Deaths from Violence.

SUICIDE. Two deaths occurred among males, namely, by inhaling coal-gas, and cut-throat. One female death was due to inhaling coal-gas.

Other Deaths from Violence.

There was a total of 12 deaths. Of these four were due to road traffic accidents, viz., two motor cyclists collided with buses, and one cyclist aged 16 and one child of 2 were run over by buses. Of the other eight two were colliery accidents, four were due to accidental falls, and two children were drowned in the canal.

SECTION II

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES.

Hospitals. There was no change with regard to hospital provision. The number of applicants whose bookings were refused at the Maternity Home was 67.

Ambulances. The Morris ambulance was still in commission for fever cases. A Red Cross Society Ambulance was available for accident cases.

Nursing in the Home was provided by two Nursing Associations.

LABORATORY FACILITIES were available at Nottingham and Derby.

Midwives. These were under the supervision of the County Council.

SECTION III

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER. There was no change in the source or storage arrangements. The quantity was adequate and there were no restrictions as to use. The quality was satisfactory as proved by the regular analysis of samples.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL. This was satisfactory.

Refuse Disposal. Collection was carried out by a contractor and the refuse was disposed of in a satisfactory manner by controlled tipping on Corporation tips.

Sanitary Inspection of the Area. The results of the year's work is shown in the table at the end of this report.

SECTION V.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

MILK. The number of cowkeepers registered with this Authority was 12, and the number of retail purveyors of milk was 54. Three designated milk licences were issued, namely, one for Tuberculin Tested Milk and two for Pasteurized Milk. There were two licensed producers of Pasteurized Milk. Samples of all kinds were submitted for biological and bacteriological tests during the year. No samples showed the presence of the tubercle bacillus.

MEAT AND OTHER FOODS. In accordance with the Livestock (Restriction on Slaughtering) Order, 1940, all slaughtering of animals for human food in this Area was carried out at the government controlled slaughterhouses in Derby after the 21st January except for a certain number of pigs which were slaughtered under licence issued by the Ministry of Food. The meat was distributed by the local Butchers' Association Committee after inspection at the place of slaughter.

A large quantity of other food was inspected locally. The amount of unsound food surrendered during the year is shown below.

SECTION VI.

INFECTIOUS AND OTHER DISEASES.

The number of infectious diseases notified was 807. There was an epidemic of measles, of which disease 625 cases were notified but there was only one death. There were 42 cases of scarlet fever and 38 cases of chickenpox.

OPHTHALMIA NEONATORUM. No cases occurred.

INFLUENZA was prevalent and there were 11 deaths.

CANCER. There were 41 deaths from malignant disease which was an average figure. The sites affected according to age and sex are shown in the general table of deaths.

DIPHTHERIA. Only 3 cases were notified and there was no death.

CEREBRO-SPINAL FEVER. Five cases occurred with one death.

At the Isolation Hospital 30 cases were treated, namely, Scarlet Fever 22, Diphtheria 5, Cerebro-Spinal Fever 3.

SECTION VII.

TUBERCULOSIS.

Notification. The number of new cases of respiratory tuberculosis were in the case of males 11, and in the case of females 9. As regards the non-respiratory form, 3 male and 2 female cases occurred.

Deaths. There was a total of 21 deaths. Nineteen were due to the respiratory form, and 2 to non-respiratory forms. All the deaths except three had been notified previously as being cases of tuberculosis.

TREATMENT. The arrangements were as in former years. There were 20 fresh cases of pulmonary tuberculosis added to the Register during the year, and of these 8 patients were admitted to the Sanatorium and 1 to an Institution. Of 5 fresh non-respiratory cases added to the Register 1 was treated at a general hospital. Out of the 25 fresh cases 9 patients died within six months. At the end of 1940 there was a total of 140 persons on the Register. Of these 106 were pulmonary cases and 34 were non-pulmonary cases.

SECTION VIII.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

ANTE-NATAL CARE. One ante-natal session was held every week by the specialist medical officer, Dr. Margaret Glen Bott. The total attendances at the 50 sessions were 1,009 and the average number of patients at each session was 20. The number of individual patients who attended during the year was 332 and of these 264 were new cases. The number of expectant mothers who attended the ante-natal clinic represented 66.4 per cent of the total 500 notified live and still births which occurred in the borough during the year. The number of cases who were sent to hospital on account of expected difficulty was 31 and a Cæsarean operation was performed in 6 cases. X-Ray examinations were made as regards 8 patients.

