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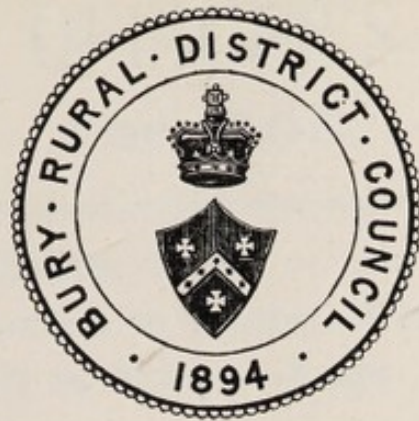

To the Rural District Council of Bury,

MR. CHAIRMAN AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit my Report to you on the Health and Sanitary condition of the District for the year 1908.

The District is a wide and scattered one, being composed of all that part of the Bury Union which is not Urban. It lies at an altitude varying from 125 feet at Molyneux, to 1500 feet above sea level, at Whittle Pike, Shuttleworth.

The Rainfall in the County Borough of Bury, which the Rural District surrounds, for 1908 was 39·5 inches. The greatest rainfall occurred in the month of July, and was 5·02 inches, and the least in October which was 1·83 inches. Rain fell on 192 days during the year.

The District embraces both agricultural and industrial communities. The chief centres of population are in parts of each of the various localities especially Ainsworth, Bamford, Outwood, and Unsworth, also Birtle, and Walmersley to a certain extent. The inhabitants in these centres of population are mainly employed in textile industries. Surrounding these centres agriculture, in the shape of Milk Farms, is carried on to a considerable extent. The milk produced, in addition to supplying the inhabitants, is carried for sale to the various Urban Districts in the neighbourhood.

Birth Rate.—I am glad to be able to report a considerable increase, though even now it is very low. This year 199 births were registered and consisted of 118 males and 81 females, giving a Birth Rate of 23·4 per 1000 living compared with 18·3 per 1000 in 1907.

The average rate for five years 1904 to 1908 is 20·1 per 1000 persons living.

Two illegitimate births were registered during the year, which is at the rate of just over 1 per cent. of the total births.

Crude Death Rate.—The total number of deaths registered in the district during the year was 105, of which 56 were males and 49 females, giving a crude death rate of 12·3 per 1000 persons living. This is 1·6 per 1000 lower than in 1907.

Corrected Death Rate.—In addition to these 105 deaths there were 9 other deaths of persons usually resident in the district, which occurred in public institutions in other districts, making altogether 114 deaths of residents and giving a Corrected Death Rate of 13·4 per 1000 per annum. This is a decrease compared with last year when it was 14·9. The average death rate for five years 1904 to 1908 is 13·5 per 1000. Infantile Mortality.—I have again to report a considerable decrease in the Infantile Mortality. During the year 16 deaths of children under one year old have been registered, which is equal to a rate of 80·4 deaths per 1000 births registered, compared with 101·9 per 1000 in 1907, and an average rate for the five years 1904 to 1908 of 114·5 per 1000.

There were three deaths among illegitimate children.

These 16 deaths occurred at the following ages ; 8 under 1 month ; 2 between 1 and 3 months ; 1 between 3 and 6 months ; 3 between 6 and 9 months ; and 2 between 9 and 12 months. The causes of the deaths were 1 from Whooping Cough, 4 from Diarrhoea and Enteritis, 1 from Erysipelas, 3 from Premature Birth, 3 from Marasmus, 1 from Bronchitis, and 3 from other causes.

Mortality under Five Years of age.—28 out of the total deaths have occurred among children under 5 years of age, which is at the rate of 24·5 per cent. of the total deaths, as compared with 20·6 per cent. in 1907.

Mortality over Sixty-five years of age.—There were 37 deaths of persons over 65 years of age, giving a rate of 32·4 per cent. of the total deaths compared with 29·3 per cent. in 1907.

Zymotic Death Rate.—The principal zymotic diseases caused 9 deaths during the year, viz. : 2 from Diphtheria, 1 from Whooping Cough, 1 from Enteric Fever, 2 from Erysipelas, and 4 from Diarrhoea, giving a rate of 1·06 per 1000 persons living, or 7·8 per cent. of the total deaths.

Phthisis and other Tubercular Diseases have caused 8 deaths, giving a rate of ·94 per 1000, or 7·1 per cent. of the total deaths. This is the same as last year.

