BIRTHS.—The Birth-rate for Huntingdonshire for 1942 was 16.8 as compared with 13.9 for 1941.

STILLBIRTHS.—The still-birth rate for 1942 was 32.6, as compared with 33.1 in 1941.

DEATHS.—The crude death-rate for 1942 was 11·3 as compared with 12·2 in 1941.

INFANT MORTALITY.—The infant mortality rate for 1942 is 52.4 per 1,000 births as compared with 69.4 for 1941, 54.4 for 1940, 36.0 for 1939, and 46.2 for 1938. The rate for England and Wales for the year 1942 was 49.

MATERNAL MORTALITY.—The number of women dying from conditions directly associated with child-birth (including sepsis) was 1. This gives a rate of ·9 per 1,000 total births as compared with a rate of 8·5 for 1941, 2·1 for 1940, and nil for 1939.

CHIEF CAUSES OF DEATH.—The chief causes of death during the year 1942 were Heart Disease 191, Cancer 122, Intra cranial vascular lesions 72, Bronchitis 42, Pneumonia 39, Tuberculosis (pulmonary) 30.

Diphtheria.—The number of cases of diphtheria notified during 1942 was 26, as compared with 44 in 1941, 62 in 1940, 29 in 1939, 49 in 1938, 202 in 1937.

Immunisation of children under 5 years of age is carried out at the Infant Welfare Centres in the County. During 1942, 659 infants were immunised.

In three Sanitary Districts the County Medical Staff carry out the immunisation of school children (acting as agents for these Districts). In addition the immunisation work in seven Districts is performed by the District Medical Officers.

A total of 3,454 children of all ages were immunised during the year 1942.

There were 2 deaths from diphtheria during the year.

Scarlet Fever.—149 notifications were received, and there were no deaths.

Typhoid and Paratyphoid Fevers.-No cases were notified.

Puerperal Pyrexia.—17 cases were notified, and 5 of these received institutional treatment.

Cerebro-Spinal Fever.—No cases were notified.

Whooping Cough.—183 cases were notified during 1942.

TUBERCULOSIS.

The number of deaths from tuberculosis (all forms) in the County for 1942 was 30, that for Urban Districts being 16, and for Rural Districts 14.

The number of cases of Pulmonary tuberculosis notified during 1942 was 49, as compared with 39 in 1941. 20 cases of non-pulmonary tuberculosis were notified as against 13 in 1941. In addition 10 pulmonary and 9 non-pulmonary cases came to notice, otherwise than by formal notification (e.g., from death returns, etc.). (See table on page 10.)

Dispensaries.—The figures relating to work in connection with Dispensaries are shown in the table on page 11.

Institutional Treatment.—Cases of pulmonary tuberculosis are accommodated in Papworth Hall Sanatorium, and children in other out-county Sanatoria. Non-pulmonary cases are admitted mainly to the Manfield Orthopaedic Hospital, Northampton. The following table shows the extent of residential treatment during 1942:—

The District Nurses also act as Infant Health Visitors, and 7,020 visits were paid to children under 1 year of age in 1942, and 8,354 visits in 1941, and 7,416 visits to children between 1 and 5 years of age in 1942 as compared with 8,603 in 1941.

Dental treatment is available for expectant and nursing mothers. During the year 1942, 148 dentures were supplied, the whole or part cost being recovered from the patient according to her means.
