C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

1. (1) Water Supply,—The town is supplied with water entirely by electrically operated plant, which has worked satisfactorily. A Chlorinator was installed by Messrs. Turn-Over Filter Co., Ltd., of Belfast.

The number of new services laid was 6, and 11 services have been renewed.

The usual emptying and cleansing of reservoirs has been carried out during the year.

During the year 82,510,652 gallons of water were pumped, giving an average of 226,087 gallons per day, as against 232,213 per day in 1941.

Five bacteriological analyses were made, which show that the water still maintains its high standard of purity.

- (ii) Drainage and Sewerage.—No extensions to the Sewerage System were made. New sprinkler arms were fitted to two of the primary filter beds, all of which are now working satisfactorily. Material is on order for the two secondary filters, and these will be brought into commission as soon as the additional arms are received.
- 2. (i) Rivers and Streams.—One complaint was received of alleged pollution to the Finham Brook. The matter was rectified after the repairs had been completed to the primary filter arms.

General conditions of the effluent from the Disposal Works has been satisfactory.

3. (i) Public Cleansing.—House refuse collection is carried out on a fortnightly basis. All property is provided with moveable, covered, metal dustbins, and a fortnightly system is also in operation for the collection of salvage, including paper, bones, rags, rubber, bottles and scrap metal. The following materials were sold during the year:—

125 tons $7\frac{3}{4}$ cwts.—Paper.

3 tons 81 cwts.—Bones.

5 tons $9\frac{1}{2}$ cwts.—Rags.

2 tons 0 cwts.—Bottles.

There is considerable difficulty in finding a market for the broken glass and household tins, large quantities of which are lying at the Council's site in Dalehouse Lane.

D. HOUSING.

The usual Table has been completed and is being kept for reference.

E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) Milk Supply.—The number of persons registered under the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order is 57; of these, 19 were retailers only, 20 producer-retailers, and 18 were producers only. Premises have been visited at intervals, and 3 informal notices requiring cleansing and minor alterations have been served and complied with.

Two persons are licensed for the sale of Pauteurised Milk, and one for the sale of Tuberculin Tested Milk.

- (b) Meat.—Visits are made by the Inspector as required.
- (c) Other Trades.—Bakehouses have been inspected. No notices were found to be necessary.
