BOROUGH OF KEIGHLEY.

To the Mayor, Aldermen and Councillors, Gentlemen,

I have the honour to submit my fourteenth Annual Report on the work of the Health Services of the Borough for the year 1943.

The most urgent matter before the Local Authority is that of overcrowding. Attention has been drawn to this in previous reports, but the position has grown steadily worse. Cases are constantly being brought to the notice of the Department which it is powerless to help, but some relief is anticipated as a result of the development of the Bracken Bank Estate now under consideration.

The Home Help Scheme, sponsored by the Maternity and Child Welfare Committee, has been found difficult to administer economically. Part-time work does not appeal to women who are dependent on regular wages; on the other hand, the resurgent nature of public midwifery makes regular employment impossible.

A reference is made to the operation of the Adoption of Children (Regulation) Act, 1939 in this Annual Report. Adoption must not be regarded as a solution of the problem of illegitimacy and whilst everything possible should be done to safeguard the health and welfare of children born under this unfortunate circumstance, every imaginable step should be taken to discourage an evil so repugnant to the life of the community.

The Health and Welfare of the town has remained remarkably good save for the incidence of Scabies and Venereal Disease—reference to these problems is made in the Report of the School Medical Officer, 1943 and in the Annual Report of the County Medical Officer of Health for the same year.

The average number of persons registered as unemployed during the year was 69, and in Haworth 2. These figures relate to men only. There were no women or juveniles registered as unemployed.

Births. The total number of births registered was 965, 43 of these being still-births. The Birth Rate is 18.14.

Deaths. The Deaths registered for the year are 770. The Death Rate is 14.47.

STREET ACCIDENTS.

There were 4 fatal road accidents during the year.

INFANT MORTALITY.

The number of infants dying under one year of age is 43. The Infant Mortality Rate is 44.56 per 1,000 births registered.

MATERNAL MORTALITY.

The number of women dying directly as a result of child-birth is 4. The Maternal Mortality Rate is 4.15.

GENERAL OBSERVATIONS.

The natural increase or decrease per 1,000 of the population is plus 3.67.

C.—PREVALENCE OF AND CONTROL OVER INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

1.—NOTIFIABLE INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

275 visits of investigation were paid and 244 for the purpose of disinfection.

No cases of Smallpox were notified.

- (a) Measles.—The number of cases notified was 353. No deaths were registered.
- (b) Whooping Cough.—The number of cases notified was 115. There was 1 death.
- (c) Scarlet Fever.—The number of cases notified was 170.
 No deaths were registered. 93.5% of the notified cases were removed to Hospital.
- (d) Diphtheria.—The number of cases notified was 55. 1 death occurred and 98.2% of the notified cases were removed to Hospital.
- (e) Cerebro-Spinal Fever.—5 cases were notified, which were removed to Hospital. The deaths registered numbered 1.
 - (f) Para-Typhoid Fever.—1 case was notified (non-civilian).
- (g) Zymotic Enteritis (Summer Diarrhœa).—No cases came to the notice of the Department.
- (h) Ophthalmia Neonatorum.—2 cases were brought to the notice of the Department and they were followed up.
- (i) Puerperal Pyrexia.—3 cases were notified. There were no deaths.
- (j) Acute Primary or Influenzal Pneumonia.—23 cases were notified. The deaths registered numbered 44.
- (k) Tuberculosis.—40 cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis were notified, Non-Pulmonary cases notified being 12. 25 Pulmonary and 5 Non-Pulmonary deaths were registered.
- Influenza.—There were 5 deaths certified from this disease.
- (m) Erysipelas.—The number of cases notified was 3. There were no deaths.
- (n) Dysentery.—The number of cases notified was 1 (non-civilian). There were no deaths.
 - (o) Acute Poliomyelitis.—1 case was notified.
 - (p) Acute Polio-Encephalitis.—1 case was notified.
 - (q) Malaria (contracted abroad).—1 case was notified.

2.—CANCER—MALIGNANT DISEASE.

The number of deaths registered was 101. The number of cancer patients admitted from Keighley Victoria Hospital to the Radium Therapy Department of the Bradford Royal Infirmary totalled 75 and the total number of days' stay amounted to 121. Similar arrangements exist for treatment as shown previously.

F.—SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA.

WATER.

The Borough Waterworks Undertaking is described in the Annual Report for 1938.

The Water Engineer has kindly supplied the following information:—

Average daily consumption of water per head of population within the Borough for the year 1943 for all purposes—39.65 gallons per day. For domestic and unmeasured purposes 23.54 gallons per day.

195 samples of water have been bacteriologically examined and the quality of the filtered and treated water has been satisfactory. There were 10 chemical examinations.

