GENTLEMEN,

The returns of Deaths (Form A) and of new cases of Deaths infectious sickness (Form B) I herewith hand you duly completed.

During the year there have been 637 Births, or 25.48 in the Births thousand. Males 334. Females 303.

Below I have tabulated the Birth and Death Rates for the years 1886 to 1895, inclusive, which method I hope is easy for the purpose of comparison.

The total number of Deaths from all causes, diseases, and Mortality ages, which have been registered, is 471. The number in each sex being 255 males and 216 females.

74 Deaths have occured in the Workhouse.

Scarlet Fever. Scarlet Fever.—Known Cases, 140; Deaths o -This disease has continued with us from last year and has been confined to no particular part of the Borough. I am pleased to say we have not had half so many cases as last year.

Typhoid Fever. Typhoid Fever.—Known Cases, 4; Deaths, o.—All these cases were of a mild character, and in no instance have we been able to find any specific cause to give rise to this disease.

Diphtheria

Diphtheria.—Known Cases, 25; Deaths, 2.—The cases of Diphtheria have been one less than last year, and the deaths only two. Many of the cases reported have been of a very mild type.

The surrounding of all these cases have been thoroughly investigated, but we have failed to find any specific cause.

Small Pox.--Known Cases, 1; Deaths, 5.—We have had one Small Pox case of Small Pox removed to the Hospital from the Workhouse, (Mrs. Raven, wife of the Porter.)

I have no doubt the disease was contracted by coming in contact with tramps.

Measles.—Known Cases 31; Deaths, 1.—There have been a Measles few isolated cases during the year.

During the year I have received and treated in the Borough Hospital 107 cases of Scarlet Fever and one case of Small Pox. Of the Scarlet Fever cases 96 belonged to the Borough, 2 to Stourport, 7 to the Rural District Council, and 2 to the Workhouse.

Borough Hospital

The Staff at the Hospital varies according to number of Patients. On Dec. 31st, the Staff consisted of the following — Medical Superintendent, Matron, two Probationer Nurses, one Temporary Nurse, Cook, Gardener, and Laundrywoman. Patients in Hospital on December 31st., 18.

The Staff at the Hospital has at times during the year had a great deal of extra work, but I am pleased to say they always perform their duties cheerfully and efficiently, however much taxed.

The Slaughterhouses, Bakehouses, Lodginghouses, Workshops, Milkshops and Cowsheds have been regularly inspected,
and on the whole found clean.

The tables appended to this report I hope will be found ample for placing before you the amount of sanitary work which has been carried on during the year.

The prosecutions found necessary to be taken before the magistrates this year have been only five, which shows we are able to get through a large amount of work, the major portion of which is aggressive—with a small amount of friction.

Allow me again at the end of another year, to thank the Chairman and Members of the Health Committee for the support they have given me in the carrying out of my duties. I am pleased to say that on the whole things have worked very smoothly.


