



To the Chairman and Members of the Hull and Goole Port Health Authority.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to submit the Report of the Port Medical Officer of Health of the Hull and Goole Port Health Authority for the year ended 31st December, 1954.

The Report has been prepared in accordance with the instructions contained in Form Port 20 of the Ministry of Health.

During the year there was a decrease in the number of arrivals as compared with 1953, with a consequent reduction in tonnage from 8,109,052 tons in 1953 to 7,775,593 tons in 1954. This may in some part be accounted for by two dock strikes, one local and one National, which took place during the year.

In 1954 the number of medical boardings fell from 490 in 1953 to 398 in 1954. This is accounted for by (a) the removal of the South American Ports from the Infected Area List from the 26th November, 1954, (b) ships from Infected Areas via "Excepted Ports" not being boarded as from the 12th June, 1953, and (c) a decrease in the number of vessels boarded by Medical Inspectors carrying Alien passengers—in 1953, 241 vessels were boarded, in 1954, 204 vessels were boarded.

Hull being one of the largest Registration Authorities under the Canal Boats Acts, the new Regulations governing this aspect of public health are awaited with keen interest. In the meantime new craft registered during the year have shown progressive improvement in the amenities provided for the occupants.

At the request of the Hon. Secretary of the Association of Sea and Air Port Health Authorities, Tuberculosis amongst Seamen was the subject of a special investigation and report and comment is made upon this in the body of the report. During the year the Ministry of Health requested information for the benefit of the World Health Organisation on the extent of rodent infestation in foreign-going ships. This was supplied in the approved form.

I am grateful to H.M. Collector of Customs and Excise and Staff, the Superintendent of H.M. Customs Waterguard and his Officers, H.M. Inspector (Home Office—Aliens Branch) and his staff, the Pilots, Dock Masters, Owners, Agents, Masters of vessels and others for the assistance they have given me during the year. I am also grateful to the British Transport Commission at Hull and Goole for supplying information regarding the trade of the respective ports.

Once again I would like to pay my tribute to the staff, who during the year have worked extremely hard, and to the Chairman and Members of the Authority who have continued to take a keen interest in Port Health Work and whose courtesy and kindness to me on all occasions is much appreciated.

REPORT

Jurisdiction of Port

There has been no alteration in the definition of the limits of jurisdiction of the Port Health Authority.

Amount of Shipping entering the District during the year

During 1954, 10,785 vessels entered the Ports of Hull and Goole with a total net tonnage of 7,775,593 as against 11,549 vessels with a total net tonnage of 8,109,052 in 1953.

In the year under review 396 ships were boarded on arrival by the Medical Officers of the Authority; this shows a decrease of 92 when compared with the figure for 1953.

The Port Health Inspectors visited 6,237 vessels, on 537 of which sanitary defects were discovered, 162 of these were rectified. In 1953 the figures were respectively 6,534,626 and 193. Details of this work will be found in Table G, page 25, and in Appendix 1, pages 41-42, and Appendix 5, pages 49-53.

There are regular freight, and in certain cases, passenger services between this port and France, Belgium, Holland, Denmark, Germany and the Scandinavian countries.

Vessels also arrive at the port from Australia, New Zealand, South America, the U.S.A. and Canada, India and Pakistan, South, East, West and North Africa, Italy, Jugo-Slavia, Greece, Turkey, Syria and Israel.

Coastwise traffic is principally concerned with London and the East Coast Ports.

The foreign trade of the Port of Hull has, in terms of tonnage handled, remained steady since regaining normal proportions after the war, although rising production in many of the industries has been reflected in an increase in the imports of raw materials, the traffic in chrome and other ores through Hull showing an increase of 10 per cent above the 1953 tonnages.

The importation of molasses at the Salt End Jetties, Hull, destined for the heavy chemical plant on the Industrial Estate, was three times as great as in 1953, and was the highest tonnage for several years.

Coal and coke shipments from Hull were the highest for any year since 1930.

The imports of raw wool into the country were a little lower than in 1953, but over one-third of the total has again entered through the Humber Ports for distribution mainly to the West Riding.

Fish landings generally have remained constant at over 200,000 tons per annum since the war.

Imports of pitwood and mining timber followed closely the pattern of other normal post-war years.

The following table shows the total number and tonnage of vessels arriving in Hull from foreign ports for the years 1946 to 1954, inclusive.

The trade of the Port of Goole has shown an upward trend since the war.

The greater proportion of the trade of Goole is coastal and near Continental. The principal traffics inward are grain, provisions, Australian and New Zealand wool transhipped at London, and raw materials for the iron and steel industry.

Outwards the main shipments are coal and coke, iron and steel, textiles and other manufactured goods.

The shipments of coal from Goole in 1953 constituted a post-war record. In 1954 there were increased imports of grain and flour, iron pyrites, pyrites cinders, scrap, strawboards and general cargo, with decreases in building and road-making materials, farina, iron and steel and sand.

Infectious Diseases

No notifications were received from medical practitioners of any case of infectious disease having occurred on canal boats during the year.

Legal Proceedings

It has not been found necessary during the year to institute legal proceedings.

WATER SUPPLY

For the District

Kingston upon Hull Corporation water is now supplied for domestic purposes on all docks.

For Shipping

The water supplied to ships for domestic purposes is the Kingston upon Hull Corporation supply and is delivered either by means of water boats or by hydrants situated on the dock-side.

Reports on Tests for Contamination

Twelve water samples obtained from water-boats and ships in Hull and Goole were examined by the Port Analyst.

(b) BACTERIOLOGICAL

Where the water samples were considered to be unsatisfactory as the result of the chemical or bacteriological findings, instructions were issued for the water tanks to be cleansed and cement-washed and re-filled with fresh water from the district supply.