Cancer and other Malignant Diseases have been the cause of 5 deaths, which is ·58 per 1000 persons living or 4·3 per cent. of the total deaths.

Diseases of the Respiratory Organs have caused 19 deaths during the year, being at the rate of 2·2 per 1000 persons living, or 16·6 per cent. of the total deaths.

Notifications of Infectious Diseases.—22 cases have been notified during the year as compared with 19 cases in 1907. Up to nearly the end of November, only 13 cases had been notified, and then Scarlatina, which had been prevalent in neighbouring districts for some time, broke out in Ainsworth and Unsworth causing 8 notifications before the end of the year. Up to the end of November it had only been necessary to remove one case to Hospital, viz: from Ainsworth, in March, but, of the 8 mentioned above, I considered it advisable to remove 7 to the Infectious Hospital. Of these 4 were from Ainsworth and 3 from Unsworth. I am of opinion that by this means what threatened to be a somewhat serious epidemic, was prevented.

No epidemics necessitating the closing of any of the Elementary Schools have occurred during the year.

Water Supply.—Most of the district is supplied by the Bury and District Joint Water Board, but Ainsworth receives some of its supply from Bolton, and Bamford from the Heywood and

Middleton Water Board. Most of the farms and the outlying parts of the district have private supplies. On the whole the service has been satisfactory.

Drainage.—Improved means for the treatment of sewage have been, or will be, provided in various parts of the district. Tanks and cinder beds have been laid down at Hollins and Blackford Brow, works are in progress both at Bamford and at Parrs, and a Local Government Board Inquiry has been held with reference to a scheme for the treatment of the Ainsworth Sewage, in conjunction with Brightmet, part of the Borough of Bolton. The reports of the Inspectors of the Mersey and Irwell Committee on the effluent from the sewage works at Prestolee have not been as satisfactory as usual. This is owing to the beds being overworked on account of the considerable increase in the populations in that district. An extension of the drainage scheme there in the near future will be necessary. The provision of a sewage scheme for Ringley is also under consideration.

The Farms have been inspected in the usual routine manner and have been found in a fairly satisfactory condition as regards the sanitary arrangements and cleanliness of the shippens. Improvements have been carried out at 12 farms during the year, and in 8 other instances alterations are in contemplation.

There are now 99 on the Register of Dairymen, Cowkeepers, and Milksellers, 8 have been added during the year.

Elementary Schools.—There are six elementary schools in the district, viz: at Ainsworth, Buchurst, Hollins, Unsworth, Ringley, and Turn. These have been inspected during the year and found in a satisfactory condition on the whole. It would, however, conduce to the welfare of the children if the privy middens which are in use in most of them were done away with, and more sanitary arrangements provided.

Factory and Workshop Act.—The usual inspections have been carried out, and both factories and workshops have been found in good sanitary condition. There are 35 factories and 22 workshops in the district. They are situated in the various localities as follows :

The factories consist of 3 spinning mills, 6 cotton weaving sheds, 1 woollen mill, 2 fulling mills, 5 dyeworks, 2 calico print works, 6 bleach works, 2 wheelwright shops, 2 joiners shops, 1 terra-cotta and brick works, 1 engineer's shop, 3 quarries, and 1 firelighter's shop.

The workshops number 22 and consist of 3 dressmakers, 1 barber, 10 clog and shoemakers, 1 undertaker, 2 painters, 2 breweries, 1 tripe-dresser, 1 bakehouse, and 1 plumber.

Three complaints have been received from His Majesty's Inspector of Factories. One of these referred to the means of escape in case of fire, the other two to Sanitary conditions, They have all received attention.

There are no outworkers in the district.

Dairies and Cowsheds.

These have been periodically inspected and am able to report that many improvements have been made to the water supply, light ventilation, and air space; and am again contemplating more improvements to eight others this coming year. Eight Cow-keepers and Dairymen have been registered under the Dairies and Milkshops Orders of 1885 and the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Acts 1875 and 1886 this year, bringing the total for the whole district to ninety nine.

House Dwellings.

Large quantities of disinfectants have been distributed and in infectious cases special care has been taken to ensure its proper use both in schools and dwellings. Old back to back dwellings have been demolished and new modern property erected. Samples of well water have been analysed and steps taken to improve the existing supply. The Sewering of Bamford and Unsworth is in the hands of the Contractors and am expecting a very considerable number of drains of dwellings coupled up before long.

