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# REPORT

OF THE

## MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

FOR THE QUARTER ENDED

30TH JUNE. 1934.

 As previously announced in the first print of this report, I regret to record the death on the 24th June of Dr. C. Franks, who was appointed Medical Officer of Health of this county on the 1st May, 1930.

## VITAL STATISTICS.

- 2. The Registrar General's estimate of population for this administrative county for mid-year 1933, which has recently been received, is 917,680, and again shows a decrease compared with the previous year, being 6,920 less than his estimate for mid-year 1932. As in previous years, the Registrar General's estimate for 1933 has been taken as a basis for estimating the mid-year 1934 population, which is 923,210, and has been arrived at by adding the natural increase of population during 1933, i.e., the excess of births over deaths. The same procedure has been adopted in estimating the population of each sanitary district in the administrative county.
- 3. The vital statistics for the past quarter compare very favourably with those for the previous quarter, the total death-rate being 12·2 per 1,000 population, compared with 14·0 during the previous quarter. The death-rate for the past quarter, however, shows an increase compared with the rate for the corresponding quarter of last year (10·4).
- 4. The lowest total death-rates during the quarter occurred in the Leadgate (8·2) and Hetton-le-Hole (10·5) urban districts, and in the Stockton (7·1) Darlington (7·7) and Hartlepool (7·7) rural districts; while the districts with the highest mortality statistics were the Barnard Castle (16·8) Bishop Auckland (15·6) and Stanley (15·6) urban districts, and the Barnard Castle (15·2) and Auckland (13·5) rural districts.
- 5. The infant mortality rate per 1,000 births registered was 72 and shows a very satisfactory decrease compared with the rate for the previous quarter, which was 104 per 1,000 births registered, though it is higher than the rate for the corresponding quarter of last year (62).
- A slight decrease was recorded in the death-rate from the seven principal zymotic diseases during the quarter, the rate being 0.65 per 1,000 population compared with 0.69 in the preceding quarter.
- The birth-rate for the quarter was 18.2 per 1,000 population and is the same as that for the preceding quarter.



#### INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

- 8. Scarlet fever, although showing a diminution in the number of notifications compared with the previous quarter, continued prevalent throughout the administrative county. During the quarter 1,555 cases were notified, compared with 2,288 during the preceding quarter, and 937 in the June quarter of last year. Twenty-two deaths were registered from this disease during the quarter compared with 37 in the previous quarter.
- 9. During the quarter 355 cases of diphtheria were notified compared with 469 in the previous quarter and 185 in the corresponding quarter of last year. The deaths registered from this disease numbered 28 and shows an increase of 4 compared with the previous quarter.
- 10. Only 3 cases of enteric fever were notified during the quarter compared with 91 in the preceding quarter. No deaths were registered during the quarter.
- 11. There were 12 notifications of cases of puerperal fever and 28 notifications of puerperal pyrexia, compared with 15 and 29 respectively in the previous quarter. During the quarter 12 cases were admitted to hospitals under the county scheme and the services of consultants were utilised in 8 cases.
- 12. The number of notifications of ophthalmia neonatorum received during the quarter was 22 compared with 31 in the preceding quarter. In-patient hospital treatment under the county scheme was provided in respect of 5 cases.
- 13. An increase was recorded in the number of cases of cerebro-spinal fever notified from 5 in the previous quarter to 20 during the past quarter. Six deaths were registered compared with 3 in the previous quarter.
- 14. The number of deaths registered from measles was 55 compared with 48 in the previous quarter; while the deaths from whooping cough numbered 13 compared with 23. Diarrhœa and enteritis under two years of age was responsible for 33 deaths compared with 24 during the previous quarter.

#### VACCINATION.

16. No. 40 (WINGATE) DISTRICT.—I regret to report the death, on 19th April, 1934 of Dr. W. A. G. Russell, of Somerville, Wingate, Public Vaccinator for this district, which comprises the parishes of Castle Eden, Hutton Henry, Monk Hesledon, Nesbit, Sheraton-with-Hulam, and Wingate (excluding Wheatley Hill Colliery and Wingate Lane). I have appointed, subject to your confirmation and the approval of the Minister of Health, Dr. R. Gordon Russell, of Airlie, Blackhalls, West Hartlepool, as from 1st May, 1934, on the same scale of fees as applied to Dr. W. A. G. Russell, i.e.,

