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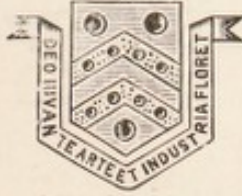

ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR 1908.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg to present the following Report upon the Health and Sanitary condition of the Borough of Kidderminster for the year 1908.

The Return of Deaths and of cases of Infectious Diseases I herewith hand you duly completed.

During the year there have been 522 Births, or 21·13 in the thousand:—Males, 270; Females, 252.

The total number of Deaths from all causes, which have been registered, is 409; the number in each sex being 211 Males and 198 Females.

Deaths in the Workhouse, 78. Residents, 59; Non-Residents, 19.

Deaths in the Infirmary, 62. Residents, 36; Non-Residents, 26.

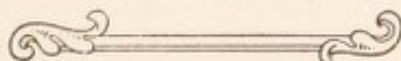

One case of Diphtheria was treated in the Hospital during the year.

Typhoid Fever.—One case, notified September 5th, 1908; male, aged 30 years, 4, Cross Street, isolated at home; Died, October 2nd, 1908. Two living rooms, three sleeping rooms, two adults, one child. Patient: a butcher; had been at work at Birmingham previous to illness. Surroundings: yard paved, drains trapped, town water and water closet.

Anthrax.—Two cases. First, male, aged 23 years, by trade a horse slaughterer; recovered. Second, male, aged 60 years, labourer at a carpet mill in the borough; recovered. Both cases were residents, and were treated in our Infirmary. All precautions were taken.

Scarlet Fever.—Twenty-seven cases. Twenty-three removed to Borough Hospital, and no deaths. Five houses had two cases in them. There were twenty-six cases in sixteen separate localities, and one in the Infirmary, which was a non-resident.

Measles. — During the year the Borough has been practically free from this disease.

Respiratory Diseases.—Under this heading are included : Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Pleurisy. During the year 66 deaths have been registered, being one death more than in 1907.

Phthisis.—The deaths from this disease have been two less than in 1907, being 19 deaths. I have prepared a table showing what were the occupations of the deceased persons. Two of the nineteen cases occurred in the Workhouse.

Infantile Mortality.—Compared with last year our total Births are less, by 28, being 522 for 1908, and 550 for 1907. The mortality of infants under twelve months is 63 for 1908, against 77 for 1907. This causes our Infant Mortality per 1,000 births to be lower than in 1907, viz : 120.68 for 1908, against 140 in 1907.

The following shows you the ages at which the deaths occurred of the infants under one year.

On Table 5 you will find the causes of death.

We still continue to supply the Registrar with copies of instructions on the rearing and feeding of infants, which are handed to each person registering a birth. I am of an opinion that this method of distributing useful information to the right persons is beginning to bear fruit. Our infantile mortality for 1908 is below the average for the past ten years. Average for past ten years, 150·18 : for 1908, 120·68 per 1,000 births.

I must point out that a large section of our female population are employed in the spinning and carpet factories of the town.

The Birth Rate per 1000 population is 21·13; in 1907 it was 22·26. I have prepared a table on page 12, showing the excess of births over deaths since 1889, a period of 20 years.

Marriages.—The number of marriages which took place within the Borough for 1908 was 207. The number for 1907 was 276.

Illegitimacy — Thirty-five births have been registered during the year. Males, 21; Females, 14. Sixteen of the births occurred in the Workhouse. Total illegitimate births for 1907, 36.

Hospital. — The Hospital work for the year has been heavier than last year. Cases for 1907, 21; 1908, 76. The following are the cases I have received and treated:

Factory and Workshops Acts.—The workshops and workplaces are regularly inspected, and on the whole are in a satisfactory condition.

Section 22 of the Public Health Act Amendment Act, 1890, is in force in Kidderminster. The standard of sufficiency and suitability of sanitary accommodation which we adopt is that contained in the Home Office order, No. 89, of 1903.

Closure of Schools.—During the year there has been no serious outbreak of Infectious Disease in any of our Elementary Schools, therefore we have not had to close any school this year.

Foods and Drugs Acts.—The usual number of samples have been taken under this Act. The details will be found in the Sanitary Inspector's report appended.

Court Sweeping.—The sweeping is still carried on satisfactorily. The work is most valuable in contributing to the sanitary condition of the Borough.

