

I beg to present my Sixteenth Annual Report which deals with the Health and Sanitary Condition of the Ilfracombe Urban District Council during the year ended 31st December, 1941.

The Report is constructed on the lines indicated in the Memorandum issued by the Ministry of Health and is an Interim one.

The work at the Isolation Hospital was carried out in a most satisfactory manner by the Matron, Miss G. Carrick who had to contend with considerable difficulties in the way of getting suitable staff.

I desire to acknowledge the very valuable and willing help given by Miss Dean, Commandant, and members of the Red Cross Detachment in connection with the Immunisation Scheme, Scabies Centre and in other ways.

Owing to the very large amount of work thrown on the department in consequence of war conditions the amount of ordinary work has had to be curtailed but all essential duties have received attention.

Diphtheria Immunisation.

The Council authorised a scheme of free immunisation against diphtheria, public notice having been given of this, applications were received through the schools and directly through the Health Office. The following numbers of children were dealt with;

Scabies.

Owing to present day conditions a number of cases of scabies occurred in the town, it became necessary for the Local Authority to undertake treatment of these and a cleansing station was established which was staffed voluntarily by members of the Red Cross Detachment.

A total of 87 cases was treated during the year.

Bacteriological Examination of Milk.

The Methylene Blue Reduction Test is used for all samples.

37 samples were submitted to the County Bacteriologist, 23 of these passed and 14 failed.

Tuberculosis Examination of Milk samples.

2 samples were taken from bulk supplies of milk and forwarded to the County Bacteriologist to be examined for the presence of tubercle bacilli by means of guinea pig inoculation. Both samples gave negative results.

Shops Act, 1934. 275 inspections were made in accordance with this Act, insanitary conditions were found on eight premises, the person responsible was notified and all insanitary conditions have been remedied.

Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

16 formal samples of milk were obtained and submitted for analysis, in all cases the report showed the sample to be genuine milk. In consequence of a complaint that milk was suspected to have been manufactured from milk powder an informal sample of this was obtained and forwarded to the Public Analyst who reported there was no evidence that the milk had been made from dried milk and water. The average composition of the 17 samples was:—

Non-fatty milk solids .. 8'87 per cent. Milk-fat 3'92 per cent.

Public Cleansing.

The collection of house and trade refuse is carried out by a contractor working under the supervision of the Sanitary Inspector. Modern vehicles of rear loading type and fitted with movable rubber floors are in use and have proved efficient. 1,520 loads of house refuse and 98 loads of trade refuse were collected during the year.

Salvage work has been continued throughout the year and from the beginning of April a separate staff were engaged in this work, the following table gives the amount of material salvaged together with its value.