## DISEASES OF ANIMALS.

#### TUBERCULOSIS ORDER, 1925.

18. During the past quarter tuberculous disease was reported on 118 premises, and on inspection disease was found by the veterinary inspectors to exist on 86 of these premises. The total number of animals examined by the veterinary inspectors was 3,211, and of these 13 were reported to be suffering from tuberculosis of the udder; 1 suffering from tuberculous emaciation, and 79 as having chronic cough and showing definite clinical signs of tuberculosis. The total number of animals slaughtered on account of tuberculosis was 93, and it was found on post-mortem examination that 20 had tuberculosis of the udder, 1 tuberculous emaciation, and 72 proved to be otherwise affected with tuberculosis. Of the total animals inspected, 1,627 were cows in milk; of these 107 were reported as diseased, and the presence of disease was confirmed in 85 cases by post-mortem examination. During the three months 9 samples of milk were examined for tubercle bacilli, 5 of which were found to be positive.

## MILK AND DAIRIES ORDER, 1926.

19. During the quarter the veterinary officers visited 841 farms and examined 8,999 animals in the course of their routine work under the above Order, as a result of which 36 animals were found to be suffering from tuberculosis, and were accordingly slaughtered. Of these slaughtered animals 35 were cows in milk. On post-mortem examination tuberculosis of the udder was found to exist in 9 cases, the remainder being otherwise affected with tuberculosis. These 36 animals are included in the total number shown as having been slaughtered under the Tuberculosis Order.

## TREATMENT OF TUBERCULOSIS.

- 20. I have received the following report from the Central Tuberculosis Medical Officer, and on page 40 will be found a tabulated statement with reference to cases of tuberculosis dealt with during the past quarter:—

(3) ADMISSIONS TO SANATORIA AND HOSPITALS.—The number admitted to sanatoria and other residential institutions was 260 (including 19 who had previously received institutional treatment) as against 284 in the last quarter, and the total number receiving residential treatment on the 30th June was 558, as against 574 at the end of last quarter. (6) DISCHARGES FROM SANATORIA AND HOSPITALS.—The number of persons discharged from sanatoria and hospitals was 280. Of these, 111 were reported "Quiescent" or "Arrested," 102 "Improved," 42 "No material improvement," and 25 died in institutions. Twentyseven cases left before treatment was completed.

- (8) OCCUPATIONAL TREATMENT OF DURHAM COUNTY TUBERCULOUS EX-SERVICE MEN.— There were no tuberculous ex-service men admitted to Preston Hall Training Colony, Aylesford, Kent, during the quarter; none were transferred to the Settlement, and two were receiving treatment on the 30th June. No cases were awaiting admission to the Colony on 30th June.
  - (9) TRAVELLING EXPENSES have been paid during the quarter to 476 cases.
  - (10) X-RAY EXAMINATIONS.—During the quarter 212 persons were examined by X-rays.

- (12) ATTENDANCES AT DISPENSARIES.—The number of attendances at the dispensaries during the quarter was 5,982, as against 6,357 in the preceding quarter, and the number of persons who attended the dispensaries was 3,108, the corresponding figure for the preceding quarter being 3,386.
- (13) VISITS TO PATIENTS.—5,076 visits have been made by the health visitors to patients during the quarter.
- (14) VISITS TO EX-SERVICE MEN.—203 visits have been made by the health visitors during the two months.
- (15) UNDER SUPERVISION.—5,156 patients were under supervision on the 30th June, including 351 ex-service men.
- (16) TREATMENT RECOMMENDED.—A list of all cases recommended sanatorium, dispensary and other forms of treatment during the quarter will be submitted, and I shall be glad if your Committee will approve such recommendations.
- (17) DEATHS.—193 deaths from tuberculosis have been reported since the date of my last quarterly report, viz.: Pulmonary, 87 males and 75 females; Non-Pulmonary, 14 males and 17 females.
- (18) LOCUM TENENS FOR HOLIDAY DUTY.—With reference to the Minute of the County Council of 19th April, 1934, I have to report that with the approval of the County Medical Officer I have engaged Dr. K. Stocks Brown, of Colwyn Bay, as locum tuberculosis officer during the summer holidays, until the permanent appointment at Jarrow Dispensary is filled, when Dr. Leslie Lyall will take over the holiday duties.