Precautions against Contamination of Hydrants and Hosepipes

The Authority possess no jurisdiction over shore premises or equipment.

Some vessels are supplied with fresh water from water-boats while others are supplied direct from hydrants on the quayside owned by the British Transport Commission.

Samples are taken periodically from privately-owned waterboats and occasionally from the hydrants, the latter with the consent and co-operation of the British Transport Commission.

Should any hydrant or equipment be found in an unsatisfactory condition the matter is reported to the British Transport Commission who take the necessary action.

PUBLIC HEALTH (SHIPS) REGULATIONS 1952 and 1954

REGULATION 15

During the year a number of trawlers from Deep Sea Fishing Grounds, via a Foreign Port, did not on arrival within the district display the appropriate flag or light signals in accordance with the provisions of Article 15 of the above Regulations.

Periodical lists of the offending vessels were submitted to the Authority by H.M. Customs Waterguard and these as received were forwarded to the Secretary of the Hull Fishing Vessel Owners' Association with the request that the skippers of the vessels concerned be warned regarding the contraventions of the Regulations.

Towards the end of the year no further contraventions were reported.

REGULATION 18

During the year the new three-part Warning Notice and Surveillance Card was made available for issue when necessary.

TUBERCULOSIS IN SEAMEN

At the request of the Honorary Secretary of the Association of Sea and Air Port Health Authorities, records were kept regarding the incidence of Tuberculosis among seamen for the period 1st January to the 31st December, 1954.

Twenty-three cases were recorded, comprising six which were noted by the Boarding Medical Officers and seventeen which were referred by private medical practitioners to the Consultant Chest Physician—No. 5 Hospital Management Committee—Hull (B) Group.

In addition, two cases were disposed of prior to the arrival of vessels in the district.

SMALLPOX

All cases or suspected cases of Smallpox may be sent to the Castle Hill Hospital, Cottingham, E. Yorks.

Ambulances for the removal of cases to hospital are provided at all times by the Hull Corporation Ambulance Service which is under the direction of the Medical Officer of Health of the City.

Vans are also available for the conveyance of bedding, etc., to and from the Corporation Disinfecting Station, Scarborough Street, Hull.

All ambulance crews and the staff of the Authority are subjected to periodical vaccination.

Dr. Alexander Hutchison, Medical Officer of Health of the City of Kingston upon Hull, and of the Hull and Goole Port Health Authority, is the Smallpox Consultant for the district.

OBSERVATIONS ON THE OCCURRENCE OF MALARIA ON SHIPS

Five cases of Malaria were landed from vessels during the year and two cases were reported to have been disposed of prior to arrival.

These figures indicate the continued favourable trend as regards the incidence of Malaria on vessels from the West Coast of Africa.

MEASURES TAKEN AGAINST SHIPS INFECTED WITH OR SUSPECTED FOR PLAGUE

No ships, infected with or suspected for Plague, arrived in the district during the year.

MEASURES AGAINST RODENTS IN SHIPS FROM FOREIGN PORTS

Procedure for Inspection of Ships for Rats

The Authority's Inspectors and/or Rodent Searchers inspect all ships from foreign ports for evidence of rat infestation, special attention being directed to those coming from Infected Areas, numbering 431 in 1954.

Where evidence of recent infestation is found traps are laid to confirm the findings.

In 1954 traps were set on 152 ships and 217 rats were caught.

The Inspectors of the Authority also pay daily visits to ships from Infected Areas and enquiries regarding the presence of rats form part of their normal duties.

Arrangements for the Bacteriological or Pathological Examination of Rodents

A proportion of all rats trapped and all found dead, including those destroyed by the Rat Catchers employed by the British Transport Commission, are submitted to the Director of the Public Health Laboratory Service, 184 High Street, Hull, for bacteriological examination. One hundred and sixty-five rats were examined during the year, none of which showed evidence of Bacillus pestis. Details are given in Table E (page 23).

Arrangements for Deratting Ships

Four methods of rat destruction are approved, namely: (1) Fumigation by hydrogen cyanide; (2) Fumigation by sulphur dioxide, (3) Trapping, and (4) Poisoning by sodium fluoroacetate "1080". Details are given in Tables E and F (pages 23–24).

Where deratting by fumigation or by sodium fluoroacetate is considered necessary the work is carried out by commercial contractors. The firms undertaking this work are as follows:

PROGRESS IN RAT-PROOFING OF SHIPS

The application and incorporation of rat-proofing principles in the construction of new ships continues. Where, during the course of inspection, the Officers of the Authority discover unprotected rat harbourages, Masters, Owners or Agents are requested to undertake remedial measures.

Deratting by Sodium Fluoroacetate "1080"

During the year under review four vessels were treated with "1080" for the destruction of rats and deratting certificates were issued on the completion of each treatment. On the four ships concerned, thirty-one rats were destroyed.

The result in each case was considered to be fairly satisfactory but until some form of check is devised to assess whether or not complete elimination of the rat population has been achieved by the use of this rodenticide, opinion as to its merits must be reserved.

Our experience to date indicates that where heavy infestation exists and "1080" is used, a second treatment might be of value.

If this method were adopted for a limited period, a check could be made as to the real value of this poison. On the other hand where the infestation is only slight it would appear that a single treatment would suffice.

INCORRECT OR ABSENCE OF "OFFICIAL CERTIFICATES"

Twenty-nine barrels of Icelandic Raw Salted Uncleaned Sheep and Lamb Guts were discharged ex the s.s. *Albatross* from Germany without "Official Certificates". The goods were returned to the country of origin.


