ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

FOR THE YEAR 1969

To the Chairman and Members of the Hucknall Urban District Council

Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you my Annual Report of the health of the District for the year 1969.

VITAL STATISTICS

The population as estimated by the Registrar is given as 26,440 an increase of 180 from 26,260 in 1968.

The live birth rate per 1,000 population (adjusted) is 18.7 as compared with 16.3 for England and Wales. This is a slight increase compared with the figure of 18.07 last year. The number of illegitimate live births expressed as a percentage of all live births is 4. This is low compared with the figure of 8 for England and Wales, and is the lowest in Hucknall since 1965.

The still birth rate per 1,000 total live and stillbirths is 18. This is high compared with the figure of 13 for England and Wales, and is the highest in Hucknall during the last five years.

The causes of these stillbirths classified under the International Classification of Causes of Stillbirth are as follows:-

Of the five due to placental and cord conditions, four were due to placental insufficiency.

Interpretation of a high stillbirth rate is not simple because the position of the pregnancy in relation to previous pregnancies and maternal age as well as medical and social circumstances influence the level of risk that a child is stillborn.

The total number of deaths in children under one year registered was 8, and none of these was illegitimate. This gave an infant mortality rate of 16 - compared with 18 for England and Wales.

Of the eight children dying under one year, the number dying under four weeks of age was seven, and of these seven, six were under one week of age. These figures give a neonatal mortality rate of 14 compared with 12 for England and Wales.

The perinatal mortality rate i.e. stillbirths and deaths under 1 week combined per 1,000 total live and stillbirths was 30 compared with 23 for England and Wales. It will be seen from Table 2

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The perinatal mortality rate i.e. stillbirths and deaths under 1 week combined per 1,000 total live and stillbirths was 30 compared with 23 for England and Wales. It will be seen from Table 2

- a) that the causes of death under one week were mainly prematurity, congenital abnormality and birth injuries associated with difficult labour
- b) that the deaths in the early neonatal period accounted for the majority of the infant deaths under one year.

In the early neonatal period deaths are mainly due to prenatal influences. They mirror maternal health, genetic factors and the value of ante-natal care, whilst post-natal deaths mirror environmental factors i.e. they may indicate inferior housing accommodation and inadequate and faulty infant care resulting in infection.

One feels that these figures give support to the fact that while past years have seen a marked decline nationally in infant mortality, this fall has been due to the marked improvement in environmental factors e.g. housing, prevention of infection by immunisation, and health education. In looking to the future community physicians must not only maintain these advances, but also turn their thoughts to epidemiological research into the causes of congenital defects and maternal illness associated with perinatal mortality if they are to continue to practice preventive paediatrics. This work was already begun with the Perinatal Mortality Survey under the auspices of the National Birthday Trust Fund.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES; IMMUNISATION AND VACCINATION

In May 1969 the classic textbook case of an asymptomatic typhoid carrier occurred in the District. The case was diagnosed coincidentally as a result of an operation, and received further treatment in the Fever Hospital. The sewers in the district concerned were 'swabbed' twice and I am glad to say that the results were negative. There was no evidence of infection having occurred at any time in members of the same household. This case had no connection with another case of typhoid reported in the City at the beginning of the month. Whilst a classic case of a carrier of this type is uncommon in people who have not travelled abroad to areas where the disease is endemic, the case should serve as a sharp reminder that for all people intending to travel to these areas immunisation is a 'MUST'.

The notifications of measles in 1969 totalled 18 - a drop compared with 374 in 1968 and 187 in 1967. While some of this drop may be due to the vaccination programme started in 1967 one must remember that there tends to be a biennial upsurge followed by a drop in the number of cases notified. The supply of vaccine had been erratic for some time in 1968 and in March 1969 measles vaccinations were stopped temporarily owing to the withdrawal of vaccine. It will be interesting to follow the fluctuation of numbers of notified cases over the next five years.

Diphtheria has remained conspicuous by its absence - probably I feel due to the good sense of the parents in requesting immunisation against the disease, and also because of the ever watchful eyes of the Health Visitors, School Nurses and

In this the first complete year of the notification of Infective Hepatitis there were three cases. Two of these were children aged 4 years and 7 years and their father aged 30 years.

No new case of Tuberculosis was notified during the year.

The message to parents is as ever:-

"PROTECT YOUR CHILD - BY VACCINATION AND IMMUNISATION."

The very low incidence of diseases such as Diphtheria, Tuberculosis and Poliomyelitis in this decade compared with past decades bears out the wisdom of this message.

In conclusion I would like to offer my sincere thanks to Mr. Brogan, Mr. Plummer, Mr. Haskey, Mr. Crooks, Miss Wright and her predecessor Mrs. Foster for their help in this my first year as your District Medical Officer. I am grateful to the other Chief Officers and their staff, in particular Mr. Sharp, for their support and advice. I remain indebted to Doctor Lockett, the County Medical Officer, for his helpful advice on many occasions and also to his staff both at County Hall and on the District, - particularly the staff of the County Health Clinic for their kindness and unfailing loyalty at all times.

To the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee and all Members of the Hucknall U.D.C. my thanks are due for their support and interest in coping with the health problems of this community.
