Live Births and Rate

The number of live-births was 152 (89 M, 63 F.) which was an increase of 10 over that of the previous year, and the crude birth rate was accordingly 17.0; after adjustment by the Registrar General's Separability Factor which is computed from a population standardized for age and sex distribution, the rate became 19.5 and was slightly higher than that of 16.0 for England and Wales.

Stillbirths and Rate

The number of stillbirths was 1 (M) and the stillbirth rate was 7.0 compared with a rate of 13.0 for England and Wales.

### Annual Reports of the Medical Officer of Health and Chief Public Health Inspector for the Year 1970

Mr. Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors,

I have the honour to present to you my Annual Report for the year 1970.

#### Population

The Registrar General's estimate of the mid-year Home Population was 11,860 which represents an increase of 160 over that of the previous year.

#### Live Births and Rate

The number of live-births was 152 (89 M. 63 F.) which was an increase of 10 over that of the previous year, and the crude birth-rate was accordingly 12.8; after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor which is computed from a population standardised for age and sex distribution, the rate becomes 19.5 and was slightly higher than that of 16.0 for England and Wales.

#### Stillbirths and Rate

The number of stillbirths was 1(M) and the stillbirth rate was 7.0 compared with a rate of 13.0 for England and Wales.

The infant mortality rate was accordingly 46.0 compared with that of 18.0 for England and Wales.

The hard core of Perinatal Mortality (i.e. stillbirths and infant deaths under one week of age) is prematurity, asphyxia and atelectasis, birth injuries and congenital malformations and the chief maternal factor is toxæmia of pregnancy. (Regard, however, should be given to the fact that these statistics are too small for valid comparisons).



## Maternal Deaths and Mortality Rate

This rate was again nil as there were no deaths from Pregnancy, Childbirth and Abortion, and is a reflection of the high standard of modern obstetric practice.

## Deaths and Death Rate

The total number of deaths from all causes was 229 (116 M. 113 F.) and the crude death rate was accordingly 19.1 which is an index of the higher proportion of elderly people resident in the Borough; after adjustment by the Registrar General's Comparability Factor as for births the rate becomes 9.9 and was lower than that of 11.7 for England and Wales.

The chief group cause of deaths, as naturally would be expected, was Heart and Circulatory Disease and Vascular Lesions of the Nervous System, as these are the most common causes of death amongst the aged; of those there were 102.

Ischaemic Heart Disease (i.e. Coronary Thrombosis and Coronary Atheroma) was the cause of 58 deaths in the following age-groups:- 1 between 45 - 54; 11 between 55 - 64; 21 between 65 - 74 and 25 over 75 years. Forty-six of those deaths were over 65 years of age. These figures, although too small for any valid inference, indicate that Ischaemic Heart disease is primarily a degenerative or senile disease.

Cancer, as invariably in previous years, was the second highest cause of deaths of which there were 38. The age-groups were as follows:- 7 between 55 - 64; 12 between 65 - 74 and 19 over 75 years.

Cancer of the Lung/Bronchus was the cause of 18 deaths (16 M. 2 F.) in the following age-groups; 4 between 55 - 64; 7 between 65 - 74; and 7 over 75 years of age.

Cancer of the Breast was the cause of 4 deaths in the following age-groups:- 1 between 55 - 64 and 3 over 75 years of age.

Cancer of the Stomach was the cause of 1 death in the 65 - 74 years of age group.

The other causes of death were miscellaneous and there was no exceptional mortality; there was no death due to Infectious Disease.

## Tuberculosis

There was one new case (1M.) aged 57 years of Respiratory Tuberculosis.

Two deaths occurred during the year, 1(M) 74 years of age (Non-Pulmonary Tuberculosis) and 1(M) 87 years of age (Pulmonary Tuberculosis).



This disease, which in past history has been a scourge of man, and was known as the 'White Plague' is in these days almost completely under control, by prevention (including the elimination of housing overcrowding and a higher standard of living), and by treatment. Since 1950, the number of cases amongst adolescents amongst whom it was most common, has gradually decreased to a minimum. Protection of school children by B.C.G. vaccination, which is offered to those aged 13 years and over, has been an important factor.

#### Food Poisoning

There was only one case of Food Poisoning notified during the year - a child of 4 years of age who had recently returned from Cyprus and was notified as suffering from Salmonella Typhi-Murium. The fact that there were no other cases within the Borough was due to the efficiency and vigilance of the Public Health Inspectorate.

A new era in the history of the prevalence of serious Infectious Diseases has been reached, in prevention and treatment. For example, the remarkable advance in this Century of medical science, with emphasis on the last 40 years, has prevented by vaccination and immunisation lethal and disabling infections such as Poliomyelitis, Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and recently Measles and German Measles and by treatment with specific Anti-biotics and Sulpha drugs, diseases caused by bacteria such as Acute Meningitis, the Pneumonias, Puerperal Sepsis, Scarlet Fever, Erysipelas, Typhoid and Paratyphoid Fevers and Food Poisoning etc.

Influenza, which is still epidemic in the winter months is by and large the most dangerous infection and it is still equivocal whether vaccination is preventive, unless a vaccine specific to the strain which is likely to become epidemic is prepared in time before the epidemic occurs. Fortunately there was no epidemic last winter.

All virus infections per se do not respond to treatment by the Anti-biotics or Sulpha drugs, but fortunately serious complications caused by bacteria usually respond successfully to treatment.

Vaccination against the virus of Measles has recently been introduced, and it is expected that the biennial outbreaks which occur will be eventually controlled. Vaccination is available at the Child Welfare Clinics and from the Family Doctor.

Vaccination against German Measles has been recently introduced for girls aged about 13 - 14 years who might in later years suffer from the infection during pregnancy and give birth to a baby with congenital defects.

In conclusion, I would take this opportunity of thanking you for your support and interest in the Public Health Department and also the staff for their co-operation and very efficient service.

SOCIAL CONDITIONS

The Borough of Hythe is largely a residential district, by the sea, and during the holiday months, attracts many visitors. There are a few light industries, including a light Engineering Works, two Laundries, a Joinery Works, a Plastics Firm and various domestic trades. The Brewery no longer functions as such and the School of Infantry, long established in the Borough, has moved to a new area.

The standard of housing in the Borough has been maintained by the Council at a very high level due to long term pre-war planning and as a consequence there are no slum clearance areas. All pre-war Council houses lacking bathrooms etc. have now been modernised with the aid of government grant.

There is still some unemployment in the Borough, although unemployment figures remain the same as for last year. Social conditions are generally very satisfactory.
