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



To the Chairman and Members of the HEALTH COMMITTEE.

GENTLEMEN,

I beg to present to you my report for the year 1924, upon the Health and Sanitary Conditions of the Borough, this Report being an ordinary Annual Report as laid down in Circular (269) of the Ministry of Health.

The chief advance in the Sanitation of the Borough during the year has been the sewering of the Sutton Common Area which is now completed. Owners of property in the area readily discarded the system of cesspool drainage and in all but a few cases have connected up to the sewer. One hundred and eighteen houses were connected to the water-carriage system.

The sewering of Somerleyton Avenue has also been carried out.

There now remains in the Borough only eighteen houses provided with portable closet pans.

During the months of July and August as a result of complaints of foul odours emitted from the sewers in the lower parts of the town, on the recommendation of your Committee the main sewer from Church Street to Oxford Street was cleaned out. Thereafter all complaints ceased. One hundred and twenty loads were removed. I recommend the cleansing of the sewers should be done annually.

SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

The question of disposing of the town sewage other than by the present method of Broad Irrigation has been under consideration during the year. Experiments have been carried out to find if the town sewage was suitable for treatment by the Activated Sludge Method, and these have demonstrated that there is nothing inherent in the sewage which would prevent its treatment by this method, but owing to the amount of solid matter preliminary sedimentation would be required. This point is being further examined.

These experiments will provide a sound basis for discussion in the future.

WATER SUPPLY.

During the year complaints of inadequate supply at certain times of the day have been received from numerous householders in the higher parts of the town on the east side.

The root-cause of the trouble is the level of the Reservoir, though this is situated at the highest point within reasonable distance of the town. I feel sure every effort is being made to remedy the defects. The additional main laid up Station Hill in 1922 was but part of the scheme of improvement, and the new 15" main from the Reservoir to New Road at present in course of construction will lead to improvement. Further extensions will be necessary in the affected area.

MILK SUPPLY.

This has been satisfactory, only two samples out of forty-five taken during the year proving on analysis to be below the standard. Only one retailer has so far undertaken to provide Certified Milk. This is undoubtedly the best milk for infant feeding.

Sterilized Milk appears to be finding increasing favour in the town, but I do not recommend its use in the feeding of infants and children.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

This most important work continues to flourish and the year shows an increase in attendances at the Centres, the Sewing-Class and the Ante-Natal Clinic. A Ministry of Health Inspector reported very favorably on the state of efficiency during the year. The infant mortality rate of 65.35 deaths per 1000 births is the lowest on record (England and Wales 75.00), for which pleasing state of affairs the Ladies' Committee and Kidderminster Nursing Association deserve highest commendation.

SCARLET FEVER.

The epidemic of Scarlet Fever which began in 1922 continued, and the total number of cases showed an increase over the previous year, 96 in 1924 as compared to 63 in 1923. In the early part of

the year, a few cases of severe type occurred, and four deaths resulted, 3 of these in the Borough Hospital. A great majority of the cases were mild, and at no time was any special centre, such as a school, the probable source of origin, nor was the disease confined in any way to the poorer parts of the town. The case rate per 1,000 was 3.67, England and Wales 2.16.

DIPHTHERIA.

Twenty-one cases occurred during the year. There were no deaths. Thirteen of the cases occurred in the Kidderminster Poor-Law Institution as a result of disturbing an old drain during alterations. Preventive inoculation of the Staff and unaffected children was carried out.

The case rate per 1,000 being .77. England and Wales 1.07.

TUBERCULOSIS.

Notification of Tuberculosis is carried out satisfactorily in the District, especially with regard to earlier notification. Total number of cases notified during the year was: pulmonary 44; other forms 28, total 72. Fifteen more than in 1923.

All cases notified are passed on to the County Council, who deal with them. In cases of death or departure to sanatorium disinfection of the house is carried out. Deaths from Tuberculosis during 1924. Pulmonary 22, other forms 8. Total 30. Six more than in 1923.

The increase in the number of notified cases occurs chiefly in the non-pulmonary type, due chiefly to more efficient notification. The assistance of the Tuberculosis Officer is a great help to local practitioners, not only in attaining earlier diagnosis and treatment, but in following up the cases after return from Sanatorium treatment. Only one death of non-notified case was reported during the year.

HOSPITALS.

- (1). The Borough Infectious Hospital for Scarlet Fever and Diphtheria.—Maintained by the Local Authority. Accommodation 38 beds. A new heating apparatus was installed during the year in Block I.
- (2). Small Pox Hospital.—The Property of the Town Council. Accommodation 12 beds.
- (3). The Kidderminster and District General Hospital. Accommodation, 80 beds. Supported by voluntary contribution. The Institution has been approved by the General Nursing Council for England and Wales as a First Class Training School for Nurses.
- (4). Kidderminster Poor Law Infirmary.—Number of beds, 109 (including maternity and children's beds).

AMBULANCE FACILITIES.

(1). For Infectious Cases.—Two Horse Ambulances provided by Local Authority for Scarlet Fever and Small Pox.

(2). For Non-Infectious and Accident Cases.—Motor Ambulance (provided by the Worcestershire Territorial Force Voluntary Aid Association). Kept at Castle Motor Garage, New Road. During the night, calls can be sent to Kidderminster Police Station.

PROFESSIONAL NURSING IN THE HOME.

The Worcestershire County Council contribute toward the services of a nurse at the Tuberculosis Centre.

We continue to exercise a strict supervision over all meat and other food stuffs. We encourage traders to let us know at once when food is sent to them, which they may have doubts about as to soundness. By so doing, they save themselves the risk of seizure of the food and prosecution; for when the doubtful food is proved to be unfit and is condemned, we give a certificate to the trader, to enable him to recover the purchase price from the dealer who supplied him.