Municipal Maternity Home.

During the year 138 cases were admitted. No maternal death occurred and there was one case of puerperal pyrexia. The number of bookings refused was 67, which shows the urgent need for increased accommodation. The statistics for 1940 are given below.

MATERNITY OUTFITS.—Complete maternity outfits are kept in the health department and can be loaned to necessitous cases.

Infant Welfare Centres. A Child Welfare Clinic is held every Tuesday afternoon at the Albert Street Clinic and every Thursday afternoon at the Cotmanhay Clinic.

Puerperal Pyrexia and Puerperal Fever.—Arrangements exist for the treatment of these cases in the Derbyshire Hospital for Women at Derby. There is also a consulting obstetrician whose opinion and assistance can be obtained in complicated cases. Seven cases of puerperal pyrexia were notified. Of these 5 were treated at home and 2 in hospital.

MATERNAL DEATHS.—No maternal death occurred during 1940.

Infantile Deaths.—The deaths of infants under one year of age are enquired into by the health visitors, and their reports are examined by the medical officer in conjunction with the child welfare record card of the infant. The infant mortality rate of 98.15 has not been so high since 1925. The large number of infantile deaths from pneumonia and bronchitis may have been due to the very severe winter. The cause of prematurity and congenital defects is not completely known, but the fact that this year was probably the most anxious and difficult year of the war may be the cause of the increase in deaths from those conditions. The still-birth rate was also higher than usual, and perhaps for the same reason.

Free Supply of Milk.—Under the provisions of the Public Health Act, 1936, free milk was issued in necessitous cases to expectant and nursing mothers and to children under 5 years of age recommended by medical officers. In all cases enquiries are made into the means of the family and issues are made in accordance with an approved scale. The number of applications in respect of which milk was issued was 29. The small number is due to the fact that other arrangements for the supply of milk to children have been made by the Ministry of Food.

CHILD LIFE PROTECTION, ADOPTED CHILDREN, ILLEGITIMATE CHILDREN.—The Health Visitors carry out duties in connection with the above.

Orthopaedic Clinic.

Sanitary Supervision of Music Halls, Theatres, etc.

CINEMAS. The Scala, Kings Picture House, New Theatre and Ritz Cinema have been inspected from time to time during the year, both during performances and at times when the premises were not open to the Public. No cause for complaint was found.

The Young Persons (Employment) Act, 1938, regulates the hours of young persons employed in certain occupations which have hitherto been unregulated, including assistants to Cinema Operators.

Section 8 of the Act gives Employers the option to apply either the above mentioned Act or the Shops Acts in certain cases.

At the Kings Picture House and the New Theatre the records kept are those required by the Young Persons (Employment) Act, 1938.

The Ritz Cinema Co., Ltd., has elected to apply the provisions of the Shops Act to their employees, and the Notices as required by that Act are exhibited.

The Scala Picture House Co. has no assistants under the age of 18.

Premises with Music and Dancing Licences.

During the year there has been one addition to these Premises, namely, the New Co-operative Hall owned by the Ilkeston Co-operative Society, Ltd. This has been inspected and found to be satisfactory. The Licence was granted in April last.

The other Licensed Premises have given no cause for complaint during the year.

An Annual Report is submitted to the Health Committee and the Local Licensing Bench in accordance with the Circular 120 of the Ministry of Health, 1920.

Canal Boats (Public Health Act, 1936, Sections 249 to 258).

During the year I have only been able to inspect four Canal Boats, two of these were Boats registered as Dwellings, the other two were not registered Boats, as they were only being used for short hauls.

So far as the two registered Boats are concerned they were registered to carry six adults and the number of occupants at the time of inspection was two.

The Certificate of Registration for each Boat was produced at the time of inspection, identifying the Owner and the Boat; the boats were properly marked, clean and in good repair. Neither persons appeared to be suffering from any infectious diseases.

No Boats were registered or removed from the Register during the year.

I. STAFF.

Particulars regarding the staff of the school medical department are given on a previous page. Miss Blair retired after nearly 18 years of conscientious service as a school nurse and health visitor. Her place was filled by the appointment of Miss Kearney.

