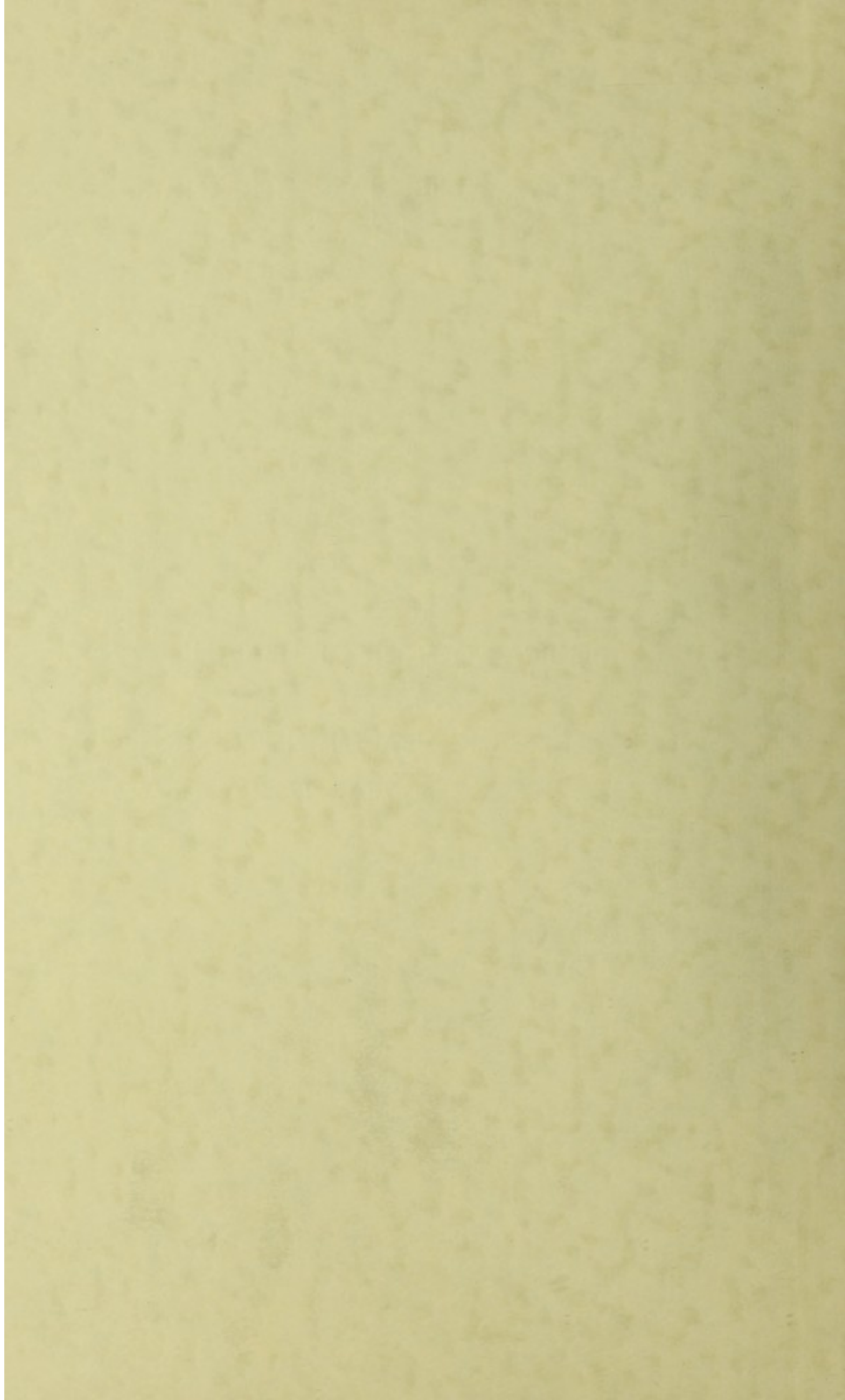

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE

HUCKNALL URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen,

I beg to submit my Annual Report on the health of the district for the year 1963. This has been compiled in accordance with the instructions of the Minister of Health.

Generally speaking, the statistics show a satisfactory state of health in the district and compare favourably with those for England and Wales.

The population continues to rise and is now 24,270 as compared to 23,800 the previous year. Part of this increase can be accounted for by the movement into the District of miners and their families in search of employment and coming from low employment areas. An additional factor is the rising Birth Rate, which is now 19.69 (adjusted) compared to 18.2 for England and Wales. It will be obvious from this that young families account for a considerable proportion of the population increase and so we must continue to forge ahead as quickly as possible with the housing programme. At the same time we must not ignore the needs of the older members of the population.

The Infant Mortality Rate was only 16.8 and compares most favourably with 20.9, for England and Wales. This figure is most gratifying when one recalls that only six years previously the figure was 42.0

For the fifth consecutive year there were no maternal deaths, again, most gratifying and consoling to all.

The (adjusted) Death Rate was 11.84 as compared, to 13.19 the previous year. Once again the chief causes of death were Cardio-vascular lesions or diseases, Cancer, Bronchitis and Pneumonia. Again, all deaths from Lung Cancer were confined to males. Deaths from Stomach Cancer remain equally high and here again confined mainly to males. The men folk again come off worst, when it comes to Bronchitis. A review of the figures for the past five years shows that a total of 72 males died from Bronchitis as compared to a total of 33 female deaths.

