ANNUAL REPORT

For the Year ended December 31st, 1907

To the Chairman and Members of the Rural District Council.

GENTLEMEN,

The number of Births registered in the District during the year is 225, and the birth rate 22·27. The average number for the past ten years is 243·7 and the average rate 24·6.

The number of deaths registered is 128, and the death rate 12·68. The average number for the past ten years is 128, and the average rate 12·68.

SICKNESS.—35 cases of Scarlet Fever have been notified—1 from Kidderminster Foreign, 7 from the Wolverley district, 21 from the Chaddesley district, and 6 from the Wribbenhall district; of these 35 cases 14 have been removed to the Infectious Hospital—1 of them from the Foreign, 4 from Wolverley, 5 from Chaddesley, and 4 from Wribbenhall.

Five cases of Diphtheria have been notified: one from the Foreign, one from the Wolverley district, two from the Chaddesley district, and one from the Wribbenhall district.

Nine cases of Erysipelas have been notified—three from the Foreign, three from the Wolverley district, and three from the Wribbenhall district.

There have been four cases of Enteric Fever—two in the Wolverley district, one in the Chaddesley district, and 1 in the Wribbenhall district.

A case of Puerperal Fever was notified from Arley. As I have stated in previous reports, the Inspector visits all cases of infectious disease on receipt of the notification, and investigates their surroundings, giving instructions regarding precautions against spreading infection, supplying disinfectants, and if necessary superintending fumigation, etc., himself. He at once reports full

particulars to me, and no cases are removed to the Hospital without my instructions. At the termination of the illness, or after a case has been removed to the Hospital, he informs me what has been done in the way of disinfection, whitewashing, cleaning of rooms, etc. He also keeps me fully informed of all the important details of his work.

Cases of Anthrax have occurred at Upper Arley, Rushock, Blackstone, Shatterford (two cases), Gorst Hall, and Chaddeley, and in one instance magisterial proceedings were taken on account of the occupier's failure to report, and in this case also the farmer, contrary to instructions, turned milch cows into the pasture where the animals had recently died. The Inspector of Police found them there, and informed me, and in a special report to the Local Government Board and to your Council I gave a statement of the action which I took in the matter. In all these cases the carcasses have been cremated as soon as possible, infected litter has been burnt, sheds limewashed, and all animals isolated which had been exposed to infection, also the occupier has been warned to keep a careful watch upon the health of any persons who have handled the carcasses.

I have systematically visited the various portions of my district, and in September in company with your Inspector made a house to house visitation of Wolverley Village.

In accordance with the instructions of the Local Government Board, I will give the following additional particulars of my work in the district.

FEB. 6th.—After visiting Pound Green, I called Inspector's attention to some foul middens and faulty drains.

FEB. 15th.—I visited Bradford Cottages, where the Inspector reported gross overcrowding, accompanied by great filth, and the buildings dilapidated and unfit for habitation, and I advised him as to what steps should be taken in the matter.

FEB. 27th.—I called Inspector's attention to foul pigstyes in Connaught Avenue. In this month also the Inspector and I together visited the various houses in Whispering-street, Wribbenhall, finding the closets filthy and with dilapidated roofs, spouting defective, insufficient drainage, and a dangerously dilapidated wall in one yard. In another yard insufficient closet accommodation for the inmates and overcrowding in one of the houses. Sanitary notices were served accordingly.

IN MARCH I directed Inspector's attention to filthy and offensive premises in Austcliffe Lane, Cookley, and to a filthy ditch by the roadside at Franche. Sanitary notices were served in both cases.

IN APRIL, in consequence of a complaint, I visited a field at Wolverley where the tenant had deposited, near to the public road and within a short distance of the Hill and the Wolverley Grammar

School, a quantity of fish refuse and other offal, which was horribly offensive, and I requested the Inspector to serve a notice for the immediate abatement of this dangerous nuisance, forbidding the tenant to make any further deposit of this nature without properly covering the same at once with quicklime or soil.

IN JUNE I called Inspector's attention to cottages at the Sladd, where the privy ashpit was dilapidated, a dumbwell with dangerously defective cover was close to the house, and the paving in front of the house and the flooring of the bedroom defective; also to an offensive accumulation of manure and rotting cabbages near to the public road.

JULY 18th.—I received notification of a case of Enteric Fever at a farm in Wolverley district where the tenant kept a number of milch cows. I visited the farm the same afternoon, and gave directions that no milk should be brought to the dairy adjoining the house, but that all milk should be distributed from the shed on the other side of the fold-yard, and that no person going near the patient should have anything to do with the milk in any way. The privy-midden had no roof, and was over full. Some excreta from the patient had been recently thrown in. Orders were given to empty this and cart it on to the land the same night, and to have it ploughed in. The house drains were untrapped and flowing into a pond in the fold-yard, and in the dairy was an untrapped drain communicating directly with a dumbwell outside. Notices were served upon the owner to have each drain inlet properly trapped, to divert the drainage from the fold-yard into a properly constructed dumbwell a sufficient distance from the dwelling house, to seal up the drain opening in the dairy or provide a proper intercepting chamber and ventilator; also to provide a proper roof and door to the midden pit. The excreta to be buried in a freshly made trench, and the cowsheds to be limewashed. These directions were carried out.

IN JULY, in consequence of complaints from Dr. Johnston, I made a special visit to Wribbenhall to view the deposits on Severn Side and objectionable accumulations in Habberley Road and in the neighbourhood of Gray Green. I am thankful that arrangements have been made for scavenging in this locality; such a system has been urgently needed for years.

