

The health of the townspeople was extremely good during the year.

Three things made it a memorable year. The introduction of decimal currency in February caused considerable discussion at the time but was established quite smoothly. However, the cost of living seemed to rise dramatically at the same time.

The introduction of comprehensive education at the commencement of the Michaelmas Term saw the end of our two Grammar Schools to the regret of many people. It it far too soon to make any judgment as to how the new system is working.

There was a postal strike in the early part of the year which caused considerable delay in the Council's work and led to a certain accumulation of correspondence which eventually was cleared.

### SECTION A

### Statistics and Social Conditions of the Area

Population Following the census, the Registrar General has given the population of Ilminster to be 3,420, an increase on the previous year's estimated figure, which gives a density of 5.5 per acre. The Rateable Value was £150,000 and the product of a new penny rate £1,296.

#### Birth Rate

The corrected Birth Rate was 18.3 per thousand compared with a figure of 16 for England and Wales. There was one illegitimate birth.

### Death Rate

The Corrected Death Rate was 10.5 per thousand compared with a national figure of 11.6. Out of a total of 38 deaths 21 were due to heart disease, 12 were due to cancer of which seven were cancer of the lung. Eight deaths were caused by "strokes" and a further two persons died of diseases of the respiratory system.

The expectation of life at the age on one year in England and Wales is 75.1 years for women and 69.1 for men. This shortfall of life expectancy for men due to smoking related . disease is about two years in Britain. The mortality from smoking related disease in Britain is among the highest in the world. Cigarette smoking is the largest single avoidable cause of death in Britain today. Tobacco smoke is the most dangerous pollutant widely dispersed in Britain. It is, of course a pollutant of many enclosed spaces, including Committee rooms, and there is some evidence of a harmful effect of "secondary smoking" on the non-smoker. Robert Herrick, writing in the 17th century, wrote the appropriate verse :

> "Come, Let us go, while we are in our prime And take the harnful folly of the time We shall grow old apace, and die Before we know our Liberty"

### SECTION B

General Provision of Health Services in the Area The health services provided by the Somerset County Council continued unchanged.

There was a falling-off in the numbers attending the Child Welfare Clinic but the medical consultations were about the same.

The demand for pre-school care of children was net by the formation of another playgroup. All the places were quickly taken.

Appendix B, Table 2 gives details of the medical inspections I carried out in the schools. The number of children attending the County schools slightly increased due to the closure of two private schools in Chard.

The Education Department have been planning the re-organisation of education in Ilminster for the last two or three years and in September comprehensive education commenced. Both Boys' and Girls' grammar schools were closed, as was the Junior Boys' School, in Ditton Street. The Secondary Modern School became Ilminster Middle School, known as Swanmead. This school takes children from the age of 9 - 13. All the senior children are transported to Wadham School, Crewkerne, the purpose-built comprehensive school adjacent to the old Crewkerne Grammar School.

### SECTION C

Prevention and Control over Infectious Diseases and Other Diseases No infectious diseases were notified during 1971.

I cannot believe that Ilminster escaped without even one case of measles during the year. I can only presume that when infectious disease did occur the doctors were not consulted.

I carred out my routine B.C.G. programme against tuberculosis in the autumn. Children born in 1960 were those offered vaccination. I did fifteen children at Swanmead but the remainder were attending Wadham School, Crewkerne and were done there.

### Environmental Health Services

# A. Sanitary Circumstances

Climatic Conditions In 1971 the weather was generally equable with no extremes of temperature.

Water Supply The water supply provided by the Wessex Water Board was satisfactory throughout the year both in quality and quantity. Sampling was carried out regularly by the Wessex Water Board (12 samples) and by our Health Department (4 samples) and I am pleased to state that all the samples examined were satisfactory.

Drainage and Sewage Disposal Sampling of the effluent at our sewage works was done monthly throughout the year and on only two occasions was the standard exceeded. In May there was a slight increase in the amount of solids although the biological oxygen demand was satisfactory, and in July the trouble was caused by a jammed valve which, when freed, worked satisfactorily and subsequent sampling showed the effluent had returned to an acceptable level.

In times of heavy rainfall the levels at the ejector station in Station Road were too high and the Council decided to provide larger pumps to deal with the trouble.

Refuse Collection The Council continued their regular weekly collection of refuse disposing of it on a controlled tip at Chilworthy.

Public Conveniences The public conveniences were well maintained despite a considerable increase in use by the travelling public. There was some vandalism from time to time.

Rodent Control Our part-time rodent control operator carried out regular test baiting of Council property and sewers and dealt promptly with complaints of private residents. No serious infestation was reported during the year.

Swimming Baths Two schools have swimming baths which are maintained satisfactorily in accordance with the code laid down by the County Council. Both use mains water.

Nuisances Complaints received by the Public Health Department varied considerably in nature but all were dealt with promptly by the inspectors.

### Factories Act

Details of the inspections carried out by the Public Health Inspectors are shown in Appendix D, Table.

### Offices, Shops and Railway Premises Act

Routine inspections were carried out at a number of the 60 premises registered under this Act and informal action was taken in several cases to ensure compliance.

D. Housing During the year the Council erected 20 houses and a further 87 were built During the year the Council erected 20 houses and a further 87 were built by private builders who also had another 62 in the course of erection. Since 1945 693 houses have been built in Ilminster, 373 of these by the Council who propose to build a further 20 units each year until 1975. At the end of the year there were 145 applicants on the housing list including 60 for old peoples' dwellings. Among the general applicants only ten were classified as urgent.

The Council continued to encourage applications for both standard and discretionary grants and gave approval for five standard grants and four discretionary grants.




