

TO THE HUNTINGDON BOROUGH COUNCIL.

GENTLEMEN,

I herewith present my report upon the health of the Borough of Huntingdon for the year 1948, compiled according to instructions received from the Ministry of Health.

The Borough of Huntingdon, with which is incorporated the village of Hartford, is situate on the north side of the River Ouse. It has an area of 2,151 acres, the soil being gravel and clay. The town is composed of a collection of streets, the main one, a mile in length, running in a northerly direction at right angles to the river.

The number of inhabited houses at the end of the year was estimated at 1467.

The Rateable Value is £33,316.

The sum represented by a penny rate is £133 6s. 0d.

There was a drop in the number of births (98 to 74) and also in the number of deaths (71 to 59), of these 30 were aged people.

There were no deaths from Diarrhoea, Diphtheria or Whooping Cough among children. The general health of the inhabitants for the year was very good. There was no epidemic of infectious diseases. All houses in which Diphtheria and Scarlet Fever appear are disinfected during the first twenty-four hours.

Public Assitance Medical Relief is utilised to a fair extent, principally amongst the older inhabitants, also the Huntingdon County Hospital is used by both In and Out-Patients.

The Public Assistance Institution at St. Neots takes care of cases that are not serious enough to be sent to the Mental Hospital at Fulbourn, Cambs.

The Public Assistance Institution at the North End of the town takes all cases of illness and infirmity from the district, with the exception of the Mental cases.

Cases of illness are visited by a District Nurse in their homes, and cases of infectious diseases are conveyed to the local Isolation Hospital in Primrose Lane.

Food and Drugs Act is administered by the Hunts. County Council.

Hospitals

There is a County Hospital in the Borough which receives cases, and an Isolation Hospital for infectious diseases. These are supported by the National Health Services. Cases of Small Pox in the Borough are now provided for by the County Council.

Ambulance Facilities

There is a sufficient ambulance service in the Borough for ordinary cases and for infectious cases.

Clinics

There are clinics in the Borough for Tuberculosis, Chest Diseases, Ear, Nose and Throat cases, Child Welfare, Ante-Natal matters, Gynaecology, Orthopaedic and Mental Diseases, under the County Council jurisdiction. The County Hospital also has clinics in Medicine, Surgery, Orthopaedics, Fractures, Nose, Throat and Ears, Skins, Dental cases and Gynaecology.

Public Mortuary

The Mortuary in Priory Road has been renovated throughout, and electric light and a gas copper have been installed.

Water Supply

There was a sufficient supply of water during the year. Rainfall for the year was 27.05 inches, as compared with 18.92 inches for 1947. This being much above the average.

Samples of water are sent regularly to the Public Health Laboratory Service, Cambridge.

The town water is treated by chlorination, and the analyses proved satisfactory throughout the year.

In the extreme northern part of the town, where there is no piped supply, 8 houses situated in Sapley have been supplied with water by mobile tanks.

A new pump to take the place of an existing one which is inadequate is now being installed.

Sewerage and Sewage Disposal

The Council have continued to proceed with the preparation of a new Scheme of Sewerage and Sewage Disposal.

The provision of a disposal Scheme is needed urgently, and the Council's Consulting Engineers presented plans to the Ministry of Health in July, 1947. The new proposals will allow for a joint Scheme to serve the Borough and the Borough of Godmanchester.

It is hoped to have all preliminary details completed early in 1949, in order that an Inquiry may be held.

Collection and Disposal of House Refuse

Collections of House Refuse are made once per week from dwelling houses, and at least twice per week from trade premises

The refuse is destroyed by means of an Incinerator situated well away from the town, and partly by controlled tipping to fill up land on the Hartford Road Fields, which are to be used for recreational purposes in the future.

A new Refuse Collecting Vehicle has been ordered by the Borough Council.

Bathing Place

The Bathing Place was closed during the year owing to an unsatisfactory report upon the condition of the river water.

Inspection

During the year I have made several inspections of the District, accompanied by your Sanitary Inspector.

Nuisance Inspection is embodied in the Sanitary Officer's Report, vide page 9.

Housing

During the year the scheme for 50 houses and 4 bungalows was completed.

Lay-out plans for further houses on land in American Lane have been approved, and work is in hand for house plans and approach road construction, also site works.

The Borough Council now possess 272 houses.

Inspections under Housing Acts have been in abeyance, but have been made and urgent matters dealt with under Public Health Act, 1936.

There is one registered Lodging House in the Borough.

Shops Act, 1934.

During the year inspections have been made of shops occupied in the Borough, and conditions were found to be of a satisfactory nature.

Factories

The undermentioned factories are operating in the Borough Chivers & Sons, Canning; Amphion, Ltd., Wireless; Acoustical Manufacturing Co., Loud Speaker Equipment; Oriental Confectionary Co.; P. &. H. Engineering Co.; Silent Channel Co., Rubber; Huntingdon Brewery Co.

The sanitary condition and water supply to the schools is the same as that of the Borough. The schools are kept clean and are well ventilated, and were not closed during the year for epidemic disease.

Tuberculosis

Cases of Tuberculosis are periodically examined at the County Clinic, or visited by the Health Visitor, and X-rayed at Papworth Sanatorium. The County Council allow patients the statutory allowances, besides priority milk and eggs. There was I death from Tuberculosis during the year. There were nine new cases, seven pulmonary, two non-pulmonary; and two cases transferred into the Borough.

Venereal Disease

As this is not a notifiable disease, no record of cases is kept but it is known that the incidence of disease is slight. Cases are treated at Peterborough and Cambridge.

Pneumonia

There were three cases of this disease, one being fatal.

Influenza

This disease was quiescent during the year.

Cancer

There were eleven deaths from Cancer during the year.

Varicella

There were eleven cases notified this year.

Scarlet Fever

There were two cases notified, but no deaths.

Measles

There were only six cases notified.

Scabies

This skin disease is practically non-existant in the Borough.

Measles, Whooping Cough and Infective Jaundice are notifiable as a war-time measure. Your Authority inoculates children against Diphtheria and Whooping Cough free of charge.

One hundred and thirty children were immunised against Diphtheria during the year, 107 under 5 years and 23 between 5 and 15 years. There are no records of the number of children immunised against Whooping Cough in the Borough, but parents have not taken much advantage of this offer by the Council.
