TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HUCKWALL URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen,

I beg to submit my Annual Report and incidentally my final one, on the health of the District for the year 1964. This has been compiled in accordance with the instructions of the Minister of Health.

The statistics show a satisfactory state of health in the District, generally speaking, and compare favourably with those of England and Wales.

The population has risen by 400 since the previous year and is now 24,670. The Birth Rate remains the same as for 1963, that is, 19.5. The Infant Mortality Rate was 22.8 and compares with 20.0. for England and Wales. I am pleased to record that for the sixth consecutive year there were no maternal deaths.

The Death Rate (adjusted) was 13.98 and compares with 11.3 for England The chief causes of death were Cardio-vascular losions or diseases, Cancer, Pneumonia and Bronchitis. Of Cancer deaths, lung cancer accounted for the largest single cause and was confined mainly to males as in previous years. Whilst there were 5 deaths in the district caused by Motor vehicles (one might say avoidable) we must not loose sight of the fact that lung cancer kills four times as many people as are killed on the roads of this country, yearly. This is an insidious disease (25 years perhaps) less dramatic than road accidents as a cause of death and producing far less emotional response but all the more deplorable because preventable and because of its ever increasing magnitude. The road death rate whilst tragic is reasonably stable but the lung cancer death rate, however, continues to rise. We can all play our part in discouraging smoking especially amongst the youth (with a realization that example is the best approach) and do what we can to lessen and render less dangerous atmospheric pollution, the great problem of industrialised countries.

There were 598 cases of infectious diseases. Measles caused 464 of these, the great majority occurred in March and April. This epidemic was unexpected in that it followed one the previous year when a total of 480 cases were notified, mainly in January and February. Measles epidemics normally occur during alternate years.

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Pneumonia accounted for the next largest single case notification while Scarlet-Fever and Whooping-Cough vere close runners up.' Tuberculosis notifications decreased from 9 to 3. For the third consecutive year there has been an increase in the acceptance rate to vaccination against Tuberculosis (B.C.G.) when a total of 81% of the school children accepted.

Thanks mainly to the high rate of immunisation in the District, there has not been a case of Diphther a for the 20th successive year. The response to immunisation and vaccination generally, in Hucknall, is remarkably good. Whilst the parents are to be congratulated, a lot of the credit must go to the staff of the County Health Cliric where the great majority are done and so duplication of responsibility in the Health Service for this important work, is reduced to a minimum. The converse of this appears to be true, as shown by the poor immunisation and viccination response in our neighbouring district for which I am responsible, in Public Health matters. This applies particularly to booster doses. I devocate the administration of all these preventive health measures by the Health Department. It appears naturally to be the prerogative of the Department, and should be far more simple to administer and more efficient.

I have enjoyed the fuil co-operation of the Chief Public Health Inspector.

May I take this opportunity c? expressing my thanks both to him and the Health

Department staff for their leyal help and assistance. I express my gratitude

also to the staff of the other Department for their assistance and to the Council

Members for their help and encouragement at all times.

Home Nursing Service

One District Nurse(Miss R.M. Pleming, Nurses' Flats, Beardall Street, Hucknall) is now employed whole-time in general nursing.

Maternity Outfits

Sterilised maternity outfits containing all dressings necessary for the conduct of a domiciliary confinement are supplied free of charge on the certification of the midwife engaged or the Health Visitor.

Care of Premature Births

The provision of draught-proof cots with hot-water bottles, blankets, etc., and an ambulance is made for all premature infants requiring transportation to hospital. The midwife accompanies the infant on the journey to hospital.

Similarly equipped cots are provided for such infants nursed at home.

The services of a Consultant Paediatrician are available when required.

Home Help Service

Home Helps are available where domestic help is required owing to the presence of any person who is ill, lying-in, an expectant mother, mentally ill, aged or a child not over compulsory school age. The charge for this service is 4/6d. per hour, but where the recipient is unable to afford this standard charge, the County Council's Scale of Assistance is applied.

At the end of the year, there was a total of sixty-four Home Helps employed on the joint district of Hucknall and Eastwood, thirtyfive of whom are available for Service in the Hucknall Urban District.

Cases in need of help should be reported to the District Office, County Health Clinic, Watnall Road, Hucknall (Telephone Hucknall 3596). It is particularly important that expectant mothers wishing to book a Home Help for their confinements should do so at an early date in order that adequate arrangements may be made.

TO THE CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE HUCKNALL URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my report for 1964, a year in which once again Slum Clearance work occupied a great deal of our time. The rehousing of families from the Building Street/Byron Street Area was completed. Most of these families were transferred to the Welbeck Estate. Some families from the Byron Street/Orchard Street Area were also rehoused during the latter part of the year.

Seven areas were inspected and representations made during the year; namely, Sylvester Street/Orchard Street, Truman Street/Orchard Street, James Street/Linby Terrace and Allen Street Areas Nos. 1, 2, 3 and 4. A total of 201 properties were involved, and Public Enquires were held in respect of objections in the Truman Street and James Street Areas.

Demolition orders were made in respect of Nos. 12, 14 and 16 Glebe Street, Nos. 13, 15 and 17 Nottingham Road, Nos. 15 and 17 Derbyshire Lane, Lane, Farley Farm Cottage. A Closing Order was made on No. 107 Annesley Road.

The first families to be rehoused on our Re-developed Butlers Hill site moved in during the last few months of 1964.

The Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act, 1963, came into force during the year and applications for registration were received in respect of 135 premises. Inspections were commenced in November, and notices regarding 31 contraventions were served by the end of the year.

Unsatisfactory conditions at one of our bakehouses resulted in a prosecution on four charges, and fines totalling £120 were levied. The premises were eventually improved and made to comply with the Food Hygiene Regulations. The standards in the remainder of our food premises were reasonably maintained throughout the year. We are from time to time informed that our food handling is not very good when compared with other countries. I do not think we are as bad as people imagine, but there is still, unfortunately, a tendency to display unwrapped foods on counters involving risk of contamination by everyone who enters the shop. When a shopper asks for a cream bun, or a quarter of potted meat from the ever-open dish, the thought rarely occurs to her that the previous customer may have sneezed on the goods.

Two S. & D. Freighters and one Dennis Paxit were maintained in regular service on refuse collection, and the men continued to operate the stint/bonus scheme. A table showing cleansing costs is provided at the end of this report.