Public Thoroughfares.—The roadway leading from Crowther Street to Mill Lane, and also the roadway leading from Woodfield Crescent to Franchise Street, are in a bad state of repair, both roadways being near to Elementary Schools. The said roads are in the same condition as when I reported last year.

Dirty Houses.—I have certified 191 houses that required cleansing and whitewashing, as per section 46 of the Public Health Act, 1875, and four under section 5 of the Infectious Disease (Prevention) Act, 1890.

Household Ashes and Refuse.—We are still able to dispose of our household ashes and refuse without difficulty. The bulk of it goes by Canal to Oldington Farm. The whole of this work is now done by our own staff.

Sewers.—Complaints concerning the sewers have been few during the year. Complaints, when received, have immediate attention from the Surveyor's department.

Anthrax in Cattle.—On September 11th, 1908, in one of our Borough cow-sheds, a cow died; certified to have been Anthrax. I visited the premises, and saw that all precautions were taken in reference to the milk, cleanliness, lime-washing, disinfecting, and burning of the carcass. No second case occurred.

Water Supply to our Borough is constant and of excellent quality, being supplied from four artesian wells.

Mortuary Chapels in Cemetery.—In consequence of my report of a year ago, many of the suggestions I then made have been carried out in a satisfactory manner.

The Public Health (Tuberculosis) Regulations, 1908.—For nine years past we have supplied handbills and leaflets in cases of Pulmonary Tuberculosis, and have also disinfected houses after death. We shall still continue to do the same, and in addition, will carry out the extensive duties laid down in these regulations. We have a register prepared for recording particulars of all future cases.

Elementary Schools.—During the year I have reported to the Health Committee on most of the Public School Buildings, and these reports have been forwarded to the Education Committee. The two chief matters I drew attention to were: First, the danger to life in case of fire in two of the schools; Second, the heating of the schools by stoves, which is most inefficient and unsatisfactory. The room is too hot in one place and is too cold in another; the air also becomes dry and irritating to the Teachers, who have much talking to do. In those schools heated by hot water, the pipes are quite unprotected, and in one school the pupils sit with their backs within a foot or so of the hot pipes.

Medical Inspection of Schools.—This work is under the control of the School Medical Officer to the Education Committee (Dr. Griffiths) whose report to me I have pleasure in herewith presenting :

“I send you a general statement showing that the work so far has been carried out according to the requirements of the Board of Education. The general scheme for inspection of the children of different ages has been drawn up and cards for recording the result for each child have been provided. This year the children who attained the age of five years in 1908 have been inspected, and those who attain the age of fourteen years in 1909. That is to say the first and fourth inspection have been carried out, but not the second and third. It is proposed that all four inspections be carried out in 1909. I am pleased to state that the work has gone on smoothly, and I must thank the teachers for their co-operation and help in the work. I have not as yet the data to give you particulars as to the general physical development of the children, but I may state that so far I have been favourably impressed by the general condition of the children. We have about 4,500 children on the registers. A fair number of parents attend the examinations, especially with younger children. The attention of parents is drawn to any defect or disease, and they are advised to take the child to their usual medical attendant.”

Alleged Illness from a Decoction of Herbs.—On Oct. 29th, 1908, a medical man brought to the Health Office a portion of a decoction of Boneset, which he said had caused two of his patients to be made seriously ill, the symptoms resembling Belladonna poisoning. We forwarded the decoction and also some of the herb to the Public Analyst, who reported as follows:

I am of opinion that the said sample contained 1.41 per cent. of solid matter in solution. I can find nothing present inconsistent with its being a genuine decoction of *Empatorium Perfoliatum* Thoroughwort or Boneset. Neither this nor its preparations have any official recognition in Great Britain.

I, the undersigned, Public Analyst for the BOROUGH OF KIDDERMINSTER, do hereby certify that I received on the 31st October, 1908, from Mr. J. T. Cowderoy, a sample of "Boneset" for analysis, and have analyzed the same, and declare the result of my analysis to be as follows:

I am of opinion that the said sample consists of the flowering tops of *Empatorium Perfoliatum* Thoroughwort or Boneset. No foreign matter is present, hence I consider it genuine.

