Annual Report of the Medical Officer of Health
for the Year 1942

To the Chairman and Members
of the
Urban District Council.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have pleasure in presenting to you my Annual Report for the year 1942.

Despite the many changes due to over three years of war, I am happy to report that the health of the district remains satisfactory.

Population figures as supplied by the Registrar General show a slight decrease on 1941.

The number of births also show a decrease of 10 on the previous year. 114 of these, were born in the district and 19 were born in maternity hospitals etc. outside the area.

112 deaths were recorded in the district and 26 were transferable. There were 2 more deaths during the year than in 1941. Of the total deaths, 91 were of persons sixty five years of age and over, and the average age of deaths was 63 years.

As in 1941, there were no maternal deaths during the year, whilst the number of infants dying under one year of age was three as compared with 10 for 1941 giving an infant death rate 22.6 per 1000 live births.

Infectious diseases saw a 'jump' in the number of cases over 1941, due to an epidemic of 281 cases of measles of which 2 cases were fatal.

In June, the first 'Day Nursery' in the district was opened at 'Northands' under the County Council.

The year under review, marked a change on the Health department staff; Mr. A. Eddleston, the Sanitary Inspector, after serving the Council in this position for 37 years retired owing to ill-health and I would like to place on record my personal thanks to him for all his help and assistance to the department and also all the good work he has done for the town over so many years. I hope that he will enjoy many happy years with good health during his retirement.
