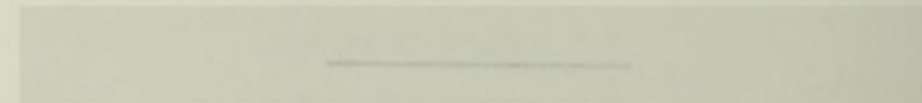

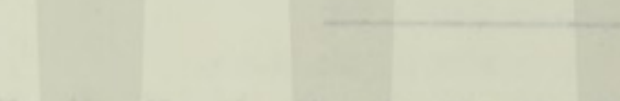

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

FOR THE YEAR 1971

To the Chairman and Members of the Hucknall Urban District Council

Mr. Chairman, ladies and gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for 1971.

VITAL STATISTICS:

The estimated mid-year population of the Urban District fell to 26,360 as compared with 26,570 in 1970.

The corrected birth rate fell to 18.2 from 18.9 in 1970, and the corrected death rate rose from 12.8 to 13.5

There were in all 295 deaths and 60 of these were due to Ischaemic Heart Disease i.e. 20.3%

In 1970 there were 278 deaths of which 35 were due to Ischaemic Heart Disease i.e. 12.5%

The percentage of deaths due to Ischaemic Heart Disease has, therefore, nearly doubled in one year!

Knowing that one of the biggest aetiological factors in Ischaemic Heart Disease is smoking I think these figures should be a warning to stop smoking, or perhaps what is more important, STOP THE CHILDREN FROM STARTING TO SMOKE! One of the best ways of teaching is BY EXAMPLE!

While still on the subject of statistics I think one should note that the illegitimate live births (percentage of total live births) has risen to 6 as compared with 4 in 1970 and 8 for England and Wales.

I have pleasure in presenting the Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health for 1971.

VITAL STATISTICS

The estimated mid-year population of the Urban District fell to 26,360 as compared with 26,570 in 1970.

The corrected birth rate fell to 18.2 from 18.9 in 1970, and the corrected death rate rose from 12.8 to 13.5.

There were in all 395 deaths and 60 of these were due to Ischaemic Heart Disease (I.H.D.).

In 1971 there were 278 deaths of which 35 were due to Ischaemic Heart Disease (I.H.D.).

The percentage of deaths due to Ischaemic Heart Disease has, therefore, nearly doubled in one year.

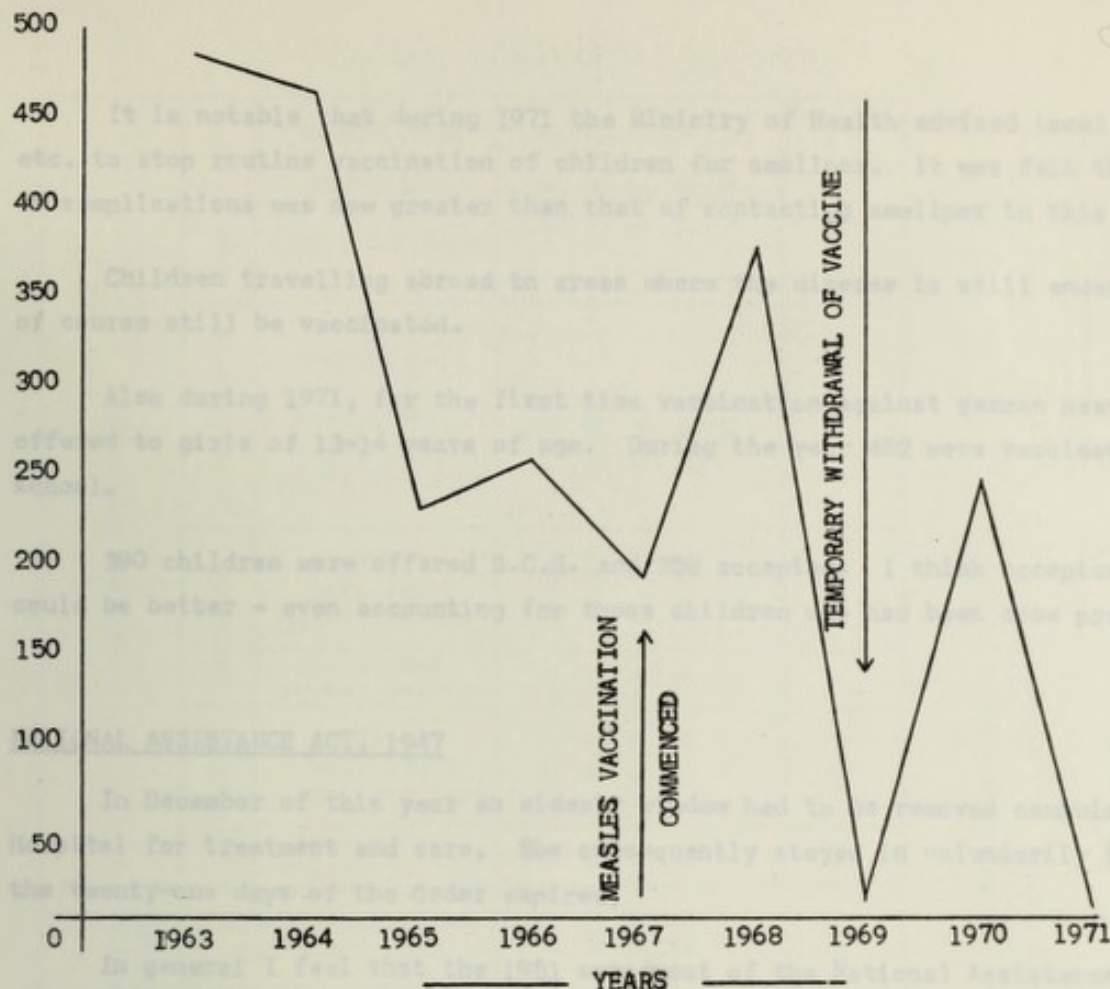
Knowing that one of the biggest aetiological factors in Ischaemic Heart Disease is smoking I think these figures should be a warning to stop smoking, or perhaps what is more important, STOP THE CHILDREN FROM STARTING TO SMOKES. One of the best ways of smoking is BY EXAMPLE.