The herb was purchased from a local Herbalist, and the decoction was made by the wife of one of the patients. This herb can in no case be considered harmless; in fact, if given in an excessive dose it becomes dangerous to life as in the cases herein reported. I would also point out that the herb was sold without any directions or instructions given as to its use. Clear, explicit, and correct instructions should be printed on each packet, as it is a herb which is sold largely during the winter months for colds. Your Health Committee instructed the Town Clerk to write the herbalist requesting that in future correct printed instructions should be attached to each packet of the herb sold. The herbalist has since adopted the Health Committee's suggestion.

Cow Sheds.—There are fourteen Sheds in the Borough, owned by nine persons. The following are their locations, and a few particulars concerning each shed.

W. T., WOOD STREET. One shed constructed of wooden sides and iron roof, is used for ten cows, which are grazed throughout the year. The cows appear healthy, clean, and in good condition. The shed is paved, drained into the town sewer; the floor is washed down daily. The lighting and ventilation is fair.

H. E., PLEASANT STREET. One shed constructed of brick, tiled roof. Is used for sixteen cows, which are grazed throughout the year. The cows appear healthy, clean, and in good condition. Floor paved, and drained into town sewer. The floor is washed down daily. Lighting and ventilation good. Town water is used. Second shed is constructed of wood, and is used for two cows. Third shed is constructed of wooden sides with iron roof, and is used for one cow.

A. L., CHESTER ROAD. One shed constructed of wooden sides, iron roof, (thatched underneath), is used for fifteen cows, which are grazed throughout the year. The cows appear healthy, clean, and in good condition. Floor paved, drained into cesspit in field, floor washed down daily, lighting and ventilation very good. Town water is used. The approach to the shed should be paved. Second shed constructed of wooden sides, iron roof (thatched underneath), is used for five cows, which are grazed throughout the year. The cows appear healthy, clean, and in good condition. Floor paved, and drained into a cesspit. Lighting and ventilation fair; town water used. The approach to the shed should be paved.

A.W., LARK HILL. One shed, is constructed of wood, is used for five cows, which are grazed throughout the year. The cows appear healthy, clean, and in good condition. Floor paved, drained into town sewer, floor is washed daily, lighting and ventilation good. Approach to shed should be paved. Manure pit too near the shed.

S.F., RADFORD AVENUE. One shed, constructed of wood, is used for six cows, which are grazed throughout the year. The cows appear healthy, clean, and in good condition. Floor paved, drained into town sewer, town water is used, lighting and ventilation good. Floor washed daily.

S.B., CLENSMORE. One shed, constructed of wood, is used for six cows, which are grazed throughout the year. The cows appear healthy, clean, and in good condition. Floor paved and drained into cesspit; well water used. Floor washed daily. Lighting fair, ventilation good.

J.H., PARK LANE. One shed, constructed of brick walls with tiled roof, is used for five cows, which are grazed throughout the year. The cows appear healthy, clean, and in good condition. Floor paved, drained into cesspit; lighting and ventilation fair; town water is used. Second shed is constructed of brick with tiled roof, and is used for one cow; the lighting and ventilation is fair; drains into a cesspool; town water is used. Third shed, is constructed of wood, is used for three cows, which are grazed throughout the year. The cows appear healthy, clean, and in good condition. The floor is paved and drained into a cesspit; the floor is washed down daily; lighting and ventilation is good; town water is used.

A.F., CHESTER ROAD. The shed is constructed with wooden sides, with iron roof, is used for six cows, which are grazed throughout the year. The cows appear healthy and in good condition. Floor paved and drained into a catchpit in adjoining field; lighting and ventilation fair. Floors are washed down daily; and the town water is used.

W.T., NEW ROAD. One shed, constructed of wood; well lighted, ventilated, paved, drained into the sewer; town water laid on. Used occasionally.

All the cow-sheds are lime-washed at least twice a year.

None of the milk produced in the Borough is sent away by rail.

The bulk of the milk is delivered direct to the customers.

The amount of milk brought into the Borough by rail is about sixty gallons per day.

Notification of Anthrax, Glanders and Hydrophobia in Man.—The Health Committee have for some time past paid medical men for the immediate notification of Anthrax, and on my advice the Committee have proposed that these diseases shall be included among those notifiable under the Infectious Diseases (Notification) Act.

The Police always notify me immediately on the occurrence of any disease they are required to inform me of, as mentioned in the Contagious Diseases Animals' Act, and all orders and regulations relating thereto.

