

TO THE CARLISLE URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL. Gentlemen,

I have the honour of submitting to you my Annual Report on the Health of Carlisle during the year 1895, with an account of the Sanitary Work performed.

### VITAL STATISTICS.

During the year the births of 1,311 children have been registered. Of these 651 were boys and 660 girls. The total gives a rate of 32.1 per 1,000 of the estimated population. Last year the birth-rate was 32.4 per 1,000 of the estimated population.

MORTAL STATISTICS.

During the year ending December 31st, 794 deaths were registered in the Carlisle Urban Sanitary District. Of these 393 were males and 401 females. The death-rate was equal

to 19.4 per 1,000 of the population estimated to the middle of the year. Last year (1894) 780 deaths were registered, the death-rate being equal to 19.2 per 1,000 of the estimated population. The following table gives the deaths of persons not belonging to the Carlisle Urban District. Making allowance for such deaths a death-rate of 18.7 is obtained.

DEATHS FROM THE EIGHT PRINCIPAL ZYMOTIC DISEASES.

It will be noticed that the deaths from Zymotic causes, viz., 33, is the lowest record for the last 21 years, and the ratio per 1,000, viz., 0.8, is extremely small for an urban population of 40,800 living in a circular area of 2,029 acres.

### SCARLET FEVER.

64 cases of Scarlet Fever have been notified, as compared with 77 cases last year. The disease was most prevalent

during the months of August and September. As to the age prevalence 19 cases were in children of from 3 to 6, and 14 in children of from 6 to 9 years old. The mortality was 3 per cent. of the cases notified.

# SMALL POX.

One case of Small Pox occurred during the year. It was the case of a woman with the confluent form of the disease, who was removed from Linton Street to Crozier Lodge Hospital on March 10th. The origin of the case was at first obscure inasmuch as the patient had not been from home for many months, and there had been no notified case of Small Pox in Carlisle since the spring of the previous year. It was subsequently discovered, however, that the husband of the patient, a railway man going between Carlisle and Glasgow where Small Pox at that time prevailed, had been confined to the house owing to illness, about nine days previous to the commencement of his wife's seizure, and an examination revealed three recent Small Pox scars upon his The man was put in quarantine for a sufficient forehead. period and there was no further spread. This case exemplifies what a mild disease Small Pox may be and how easily it may be overlooked.

# TYPHOID FEVER.

Twenty cases of Typhoid Fever have been notified as compared with 15 cases last year.

### ASIATIC CHOLERA.

A notification of a case of Asiatic Cholera reached the Sanitary Office on Tuesday, April 23rd. It was that of a man who had died at 39 South John Street on the previous day. The patient, a healthy and vigorous workman, had visited Newcastle-on-Tyne and Windy Nook (County Durham) on Easter Monday, April 15th, and began with choleraic symptoms on the following Thursday, April 18th. Rigorous measures of disinfection were carried out, and portions of patient's vomit and soiled linen were forwarded to the Local Government for examination. The result of the Board's examination was negative.

### DIPHTHERIA.

Forty-one cases in 34 houses have occurred, as compared with 29 cases in 26 houses last year. The mortality has been about 1 in 8 of the reported cases. In five of the houses minor sanitary defects were found to exist, and in one case the house was condemned as unfit for human habitation.

### EPIDEMIC INFLUENZA.

Epidemic Influenza was again prevalent during the months of February, March, and April, and was no doubt responsible for the high death rate recorded in those months, though no death was registered as being due to Influenza

### NOTIFICATION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

249 cases of infectious diseases have been notified, as compared with 246 cases during the year 1894. The following table gives the number of cases reported during each quarter of the year.

In two instances two notifications of Erysipelas were sent in relating to the same case.

### ISOLATION OF INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

The Sanitary Authority has isolated at Crozier Lodge 47 cases of Infectious Disease during the year, consisting of 22 of Scarlet Fever, 7 of Tyhpoid Fever, 16 of Diphtheria, 1 of Small Pox, and 1 of Erysipelas. Last year 21 infectious cases were isolated, viz.:—8 of Scarlet Fever, 4 of Typhoid Fever, 1 of Typhus Fever, 1 of Continued Fever, and 7 of Diphtheria.

### HOUSE REFUSE REMOVAL.

The nightly removal of house refuse continues to work well, and though the system met with some opposition at first it now proceeds in a satisfactory manner.

# FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACTS, 1878, 1891, & 1895.

Sixty-nine workshops, including 95 rooms, have been visited, measured, and registered during the year. Most of this work has devolved upon the Inspector of Nuisances, but in the early part of the year I accompanied him in his inspection of a considerable number of workshops.

The factories and workshops, so far as they have been visited, were found to be in a satisfactory condition.

### COMMON LODGING HOUSES.

The Common Lodging Houses in this City have all been regularly inspected and found to be in a satisfactory condition.

### INSANITARY HOUSE PROPERTY.

A considerable amount of house property has been inspected and condemned as unfit for human habitation during the year.

The condemned property embraces the whole of Whippery Lane, Rickergate; one house in Queen Street; six houses in Rigg Street; houses from No. 9 Broadguards to Artizans' Dwellings; the whole of the dwellings in Back Broadguards and The Fleet; and three houses, comprising about twenty rooms, in Bridge Lane, Caldewgate.

The owners of the Whippery Lane property have received notices to put the property into habitable condition by carrying out work according to the specifications of the City Surveyor, although it is difficult to see how any radical alteration short of demolition will render this class of property sanitary.

The insanitary property in Caldewgate is at present under the consideration of the Health Committee.

### EXAMINATION OF MEAT.

During the year I have been called to examine the carcases of 24 animals as compared with 26 last year; 16 of the carcases were pronounced unfit for human food; 11 of the carcases were affected with tuberculosis.

The Report of the Royal Commission on Tuberculosis appointed in July, 1890, was presented to Parliament in April of the past year. One of the conclusions of the Commission with regard to tuberculous meat is eminently unsatisfactory from the point of view of a Medical Officer of Health or a Sanitary Inspector who is responsible for the examination of meat intended for human food. The Report, while it points out that the tubercular virus is so infective that it may be carried by means of the butcher's knife from a diseased carcase to a healthy one, yet suggests there is "no objection to the sale of meat substances from carcases which have shown only localised tuberculosis, and from which every particle of tubercle has been skilfully removed; provided always that in every subsequent process of preparing

the meat for sale due care be taken to guard the saleable portions from contamination by tuberculous matter." As this proviso is manifestly impracticable, and as in the vast majority of the tuberculous carcases there is no sure line of demarcation between diseased, and healthy parts, the recommendation which has been much quoted by those interested in the meat "trade" becomes of little practical value.