While still on the subject of statistics I think one should note that the illegitimate live births (percentage of total live births) has risen to 5 as compared with 4 in 1970 and 5 for England and Wales.

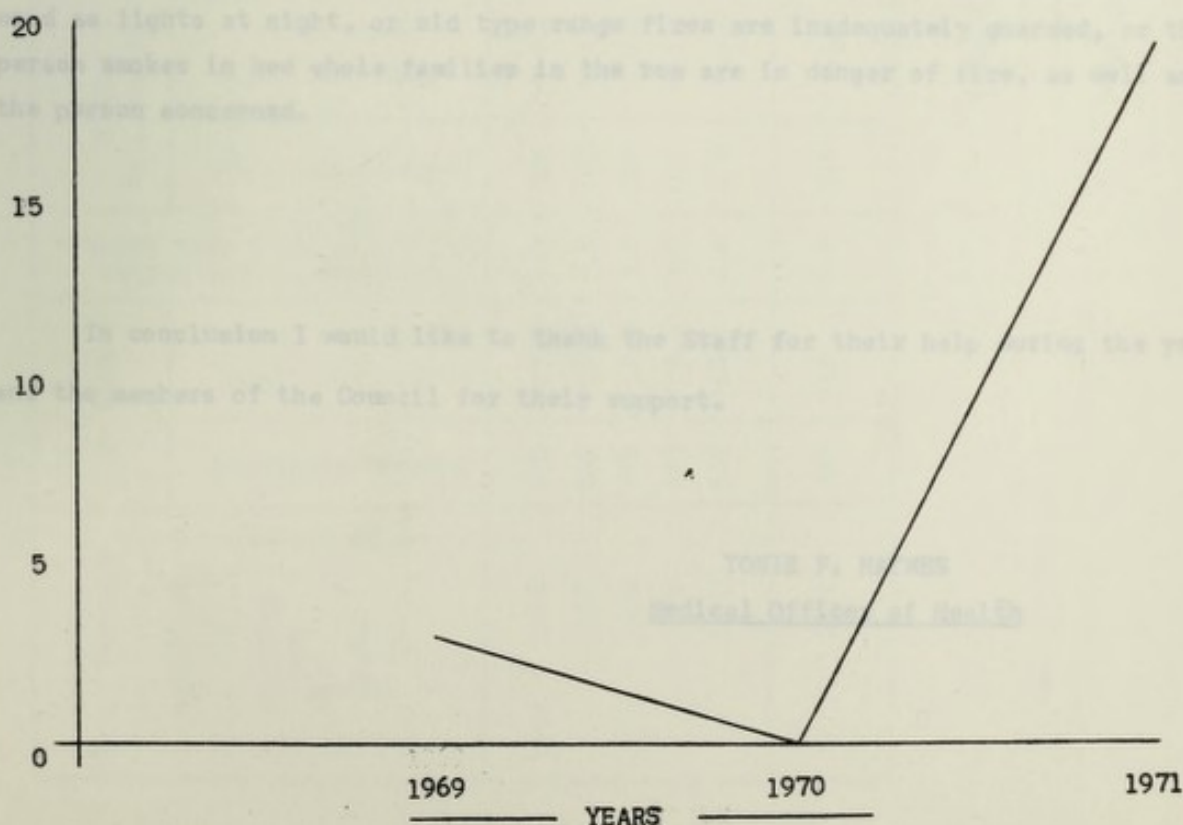
NUMBER CASES MEASLES

It is notable that during 1971 the Ministry of Health advised Local Authorities etc. to stop routine vaccination of children for smallpox. It was felt that the risk of complications was now greater than that of contacting smallpox in this country.

Children travelling abroad to areas where the disease is still endemic must of course still be vaccinated.

