C. SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE DISTRICT.

1. (i) Water Supply.—The town is supplied with water pumped entirely by an electrically operated plant, and the water is treated by a chlorinator supplied by Messrs. Turn-Over Filter Co., Ltd., of Belfast. During the year the plant worked satisfactorily, with the exception of a three-day period in September, when the Harland Pump developed an electrical fault. Owing to the very narrow margin between the top water level of the Knowle Hill Reservoir and the higher parts of the town, it was necessary during this period to take a supply through the emergency arrangements existing between Coventry and Kenilworth at Burton Green.

The number of new services laid was 12; four have been renewed and eight repaired.

A 3in, watermain extension was made of some 160 yards at Drakes Hill.

The customary emptying and cleansing of reservoirs has been carried out during the year.

94,574,305 gallons of water were recorded as pumped, giving an average of 258,400 gallons per day, as against 225,122 gallons per day in 1943.

The supply generally has been satisfactory, both in quality and in quantity. Three specimens of raw water were taken for bacteriological examination, and the results showed that the water still maintains its high standard of purity. One specimen was taken for chemical analysis, the result of which was as follows:—

"From the above results we are of the opinion that this water is not likely to have more than the usual rusting action on Iron." No special action was taken for treatment of contaminated water.

By far the larger number of houses in the district are fitted with bib taps inside the house, and it is estimated that of the houses, some $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. are supplied by means of standpipes, and of the population, about 10 per cent. are affected.

Water mains serve all but the very isolated parts of the district.

(ii) Drainage and Sewerage.—No extensions have been made to the Sewerage System. New arms were fixed to two of the sprinklers. The Sewage Disposal Works generally has worked satisfactorily in view of the large flow it has had to deal with, but it is apparent that modifications will very soon be required, to enable the works to produce a continuously satisfactory effluent.

During the year one sewer connection was made, and 17 sewer stoppages were removed.

- 2. Rivers and Streams.—The brook in the park and in Henry Street was cleaned out, the portion in Henry Street could be much improved by culverting.
- 3. Public Cleansing.—House refuse collection is carried out on a fortnightly basis. All property is provided with moveable, covered, metal dustbins, and a fortnightly system is also in operation for the collection of paper, bones and rags. The following materials were sold during the year:—

The usual Table has been completed and is being kept for reference.

E. INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

(a) Milk Supply.—The number of registrations under the Dairies, Cowsheds and Milkshops Order is 28; of these, 10 were retailers only, 5 producer-retailers, and 13 were producers only. Premises have been visited at intervals, and 3 informal notices requiring cleansing and minor alterations have been served and complied with. 10 milk samples were taken, and all proved to be satisfactory.

Three persons are licensed for the sale of Pasteurised Milk, and one for the Sale of Tuberculin Tested Milk.

- (b) Meat.—Visits are made by the Inspector as required.
- (c) Other Trades.—Bakehouses have been inspected. Two notices were found to be necessary.