II. CO-ORDINATION.

This was well maintained during the year.

III. SCHOOL HYGIENE.

The fact that some schools were taken for other purposes caused a certain amount of overcrowding in some schools. All schools possess a piped water supply of good quality and all except Kirk Hallam have a water carriage system of sewage disposal. Cloakroom accommodation and arrangements for washing should be brought up to modern standards in the older schools. Gas lighting where present should be replaced by electricity.

IV. MEDICAL INSPECTION.

Routine medical inspections of the customary age groups was carried out. Re-inspections and special inspections were made as usual.

V. FINDINGS OF MEDICAL INSPECTIONS.

- (a) NUTRITION. The results are shown in Table II.B. The children were well nourished.

- (d) Tuberculosis.—There was one new respiratory case and two new non-respiratory cases among school children. The two latter were cases of adenitis of the neck and meningitis.
- (e) Other Defects. At routine inspections the incidence of defective vision (excluding squint) was 7.8 per cent.

VII. ARRANGEMENTS FOR TREATMENT.

The arrangements were for the most part the same as in previous years.

ORTHOPÆDIC AND POSTURAL DEFECTS.—55 individual children have attended the orthopædic clinic for the following conditions:—Tuberculosis 3, Rickets 4, Poliomyelitis 11, Spastic Paralysis 5, Kyphosis or Scoliosis 9, Congenital Deformity 7, other conditions 16. The number of attendances at Miss Garratt's sessions was 390 and at the surgeon's sessions 132. At Bretby Hall 5 in-patients have been treated as follows:—Poliomyelitis 2, Spastic Paralysis 1, Flat Feet 1, Club Foot 1.

ORTHOPTIC TREATMENT FOR SQUINT.—A new scheme for the orthoptic training of the eye muscles in cases of squint was commenced in July. The treatment is carried out in Derby under arrangements made with the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary. During the year 16 cases of squint were referred for treatment. Of these, 5 were receiving regular treatment at the end of the year, 6 cases were still awaiting treatment, 4 were too young and 1 was being treated by occlusion.

VIII. INFECTIOUS DISEASE.

The number of cases of infectious disease among school children notified during the year was as follows:—Pulmonary Tuberculosis 1, other forms of Tuberculosis 2 (the sites affected being meninges 1, cervical glands 1), Diphtheria 3, Scarlet Fever 28, Chickenpox 16, Pneumonia 3, Measles 309, Erysipelas 1, Meningitis 1, Cerebro-Spinal Fever 1.

There was an epidemic of measles.

IX. PHYSICAL TRAINING.

A satisfactory year's work was carried out by the teachers under the supervision of the two physical training organisers. Six courses of instruction for teachers were held and were well attended. At some schools the proficiency was outstanding. Fresh apparatus was acquired and the equipment was satisfactory. Certain school halls were required for war purposes, but other arrangements were made. Provision for expenditure on gym shoes was made during the year and this will be of great benefit. Full use was made of the playing fields for organised games. The swimming baths were available during the summer and all the senior and junior schools sent organised parties.

X. PROVISION OF MEALS.

School meals were provided as usual in the Gladstone School Canteen. At the end of the year the average attendance for children for free meals was 46 while the average attendance of children for dinners on payment was 42. There was an increase in the number of children who received free milk in school, the daily average at the end of the year being 185.

XI. SPECIAL SCHOOLS.

Three deaf children were residents at the Royal Institute for the Deaf in Derby and one crippled child was resident at a school for physically handicapped children.

APPROVED SCHOOLS.—During the year no fresh children were committed to approved schools by the magistrates. At the end of the year there were 1 child and 2 young persons from this Borough in approved schools.

BOARDED-OUT CHILDREN.—Four fresh children were committed to the care of the Authority during the year and were boarded-out in another district. At the end of the year there were 10 children committed to the care of this Authority who were boarded-out in another district. 12 children from the area of another Authority were boarded-out within the Borough. All the above children have been medically examined.

BLIND CHILDREN.—There were no blind children.

XII. MISCELLANEOUS.

EVACUATION.—During the year 103 children were medically examined with a view to selection for overseas evacuation. Only one child actually went overseas.
