Annual Reports of the Medical Officer of Health and Chief Public Health Inspector for the Year 1967

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report for the year 1967.

Population

The Registrar General's estimate of the mid-year Home Population was 11,180 which represents an increase of 70 over that of the previous year.

Live Births and Rate

The number of live-births was 133 (69M. 64F) which was an increase of 1 over that of the previous year, and the crude birth-rate was accordingly 13.0; after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor which is computed from a population standardised for age and sex distribution, the rate becomes 18.90 and was higher than that of 17.2 for England and Wales.

Stillbirths and Rate

The number of stillbirths was 2 (2M.) and the stillbirth rate was 14.0 compared with a rate of 14.8 for England and Wales.

Infantile Mortality and Rate

Four infant deaths were registered due to:-

Prematurity: Maternal Toxaemia of Pregnancy: - 4 days

Meningo-myelocele - 1 week

Intracranial Haemorrhage: Birth Injury: - 6 hours

Atelectasis: Prematurity: - 7 hours

The infant mortality rate was accordingly 28.0 compared with that of 18.3 for England and Wales.

The hard core of Perinatal Mortality (i.e. stillbirths and infant deaths under one week of age) is prematurity, asphyxia and atelectasis, birth injuries and congenital malformations and the chief maternal factor is toxaemia of pregnancy. (Regard, however, should be given to the fact that these statistics are too small for valid comparisons.)

Maternal Deaths and Mortality Rate

This rate was again nil as there were no deaths from Pregnancy, Childbirth and Abortion, and is a reflection of the high standard of modern obstetric practice.

Deaths and Death Rate

The total number of deaths from all causes was 188 (74M. 115 F.) and the crude death rate was accordingly 16.8 which is an index of the higher proportion of elderly people resident in the Borough; after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor as for births the rate becomes 8.9 and was lower than that of 11.2 for England and Wales.

The chief group cause of deaths, as naturally would be expected, was Heart and Circulatory Diseases and Vascular Lesions of the Nervous System, as these are the most common causes of death amongst the aged; of those there were 99.

Disease of the Coronary Artery of the Heart was the cause of 40 deaths; 1 between 35 - 44 years of age; 5 between 55 - 64; 15 between 65 - 74 and 19 over 75 years. 34 of those deaths were over 65 years of age. These figures, although too small for any valid inference, indicate that Coronary Thrombosis is primarily a degenerative or senile disease.

Cancer, as invariably in previous years, was the second highest cause of deaths of which there were 38. The age-groups were as follow:13 between 55 - 64; 11 between 65 - 74 and 14 over 75 years.

Cancer of the Lung/Bronchus was the cause of 8 deaths (5 M. 3 F.) in the following age-groups: 3 between 55 - 64; 4 between 65 - 74 and 1 over 75 years.

Cancer of the Breast was the cause of 4 deaths, in the following age groups, i.e. 1 between 55 - 64 and 3 over 75 years. It is reasonable to assume that the patients sought medical advice too late, having regard to the facts that Cancer of the Breast is an insidious disease, although easy to diagnose.

Cancer of the Stomach was the cause of 3 deaths in the following age-groups: 1 between 55 - 64 and 2 over 75 years.

The other causes of death were miscellaneous and there was no exceptional mortality; there was no death due to Infectious Disease.

Infectious Disease

Measles

Two hundred and twenty-two cases were notified in comparison with 31 in the previous year.

This infection per se is not serious these days, and its formerly serious complications are becoming less frequent and when they do occur are treated successfully by specific Antibiotics, excepting Acute Encephalitis which is very rare.

It is equivocal whether this infection should be statutorily notifiable, as even in non-epidemic periods Practitioners are otherwise fully engaged; also unnecessary time is taken up by Office Staffs in the registration of these notifications and in the unnecessary disbursement of fees.

Scarlet Fever

Nine cases were notified. This illness is now mild and its formerly serious complications are becoming infrequent; if any does occur, treatment by a specific anti-biotic is invariably successful.

Whooping Cough

Sixteen cases were notified. In former years outbreaks of this distressful children's disease were common and there was a large number of deaths chiefly due to Broncho-pneumonia.

Erysipelas

One case of this infection of the skin was notified. Before the introduction of the Sulpha Drugs in 1936 and later of the Antibiotics, this was a serious disease and was the cause of many deaths.

Food Poisoning

One case of Food Poisoning, in an adult, was notified. This was due to the Salmonella Typhi-murium organism.

Acute Primary or Influenzal Pneumonia

Two cases of this illness were notified. Including the secondary Pneumonias, which are not notifiable, there were twelve deaths in the following age-groups: 2 between 55 - 64; 4 between 65 - 74 and 6 over 75 years of age.

Tuberculosis

One new case of Respiratory Tuberculosis was notified and the patient was over 75 years of age.

No new cases of non-Respiratory Tuberculosis were notified.

No deaths occurred during the year from Respiratory or non-Respiratory Tuberculosis.

In conclusion, I would take this opportunity of thanking you for your support and interest in the Fublic Health Department and also the staff for their co-operation and very efficient service.

The borough of Hythe is largely a residential District, by the sea, and during the holiday months, attracts many visitors. There are a few light industries, including a Brewery, two Laundries, a Plastics Firm, a School of Infantry, and domestic trades. The standard of housing in the Borough has been maintained by the Council at a very high level due to long-term pre-war planning and as a consequence there are no slum clearance areas. There is little unemployment in the District and social conditions are generally very satisfactory.