Allow me again, at the end of another year, to thank the Chairman, Vice-Chairman, and Members of the Health Committee for the support they have given me in the carrying out of my duties.

On the whole the Cabins are kept clean, very few women and children are met with on boats passing through the Borough. They are chiefly men who work the boats in this district.

In 26 instances the boats had on board a man, his wife and one or more children, and 195 boats were worked by men (only).

A willingness is always shown by the canal boat people to comply with the Law and Local Government Board regulations.

Informal Samples of Spirits tested by Sikes' Hydrometer.

Thirteen samples have been procured and tested. Nine were below the legal limit, two were diluted very slightly beyond the statutory limit, two were diluted much beyond the statutory limit. In the latter cases formal samples were obtained and submitted to the Public Analyst, who certified one to be 18°5 U.P., and the other 16°6 U.P. Whenever we obtain a test sample of

spirits which is diluted much beyond the statutory limit, we never get supplied with the formal sample from the same vessel or bottle. The larger quantity required for the Public Analyst seems to at once create suspicion; hence the strength of the formal sample is nearly always within the legal limit.

Taking one year with another, quite half the number of samples we take are test samples. In the past opinions have varied concerning the value of such sampling; hence the insertion of the following.

“The advantages of the system of taking test samples are referred to in the Annual Report of the Intelligence Division for 1902, and also in each of the subsequent Reports.

“The figures relating to the test samples taken in Scotland justify the contention that informal test samples afford a better indication of the amount of adulteration than is given by formal samples.

“In 1907, 9·7 per cent. of the samples of all articles taken in Scotland with the formalities required by the Sale of Food and Drugs Act were found adulterated, whereas the percentage of adulteration among the informal samples was 15·3. Of the milk samples taken formally, 10 per cent. were found adulterated, against 21 per cent. adulterated of those taken informally. Of the test samples of butter, 16 per cent. were found adulterated, and only 8 per cent. of the formal samples of butter.”

Common Lodging Houses.

Number under inspection, 7.

During the year four large old houses in Queen Street have been converted into two very good Common Lodging Houses. One is used for single men, and the other for married couples. They are now registered for twenty single men, and eleven married couples. The Chairman of the Health Committee and also the Medical Officer of Health, have inspected the alterations and approved of same.

31-32, BLACKWELL STREET.—This old-established Common Lodging House has during the year had many repairs done to it, also all the straw mattresses have been destroyed and wire ones substituted. A quantity of new bedding and bedclothes have been provided. Through lax management of this house, the Health Committee had the keeper before them, when he promised to look after the house better in future, which promise has so far been kept.

Notices to School Teachers and others.

102 prohibition notices have been served on parents and school teachers, to keep children from attending school from houses where infectious diseases have occurred.

Stray Dogs.

Thirty-five carcasses of dogs have been handed over to us by the Police for destruction.

Disinfection.

Disinfection has been carried out in all cases of Infectious Disease, and the infected houses cleansed.

Smoke Nuisances.

Many observations have been taken, visits have been made to stokers and engineers, letters have been written and threats made, with the result that noticeable improvement has been made.

The Law.—Section 91 of the Public Health Act 1875 enacts: "Any chimney (not being the chimney of a private dwelling-house) sending forth black smoke in such a quantity as to be a nuisance" shall be deemed a nuisance liable to be dealt with summarily, in manner provided by this Act, and further, that all furnaces and fireplaces must be constructed in such a manner as to consume as far as practicable, the combustion used therein, having regard for the practice or process of manufacture.

The three chief points in the Law are:—(1) Practicability, (2) Black Smoke, (3) The quantity to be a nuisance.

Practicability.—If a manufacturer cannot prevent Black Smoke without interfering with his trade, then the Court has no jurisdiction in the matter.

Black Smoke.—The Act does not deal with any other kind of smoke but black; all other kinds of smoke, colours or densities, are under the Public Health Act not considered a Nuisance.

Such Quantity as to be a Nuisance.—Black Smoke may be emitted in small quantities, and not be a nuisance. The Act does not say what quantities, but leaves it to the Court to decide on the evidence produced.

The amount of Black Smoke allowed varies in different towns. An instance: one boiler, two minutes per hour; two boilers, three minutes per hour; three boilers, four minutes per hour.