Also during 1971, for the first time vaccination against german measles was offered to girls of 13-14 years of age. During the year 452 were vaccinated in school.

390 children were offered B.C.G. and 358 accepted. I think acceptance rate could be better - even accounting for those children who had been done previously.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1947

In December of this year an elderly window had to be removed compulsorily to Hospital for treatment and care. She subsequently stayed in voluntarily (i.e. after the twenty-one days of the Order expired)

In general I feel that the 1951 amendment of the National Assistance Act, 1947 is becoming a virtually useless piece of legislation, because of the hopelessly inadequate number of beds either in hospital or at homes for these patients. An order signed in an emergency can be two or three weeks on the desk waiting for a bed to be designated before the Magistrate can sign it. By that time the emergency may well be over.

In many cases where the person occupies terrace property and candles are used as lights at night, or old type range fires are inadequately guarded, or the person smokes in bed whole families in the row are in danger of fire, as well as the person concerned.

In conclusion I would like to thank the Staff for their help during the year, and the members of the Council for their support.

It is notable that during 1971 the Ministry of Health advised local authorities to stop routine vaccination of children for smallpox. It was felt that the risk of complications was now greater than that of contracting smallpox in this country.

300 children were offered B.C.G. and 328 accepted. I think acceptance rate could be better - even accounting for those children who had been vaccinated previously.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1947

In December of this year an elderly widow had to be removed compulsorily to hospital for treatment and care. She subsequently stayed in voluntarily (i.e. after the twenty-one days of the Order expired).

In general I feel that the 1947 amendment of the National Assistance Act, 1947 is becoming a virtually useless piece of legislation, because of the hopeless inadequate number of beds either in hospital or at home for these patients. An order signed in an emergency can be two or three weeks on the desk waiting for a bed to be designated before the Magistrate can sign it. By that time the emergency may well be over.

REPORT OF THE
CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR AND CLEANSING SUPERINTENDANT
FOR THE YEAR 1971

To the Chairman and Members of the Hucknall Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting my report for 1971 a year of anxieties and speculations as the first stages of Local Government reorganisation were introduced. The future of Hucknall Urban District was still uncertain by the end of the year, but progress in the Environmental Health field is still being maintained and will have to continue whatever the outcome.

During the year many private landlords became aware of the sections in the Housing Act, 1969 dealing with "fair rents". They realised that if their properties were fitted with bathroom facilities and brought up to a good state of repair they could obtain from the Council a qualification certificate to submit to the Rent Officer and have a "fair rent" fixed. Sixty-seven certificates were issued and ninety were refused. The fact that so many were refused indicated a lack of appreciation on the part of owners of the standards of repair and modernisation required before a certificate could be obtained. A great deal of work has been involved preparing schedules of the repairs necessary which are always enclosed with the refusal notice.

Improvements and repairs to many of the good older type dwellings continued throughout the year. One hundred and thirty applications for standard grants and fifty for improvement grants were received.

It was particularly gratifying to arrange the grants in respect of Great Northern Cottages which enabled us to remove the last of the pail closets in the district. There had previously been no sewer available in this area but the development of the new estate opposite had brought drainage to within a few yards of the cottages.

A few unfit dwellings were dealt with under Slum Clearance. "Alvebrook", Linby Walk, and "The White House", Station Road were represented and the tenants of Nos. 1 to 5 The Brickyard were re-housed prior to demolition. A survey of the Mosley Street/Curtis Street area was commenced with a view to future representation for clearance.

Owing to shortages of solid smokeless fuels Smoke Control work was suspended during the early part of the year. The Ministry of the Environment gave assurances on supplies by mid-summer and a survey of the Beauvale/Whyburn Lane/Wood Lane area commenced in order that our No. 4 Smoke Control Area could be submitted to the Ministry early in 1972.

Sixty-seven certificates were issued and ninety were refused. There had previously been no sewer available in this area but the development of the new estate opposite had brought drainage to within a few yards of the cottages.

A few small dwellings were dealt with under Stop Clearance, "Alvetoak", Lloyd Wall, and "The White House", Station Road were re-presented and the tenants of Nos. 1 to 5 The Whiteyard were rehoused prior to demolition. A survey of the Mosley Street/Curtis Street area was commenced with a view to future reorganisation for clearance.

During the shortages of solid materials the Smoke Control work was suspended during the early part of the year. The Ministry of the Environment gave assurances on supplies by mid-summer and a survey of the Newbury/Highway Lane/Wood Lane area commenced in order that our No. 4 Smoke Control Area could be submitted to the Ministry early in 1972.

Two prosecutions were taken for contraventions of the Clean Air Acts. One concerned a tenant persistently burning coal in our No. 2 Smoke Control Area, and the other was in respect of the burning of vehicles, tyres etc. on a scrap metals recovery site.

Complaints received during the year were as varied as ever, but complaints of nuisance from pigeons were more numerous. A pest control firm was engaged to deal with the pigeons in the town centre and Butlers Hill areas.