(19) CASE No. 36334 (COXHOE).—This patient died in Stannington Sanatorium on 29th April, 1934. As the family were in very poor financial circumstances and could not afford to pay the cost of the funeral I instructed a local undertaker to make all the funeral arrangements. An account for £7 10s. Od. has now been received from the undertaker, Mr. William Best, Blackgate, Coxhoe, which I recommend should be paid by the County Council.

- (2) Travelling expenses amounting to £86 19s. 10d. were paid during the quarter ended 31st March, 1934, to enable necessitous patients to attend the treatment centres.
- (3) I have received a request from the Durham Diocesan Moral Welfare Association for the admission of a girl (L.C.) to the Hope Hospital, Leeds. Careful enquiries were made and the case proved to be suitable for admission to the above institution. I recommend that the County Council sanction payment on the terms previously arranged with the Hope Hospital, Leeds.

#### HEALTH VISITORS.

- 22. The Superintendent Health Visitor reports as follows:-
- (1) Sick Leave.—The following returned to duty on the dates given:—Mrs. Field, April 7th; Miss I. E. Hall, April 30th. The following were on sick leave on the dates given:—Mrs. Wood, April 5th to May 15th; Miss Wilson, April 12th to 24th; Miss Craik, 14th May to 26th; Mrs. Grundey, 5th May to 16th June. The following have been on sick leave from the dates given:—Miss Lindsley, April 21st; Miss Nightingale, April 4th; Miss E. M. Scott, April 4th; Miss Garbutt, May 7th.
- (2) Children Acts, 1908-32.—79 cases were under supervision, and 170 visits were paid during the quarter.
- (3) 1,497 mental defectives were under supervision, to whom 1,728 visits were paid during the quarter.
  - (4) The services of Home Helps were sanctioned in 7 cases during the quarter.
- (5) The number of families on milk assistance on 30th June, 1934, was 5,484. (The corresponding number on the 31st March, 1934, was 5,490.)

(3) There were 42 cases of discharging eyes in the practice of midwives and 13 of these were subsequently notified as ophthalmia neonatorum.

Liability to be a Source of Infection .....

- (4) Medical aid was sought by midwives in 26 cases because of rise of temperature. Seven of these cases were subsequently notified as puerperal fever and 6 as puerperal pyrexia. The services of a consultant were requisitioned in 1 case, 6 received in-patient hospital treatment, and the services of the emergency nurse were utilised in 1 case.
  - (5) The inspectors visited 57 cases of albuminuria.

- (6) The practice of midwifery by 10 uncertified midwives was reported by the health visitors.
  One woman was visited and warned.
- (7) Eleven additional trained midwives have given notice of their intention to practice in the county area, 13 midwives have notified changes of address within the county, and 1 has removed out of the county.
- (8) The Midwives' First Supplemental Roll for 1933 has been received. There are 72 names on the Roll, 11 of whom have given notice of their intention to practise in the county area.

- (10) The midwife at Shotton Colliery is still off duty ill.
- (11) Midwife No. 82494 has returned to duty.
- (12) The Superintendent of the County Nursing Association reports that there are 123 midwives practising under district nursing associations, and that a good standard of work has been maintained, and the equipment found in good order. She also reports that 6 resignations have been received from whole-time nurse-midwives, and that 6 appointments (1 temporary) have been made to fill these vacancies.

#### DARLINGTON RURAL DISTRICT.

24. Water Supply.—An Inquiry was held on the 1st June by the Ministry of Health into an application by the District Council for sanction to borrow £2,000 for the purpose of making a payment to the Tees Valley Water Board for the provision of a supply of water to the contributory places of Killerby and Summerhouse. The Inquiry was attended by a representative of this department, who reports that there was no opposition to the application, although the attention of the Inspector was drawn to an alternative suggestion. The Inspector of the Ministry of Health was informed of the position of the County Council with regard to their inability to grant any financial assistance. The result of the Inquiry has not yet been received.