The whole of the Oxenhope area is now on Town's water from the Oldfield Filter Beds.

Close co-operation between the two Departments continues in the matter of water supplies.

There are still numerous private water supplies, particularly in connection with farm premises, which have been frequently sampled in the past and users advised as to necessary precautions where the index of pollution indicated this as desirable. Such premises are outside the present economic possibility of having a suitable alternative wholesome supply laid on from the town's mains.

During the year two such samples were taken, which were found to be satisfactory.

Extension of town's supply to outlying districts such as Goose Eye, Stanbury and Upper Marsh, Oxenhope, where comparatively small groups of dwellings are served by private supplies, still stands deferred until after the War due to the shortage of man-power and material and the veto by the Ministry of Health on such works.

RIVERS AND STREAMS.

There has been no evidence of river or stream pollution brought to the attention of the Department during the year.

SWIMMING BATHS.

There are no privately owned swimming pools in the district, but the Corporation own two swimming baths of the first and second class types, which are described in the 1938 Report.

DRAINAGE, SEWERAGE, AND SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

The five sewage disposal works are fully described in the Annual Report for 1938.

No extension to the sewerage of the district has been carried out during the year.

2.—OVERCROWDING.

The circumstances described in the 1941 Report have naturally progressed to a more chaotic state and no relief is anticipated from this until the Government authorise Re-housing Schemes which are, of course, under current consideration.

10 recommendations to the Housing Committee were made on the grounds of technical overcrowding following 66 investigations. Three occupiers were required to abate overcrowding where circumstances indicated that such overcrowding was avoidable. Two licences have been issued for temporary overcrowding due to abnormal circumstances.

Since the operation of the Act only 4,413 houses have been supplied with the "permitted number" by the Department.

COMMON LODGING HOUSES.

There are two in the Borough, solely used by men, and they are well maintained. 31 inspections were made.

As a result of Ministry of Health advice re the danger of Louse-borne Typhus Fever such premises are inspected weekly to determine from the evidence available the number of inmates who are actually carrying lice on their persons. An examination of the bedding reveals this state of affairs. By arrangement with the Keeper the men are as soon as practicable transported to the Disinfestation Station for appropriate treatment to their bodies clothing and other effects.

SITES FOR MOVABLE DWELLINGS.

6 sites for movable dwellings were licensed subject to the sanitary conditions being brought up to the standard specified in the licences.

OUTWORKERS.

Lists were submitted by 4 employers, showing the employment of 9 persons. In every case the premises were visited and found to be satisfactory.

ATMOSPHERIC POLUTION.

During the year no continuous observations were made owing to the existence of a circular of the Ministry of Home Security advocating the emission of black smoke with a minimum of wastage of fuel.

Soot Deposit Gauges. 12 monthly deposits collected in gauges situate at the Public Baths and Morton Cemetery are as follows:

187 tons per square mile and 142 tons per square mile respectively.

FOOD INSPECTION AND THE SUPERVISION OF FOOD PREMISES.

379 inspections were made of Food Premises.

The precautions outlined in the 1941 report are still being brought to the attention of food traders and their personnel generally.

BAKEHOUSES.

There are 75 bakehouses in the district of which 7 are basement bakehouses licensed under the Factories Act, 1937.

MEAT SUPPLY.

The circumstances are still the same as reported in the 1941 Report re private slaughterhouses and centralised slaughtering.

A 100% system of meat inspection is in force, and for the purpose of this system the Inspectors were on duty at the Public Abattoir on 667 occasions and 57 special slaughtering visits were paid to farm premises for occasional licensed slaughter of pigs.

MILK SUPPLY.

Production. In the Borough are 255 cowkeepers at 261 milk farms housing approximately 3,467 cows in a total of 401 cowsheds. 52 of these farms are licensed by the West Riding County Council to produce "Accredited" milk and 4 to produce "Tuberculin Tested" milk.

Purveying. There are 219 wholesale traders (109 of these also retailing) and 180 retailing only (the latter including 132 shops registered for the sale of bottled milk). One shop-keeper is licensed to sell "Tuberculin Tested (Certified)" milk, produced and bottled in the Skipton Rural District. One licence to pasteurise bulk milk was extended for the year, and the holder of this licence retails pasteurised milk at 21 shops in the district.

644 visits to cowsheds and 271 visits to dairy premises were made.

(b) For Presence of Tubercle Bacillus.

Of the above samples 158 were examined by the County Laboratory for presence of T.B.: 5 of these were notified as tuber-culous. The Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries and the County Council took appropriate action which resulted in the affected animals being slaughtered.

REGISTRATION OF PREMISES.