According to statistics published in Geneva by the World Health Organisation, Cancer in all its forms, is increasing as a cause of death throughout the world. Britain is second only to Belgium among countries with the highest death rate. Lung cancer, which on average kills six times as many men as women, was the leading cause of death among cancers in Britain and America. Are we doing enough to get rid of pollution in all its forms (including smoking or personal pollution), or must we wait until conditions become intolerable?

This was an epidemic year for measles which accounted for the greater part of the total increase in febrile diseases. There was a marked increase in cases of Pneumonia which continues the upward trend of recent years. The total notifications of Scarlet-Fever continued to drop during the same period.

An additional factor is the rising birth rate, which is now 19.69 (adjusted) compared to 18.8 for England and Wales. It will be obvious from this that young families account for a considerable proportion of the population increase and so we must continue to focus attention on the population increase and the housing programme. At the same time we must not ignore the needs of the older members of the population.

The Infant Mortality Rate was only 16.8 and compares most favourably with 20.9 for England and Wales. This figure is most gratifying when one recalls that only six years previously the figure was 48.0.

For the fifth consecutive year there were no maternal deaths, again, most gratifying and consoling to all.

The (adjusted) Death Rate was 11.84 as compared to 12.10 the previous year. Once again the chief causes of death were Cardio-vascular lesions or diseases, Cancer, Bronchitis and Pneumonia. Again, all deaths from lung cancer were confined to males. Deaths from stomach cancer remain unusually high and have again continued mainly to males. The men took again some of the worst, when it comes to Bronchitis. A review of the figures for the past five years shows that a total of 72 males died from Bronchitis as compared to a total of 55 females.

According to statistics published in Germany by the World Health Organisation Cancer in all its forms is increasing as a cause of death throughout the world. Britain is second only to Belgium among countries with the highest death rate. Lung cancer, which on average kills six times as many men as women, was the leading cause of death among cancer patients in Britain and Wales. And we do enough to get rid of pollution in all its forms (including smoking or personal pollution), or what we will call conditions before

This was an epidemic year for cancer which accounted for the greater part of the total increase in fatal diseases. There was a marked increase in cases of leukaemia which continues the upward trend of recent years. The total notifications of hepatitis-B virus continued to drop during the same period.

Again, Tuberculosis notifications numbered 9. There was a good response to vaccination (B.C.G.) against this disease when a total of 76% of school children accepted as compared to 69% the previous year.

For the 19th successive year there had not been a Diphtheria case largely due to the high rate of immunisation maintained in the District. Over 78% of babies born during the year were immunised, compared to 68.5% the previous year. Obviously the parents of Hucknall are aware of their responsibilities and are to be congratulated.

The response to Poliomyelitis vaccination was also good. There was one case of Paralytic Poliomyelitis notified in November 1963.

I regret that the response to Smallpox vaccinations has dropped considerably. There were only a total of 88 vaccinations as compared to 1,079 the previous year. The response in 1962 was obviously an emotional one when Smallpox occurred in a neighbouring county. This attitude on the part of parents in this district is difficult to understand when one considers the good response to the other protective procedures. Why do they ignore expert medical opinion in this regard only, whilst accepting it in other respects?

The demolition of unfit houses continued on a reduced scale. The re-housing of residents progressed satisfactorily and the building programme continued to forge ahead.

I have continued to enjoy the full co-operation of the Chief Public Health Inspector in all the work of the department and I express my thanks both to him and the other members of the staff for their willing and efficient assistance. In conclusion I wish to express my sincere appreciation of the help and support given by yourselves during the year.

Again, Tuberculosis notifications numbered 9. There was a good response to vaccination (B.C.G.) against this disease when a total of 75 of school children accepted as compared to 55 the previous year.

For the 1958 unseasonable year there had not been a Diphtheria case largely due to the high rate of immunisation maintained in the District. Over 75% of babies born during the year were immunised, compared to 68.5% the previous year. Obviously the parents of children are aware of their responsibilities and are to be congratulated.

The response to Polio-vaccine vaccination was also good. There was one case of Paralytic Poliomyelitis notified in November 1958.

I regret that the response to Smallpox vaccinations has dropped considerably. There were only a total of 58 vaccinations as compared to 1,579 the previous year. The response in 1958 was obviously an exceptional one when Smallpox occurred in a neighbouring county. This attitude on the part of parents in this district is difficult to understand when one considers the good response to the other protective procedures. Why do they ignore expert medical opinion in this regard only, whilst accepting it in other respects?

The demolition of unfit houses continued on a reduced scale. The rehousing of residents progressed satisfactorily and the building programme continued to forge ahead.

I have continued to enjoy the full co-operation of the Civil Public Health Inspector in all the work of the Department and I express my thanks both to him and the other members of the staff for their willing and efficient assistance. In conclusion I wish to express my sincere appreciation of the help and support given by your office during the year.

Care of Premature Births

The provision of draught-proof cots with hot-water bottles, blankets, etc., and an ambulance is made for all premature infants requiring transportation to hospital. The midwife accompanies the infant on the journey to hospital.

Similarly equipped cots are provided for such infants nursed at home.

The services of Consultant Paediatrician are available when required

Home Help Service

Home Helps are available where domestic help is required owing to the presence of any person who is ill, lying-in, an expectant mother, mentally ill, aged or a child not over compulsory school age. The charge for this service is 4/6d. per hour, but where the recipient is unable to afford this standard charge, the County Council's Scale of Assistance is applied.

Public Health, Rockville.

A Child Welfare Center is held at the St. Paul's Church Hall, Rockville, each Wednesday afternoon and a Medical Officer is in attendance on alternate weeks.
