The infant mortality rate was 19.2 per 1,000 live-births.

Infant Mortality and Live

This rate was again high as there were no deaths from pneumonia, tuberculosis and influenza, and is a reflection of the high standard of modern obstetric practice.

Deaths and Death Rate

The total number of deaths from all causes was 117 (1965) and the crude death rate was 10.5 per 1,000 population which is an increase of 0.1 from that of the previous year.

The chief group cause of death, as normally would be expected, was heart disease, circulatory diseases and vascular lesions of the nervous system. In these and the great majority of deaths amongst the males of those under 65.

Deaths of the coronary artery of the heart was the cause of 45 deaths (1965) - 14, 10 between 15 - 24, 12 between 25 - 34, and 21 over 35 years of age. These deaths were over 50 years of age and of those under 65 were 14 years of age. These figures, although low, are a reflection of the high standard of modern obstetric practice.

Mr. Mayor, Alderman and Councillors,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report for the year 1966.

Population

The Register General's estimate of the mid-year Home Population was 11,110 which represents an increase of 120 over that of the previous year.

Live Births and Rate

The number of live-births was 139 (81M. 58F.) which was a decrease of 14 from that of the previous year, and the crude birth-rate was accordingly 11.50; after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor which is computed from a population standardised for age and sex distribution, the rate becomes 16.68 and was lower than that of 17.7 for England and Wales.

Stillbirths and Rate

The number of stillbirths was 2 (2 M.) and the stillbirth rate was 14.11 being slightly lower than that of 15.4 for England and Wales.

Infantile Mortality and Rate

3 infant deaths were registered due to:-

Asphyxia due to Fulminating Trachea-Bronchitis

Prematurity - Twin Pregnancy - 5 hours

The infantile mortality rate was accordingly 21.58 compared with that of 19.0 for England and Wales.

The hard core of Perinatal Mortality (i.e. stillbirths and infant deaths under one week of age) is prematurity, asphyxia and atelectasis, birth injuries and congenital malformations and the chief maternal factor is toxæmia of pregnancy. Regard however, should be given to the fact that these statistics are too small for valid comparisons.

Maternal Deaths and Mortality Rate

This rate was again nil as there were no deaths from Pregnancy, Childbirth and Abortion, and is a reflection of the high standard of modern obstetric practice.

Deaths and Death Rate

The total number of deaths from all causes was 190 (90 M. 100 F.) and the crude death rate was accordingly 17.01 which is an index of the higher proportion of elderly people resident in the Borough; after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor as for births the rate becomes 9.02 and was lower than that of 11.7 for England and Wales.

The chief group cause of deaths, as naturally would be expected, was Heart and Circulatory Diseases and Vascular Lesions of the Nervous System, as these are the most common ultimate causes of death amongst the aged; of those there were 107.

Disease of the Coronary Artery of the Heart was the cause of 44 deaths; 1 between 45 - 54, 10 between 55 - 64, 10 between 65 - 74, and 23 over 75 years. 33 of those deaths were over 65 years of age and of these latter 23 were over 75 years of age. These figures, although too small for any

valid inference, indicate that Coronary Thrombosis is primarily a degenerative or senile disease.

Cancer, as invariably in previous years, was the second highest cause of deaths of which there were 38. The age-groups were as follow: 1 between 25 - 34, 2 between 45 - 54, 3 between 55 - 64, 8 between 65 - 74, and 7 over 75 years.

Cancer of the Lung/Bronchus was the cause of 6 deaths (6M.), in the following age-groups: 4 between 65 - 74 and 2 over 75 years.

Cancer of the Breast was the cause of 8 deaths, in comparatively young age groups, i.e. 2 between 45 - 54, 1 between 55 - 64, 2 between 65 - 74 years and 3 75 and over. It is reasonable to assume that the patients sought medical advice too late, having regard to the facts that Cancer of the Breast is an insidious disease, although easy to diagnose.

Cancer of the Stomach was the cause of 3 deaths in the following age-groups; 1 between 55 - 64, 2 between 65 - 74 years of age.

The other causes of death were miscellaneous and there was no exceptional mortality; there was no death due to Infectious Disease.

Infectious Disease

Measles

Thirty-one cases were notified in comparison with 174 in the previous year. I have repeatedly stated that this infection should not be statutorily notifiable for the reasons that even during non-epidemic periods, Practitioners and their Secretaries are fully engaged as also are the Administrative Staffs, who are obliged to register the names and addresses of the patients and arrange the payments of the notifications which is unnecessary expenditure.

Scarlet Fever

Six cases of this infection were notified. This disease which formerly was serious owing to its various complications, is now comparatively mild and the great majority are treated at home with specific Antibiotics or Sulpha drugs.