245 premises are registered under Section 14 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, for either the manufacture, storage, or sale of ice cream or the preparation or manufacture of sausage, potted, pressed, pickled or preserved food.

5 transfers of occupiers were made.

Applications for the registration of 9 unsatisfactory premises are still in abeyance until the premises are made to comply with the provisions of the Act. Extensive alterations in these cases are not practicable until after the war.

4 premises are registered under Section 34 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938, for wholesale dealing in margarine and margarine—cheese.

OFFENSIVE TRADES.

Number in Borough, 13, comprising 5 Tanners and Leather Dressers, 1 Tripe Boiler, 1 Bone Boiler and Fat Refiner, 2 Tripe Boilers and Gut Scrapers, 1 Fat Refiner and 3 Rag and Bone Dealers. The 59 Fish Friers, whose trade at the moment is not regarded as offensive, are now all registered under the provisions of the Food and Drugs Act, 1938.

REPRESSION OF VERMIN.

Rats.

207 visits were paid to rat infested premises and advice given.

468 visits were paid by the Ratcatcher to infested premises and 465 rats were known to have been caught or baits taken. It is, of course, impossible to record how many rats have been destroyed in addition to this figure as a result of advice given.

Verminous Houses and Household Effects.

The facilities for disinfestation prior to removal to Corporation houses, as described in the 1938 report, are still available.

653 inspections were made of 272 alleged verminous premises, following which liquid and gaseous vermicide treatment has been carried out in 71 instances by a private contractor.

In addition to this formal action, other informal action in the form of advice has resulted in numerous other premises being treated by owners and occupiers to repress vermin.

DISEASES OF ANIMALS ACTS AND ORDERS.

The Chief Sanitary Inspector is the Council's Inspector under these Acts and senior officers of the Police act as officers of Local Authority for the purpose of granting licences and other administrative duties. A summary of action taken by all officers, including the Divisional Inspector of the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries is as follows:

Anthrax Order, 1938.

In 1943 there were 3 suspected cases, none of which was confirmed.

Tuberculosis Order, 1938.

74 Form "A" Notices were served. Of these 5 were withdrawn and 69 animals were slaughtered,

Swine Fever Order, 1938.

There were 9 suspected cases, none of which was confirmed by the Ministry.

Regulation of Movement of Swine Order, 1922.

2. Form "A" Licences were issued affecting the movement of 3 fat pigs for slaughter.

Sheep Scab.

There was one suspected outbreak in 2 sheep which was confirmed. The prescribed notices re dipping and isolation, etc. were served in connection therewith.

Foot and Mouth Disease Order, 1928.

There were no cases notified within the Borough.

140 licences issued in connection with movement of cattle for slaughter and occupation purposes.

RAG FLOCKS ACT, 1911 to 1928. FABRICS (MISDESCRIPTION) ACT, 1913.

No action found necessary.

SHOPS ACT, 1934.

7 unsatisfactory conditions under the Shops Acts were remedied, consisting of improved ventilation, provision of washing facilities, sanitary accommodation and general essential maintenance work.

The Cleansing Department is responsible only for the collection and disposal of Household Refuse and Reclamation of Waste Materials.

A great hardship has been caused to the working of the Department by the scarcity of labour and the increasing efforts for the collection of more Salvage, but the work generally has been carried out in a satisfactory manner, although at times collections have been most irregular, thereby causing a few minor complaints to be received.

The disposal of Refuse is on the controlled system of Tipping. There are six tips throughout the District: Marley, 1 (Main Tip); Oakworth, 2 (Bogthorn and Cemetery); Oxenhope, 1; Stanbury, 1; and Oldfield, 1.

The whole of the work except Oakworth and Stanbury is carried out by direct labour; these two districts are done by contract.

Salvage.

A certain amount of Salvage has been dealt with in recent years, but it is now on a much larger scale. The following table gives the figures for the year under review.

In addition to the foregoing, approximately 50 tons of metals have been sold by other Departments which realised £154, bringing the total salvage to £3,034.

During the year, the last week in August and the first week in September, a great Book Drive was held in accordance with the Ministry's request, which proved a success. A central receiving depot was opened at the junction of Cavendish Street and Cooke Lane, being a shop kindly loaned by Mr. Fred Moore free of charge.

The total number of Books collected was 159,283; these were distributed as follows: For Salvage, 152,720; for the Services, 5,241; for Libraries, 1,322.

Kitchen Waste.

During the year 300 Bins have been placed and the result of collection has been most gratifying, as will be seen from the foregoing table.

With regard to the Salvage of Rags, other textiles and Bones, these in my opinion could be increased considerably.

Thanks are due to the staff for the energetic way in which they have carried out their duties.