#### RIVERS POLLUTION PREVENTION ACTS.

- 25. The County Health Inspector reports that :-
- (1) Portions of the following rivers and streams have been inspected:—Alwent Beck, Clockburn Beck, Coalford Beck, Coxhoe Beck, Cong Burn, Twizel Burn, Derwent, Browney, Deerness, Old Durham Beck, Rowletch Burn, Dipton Beck, Pont Burn, Stanley Burn, Dene Beck, Beechburn Beck, Crook Beck, Bowburn Beck, Blaydon Beck, Watergate Burn, East Howle Beck, Croxdale Beck, Bishopton Beck, Coundon Beck, Medomsley Beck, Hetton Burn, Rainton Burn, Moores Burn, Rivers Wear, Teams and Tees.
- (2) A number of new works of sewerage and sewage disposal schemes are in course of preparation and will be commenced upon the completion of the re-organisation of county districts.
- (3) The majority of the sewage disposal works in the county have been inspected during the past quarter.
- (4) Pollution by sewage was observed at Skerne Bridge, Stone Bridge, Sedgeletch, Flint Mill, Glebe Sewage Farm, Durham, Blackhouse Housing Estate and Chester-le-Street.
- (5) Pollution from gasworks, by-product works, chemical works, tar and coking plants, and sand and gravel works, has been observed in the following watercourses:—Moores Burn, Sedgeletch Beck, Herrington Burn, Derwent, Low Grange Beck, Oakley Beck, Gaunless, Bowburn Beck, Tursdale Beck, and Murton Beck.
- (6) Refuse in streams has been observed at Spennymoor, Crook, Craghead, Ferryhill, Rainton Burn, Dairy Lane, Bishop Auckland, Coxhoe, East Howle, and Tudhoe Colliery.

#### MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

26. The Welfare Medical Officer reports to me as follows :-

#### (1) WELFARE MEDICAL STAFF.

Sick Leave.—Dr. C. Anderson resumed duty on the 23rd April. With the approval of the Deputy County Medical Officer, her centres were attended by Dr. M. Crosthwaite, the assistant welfare medical officers and myself.

- Dr. C. J. Thomson, assistant welfare medical officer, left the service of the County Council on the 14th May.
- Dr. E. Patterson was appointed assistant welfare medical officer on the 19th March to fill the vacancy, and will commence duty on the 1st July. With the approval of the Deputy County Medical Officer, Dr. Rodgers is attending her centres from the 15th May to the 30th June inclusive.
- Dr. J. M. Jamieson was granted special leave to attend the Maternity and Child Welfare Group Conference held in Glasgow from the 24th to the 26th May inclusive. I attended her centres on those dates.

With the approval of the Deputy County Medical Officer, the following have been appointed to act as locum tenens during the summer leave of the assistant welfare medical officers:—Drs. Crosthwaite, Everdell, Fraser, Gordon, Heugh, McFadden and Rodgers. Dr. E. S. Williamson will be in charge of the office when necessary during my absence.

#### (2) CENTRES. NEW PREMISES.

BUTTERKNOWLE.—The first session in the Wesleyan Schoolroom will be held on the 30th August.

HAVERTON HILL.—The first session in the Wesleyan Schoolroom will be held on the 9th August.

Shilldon.—The first session in the Wesleyan Schoolroom, Soho Street, will be held on the 9th August.

Durham.—New premises for this centre have been acquired at 14, Old Elvet. The cost for the re-decoration of the same and necessary equipment is estimated at £125.

I should be glad to have permission for the necessary work to be done as soon as possible.

Temporary Premises, Washington.—The Secretary of the Miners' Hall, Washington, informs me that a new wing is to be added to the present premises. As the Centre is held in these premises it will be necessary during the alterations for the Welfare Centre to be held elsewhere.

I shall be glad to have permission to obtain the use of the old premises at the National Schools during the interim. The new wing when built will supply much improved accommodation for the Centre.

## (3) PROPOSED NEW PREMISES.

WHICKHAM.—More suitable premises for this centre can be obtained at the Miners' Welfare Hall. The accommodation consists of a large hall, two rooms, kitchen, and two ante-rooms. The building is centrally heated, and there are fires in the rooms to be used as consulting and weighing rooms, and also in the kitchen. The rental, inclusive of lighting, heating and caretaking, to be the same as that now paid for the present premises, namely £26 per annum. I should be glad to have permission to remove to these premises as soon as possible.

The annual business meeting of the Federation for the election of officers and representatives on the executive was held on the 12th April, at which Mrs. Doncaster, Vice-Chairman, presided.

With the approval of the Deputy County Medical Officer, I propose to attend the Baby Week Conference in Birmingham, from the 3rd to the 5th July, inclusive, as the representative of the Federation, in addition to the delegate who is also sent.

The sum of £140 has already been subscribed to the Federation Convalescent Scheme, and mothers are now being sent away under this scheme.