Dysentery (Shigella Sonnei)

Eight cases of this bowel infection were notified.

Acute Primary or Influenzal Pneumonia

Three cases of this illness were notified. Including the secondary Pneumonias, which are not notifiable, there were eleven deaths all in the age-group 75 years and over. Pneumonia is a common cause of death in old age.

Tuberculosis

Three new cases of Respiratory Tuberculosis were notified in the age-groups 1 between 25 - 34; 1 between 65 - 74 and 1 75 years and over.

No new cases of non-Respiratory Tuberculosis were notified.

There were two deaths from non-Respiratory Tuberculosis.

In conclusion, I would take this opportunity of thanking you for your support and interest in the Public Health Department and also the staff for their co-operation and very efficient service.

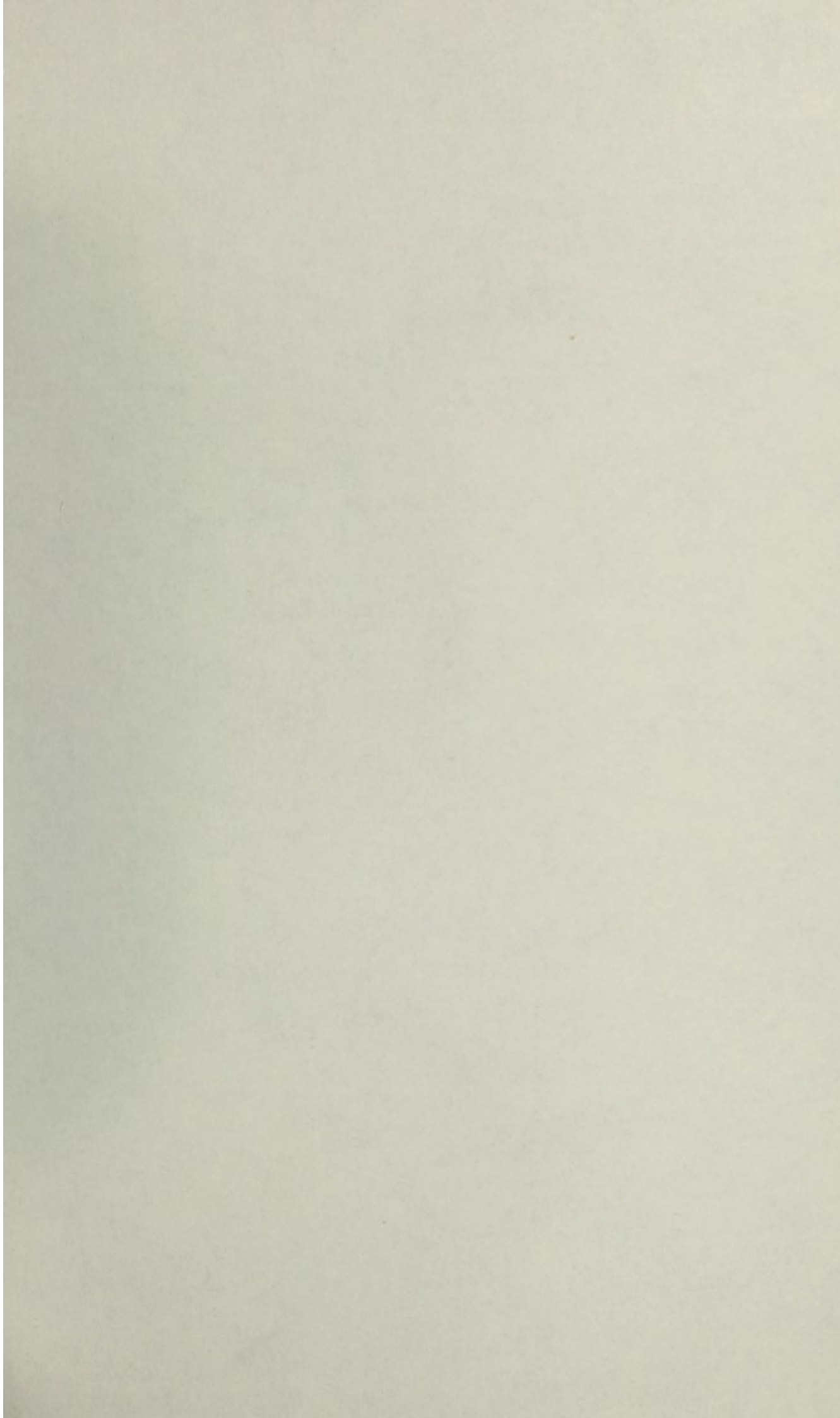