Factories and Workshops.

The complaints made by H. M. Inspector of Factories during the year have received attention from the Owners and have been remedied, on the whole they are well ventilated, and kept in a much improved sanitary condition. Smoke observations have been taken and have been free from complaints from the ratepayers this year.

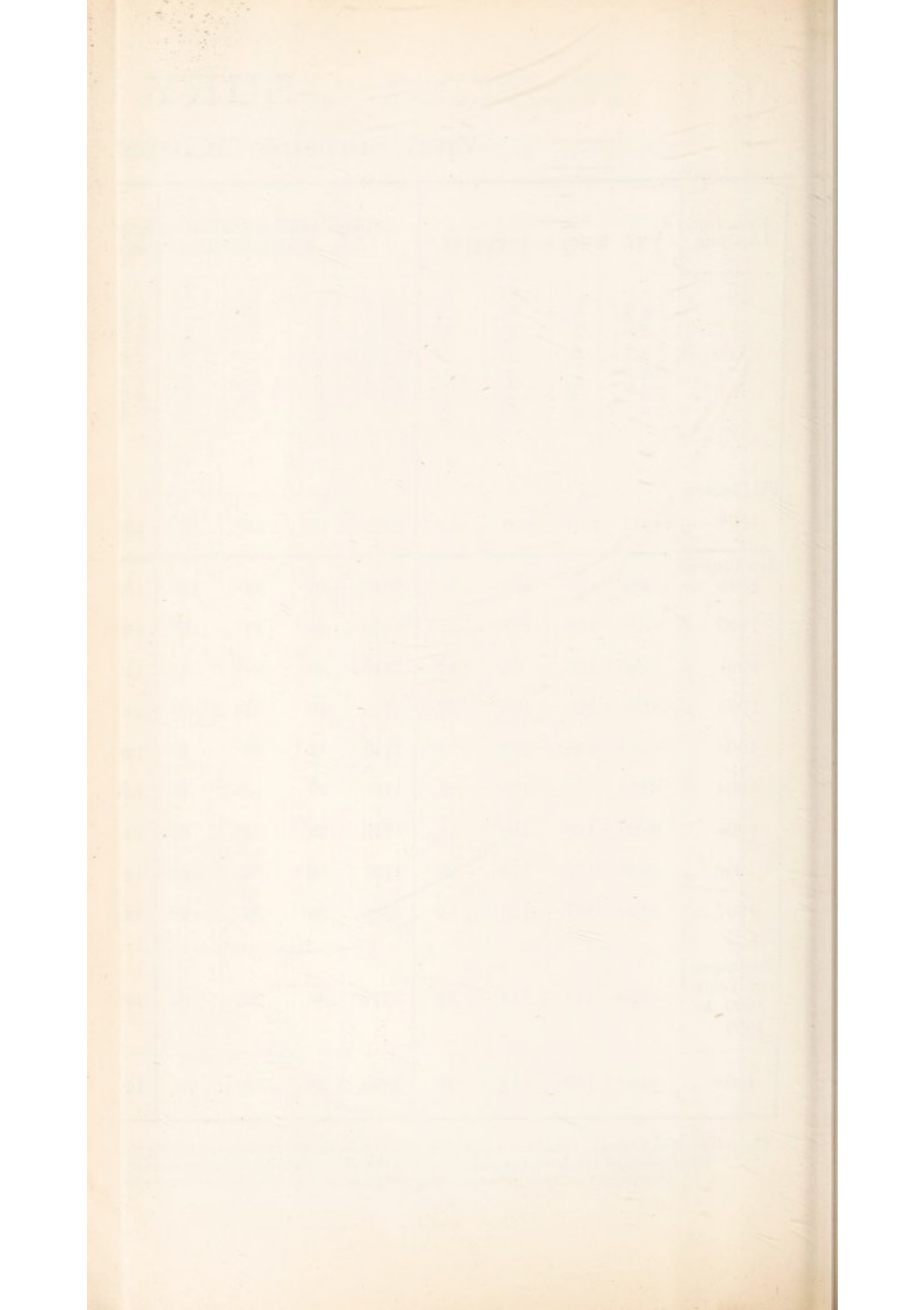