AUGUST 23rd.—I called Inspector's attention to a choked drain and dilapidated gutter and paving at Portway Place, also to choked drains and offensive accumulations in the Beehive Yard.

SEPT. 18th.—When visiting Stone Schools in connection with an outbreak of Measles, I found the school privies and urinal in a very foul condition; the cesspit between the closets had its drain stopped up and stank horribly, and urine was flowing all over the floor of the urinal and on to the path outside. The Inspector called the attention of the Managers to these matters.

OCT. 16th.—I called Inspector's attention to Smith's buildings Spencer Street. The closets are filthy and dilapidated, and there is a foul ditch at the back of them. Welsbury had been carting night soil on to the gardens, which are close to the back of the houses, and the inmates complain of the stench from two large heaps of this filth. The Inspector served notices upon the owner to put the closets in proper order and cleanse the ditch, and upon Welsbury to put the night soil under ground at once and abstain from depositing any more on this ground. He has since again given trouble in this respect, and has been threatened with magisterial proceedings.

OCT. 22nd.—Having received information from the Blakedown School Mistress that a child from Hackman's Gate, attending the school, had symptoms of Scarlet Fever, I went over the same afternoon and examined the child, whose symptoms I did not think were due to Scarlet Fever; but, as a precaution, I visited the child's home, and directed that he should be kept away from school for the present, and told the Mistress not to receive him as long as there was any appearance of desquamation about his fingers. When visiting Chaddesley in connection with the case of Enteric Fever, notified November 1st, I was informed that there was no proper supply of drinking water for the elder scholars, only one for the infants, and that the elder children were in the habit of drinking from a soft-water cistern. I requested the Inspector to call upon the Trustees to provide a proper supply of pure water, and to request the owner of the soft-water cistern, and the School Master, to prohibit the children from drinking from this cistern.

The Bakehouses and Slaughterhouses in the district have been regularly visited, and found, as a rule, in good order. In one instance I requested Inspector to deal with insanitary conditions. Over-crowding has been found in five instances, and satisfactorily dealt with.

The Water Supply has been well maintained, and the Inspector has given you in his report details of the instances in which he has had to interfere on account of local temporary deficiency.

I have visited the Factories, and found at one of them the closets and urinal foul, and defective pans; and at another one, closets arranged for males and females contiguous, and without any proper screen between them, or a separate approach for the sexes. Both these conditions have been remedied.

The following schools have been closed during the year:—Cookley, in February, July and November, on account of Whooping Cough, Measles, and Mumps; Wolverley, in February and October, on account of Measles each time; Foley Park, in February, on account of Measles and Whooping Cough; Franche, in March, on account of Measles; Trimpley, in November, on account of Mumps

and Chicken-pox ; Stone, in September, on account of Measles ; Harvington, in October, from the same cause ; Broadwaters, in November, on account of Measles and Mumps.

I am glad to know that an agreement has been arrived at with the Urban Sanitary Authority for the Drainage of the Whitville area, and hope that this will be carried out with as little delay as possible.

There is greater need that the more insanitary area of Sutton Common, including Foley Park, should be provided with efficient drainage, and I trust a way will be found for dealing with these in the very near future. With the exception of these areas, the district is, and has been during the year, in a good sanitary condition.

—Of the Scarlet Fever cases eight occurred in Chaddesley village, one, Lower Chaddesley; two, Clattercut Lane; two, Pleremore House; two, Outwood; two, Rushock; three, Drayton; one, Bellington Mill house. Of the Diphtheria cases one was at Rushock, one, Mill Lane, Hoobrook. The Enteric case was at Chaddesley village.

The removals to the Borough Infectious Hospital by instruction of the Medical Officer of Health were:—Rushock, 1; Outwood 1; Lower Chaddesley, 1; Chaddesley village, 2; total 5. Last year, 1; increase, 4. There was no infectious disease reported from Broom parish.

The WRIBBENHALL District, comprising Ribbesford, Dowles Upper Arley and Wribbenhall:—

THE BOROUGH INFECTIOUS HOSPITAL.

Twelve cases were removed into the Borough Infectious Hospital as against six last year; also one Infirmary case, residing at Stourport Road, Wribbenhall.

THE PUBLIC HEALTH WATER ACT.

Under sec. 6, c. 35 of the above Act only one notice was served. This was at a residence at Brockencote, Chaddesley. A sample of water was sent to the County Analyst, who certified that it was fit for drinking purposes, and a certificate was granted by the Council. Two new houses have been erected in the Foreign of Kidderminster, as against 14 last year; decrease, 12. The new houses have the town water laid on. At Wolverley a malt house has been converted into four cottages, which have an available supply of water. No new houses have been erected in Wribbenhall, Churchill, Stone, Broom, or Dowles.

DISINFECTION.

In all cases of infectious disease a plentiful supply of disinfectants is given, and fumigation, whitewashing, and cleansing are ordered, and reports of each case sent to the Medical Officer of Health, who visits each case.

DAIRIES, MILKSHOPS, AND COWSHEDS.

The above have had my surveillance from time to time, and cleansing and whitewashing have been done, except in a few instances, when notices were issued and the neglect remedied. One name has been added to the Register during the year.

BAKEHOUSES AND SLAUGHTERHOUSES.

These have been regularly inspected, both by the Medical Officer and myself, and found clean and satisfactory, except in a few instances, which were remedied after notices served. There are no underground bakehouses in the district.

SYSTEMATIC INSPECTION.

This is regularly carried out in all parts of the district.

CANAL BOATS ACTS AND REGULATIONS.

Boats inspected 132, last year 121; increase, 11. Visits to the canal, 63; visits and saw no boats, 18. Boats conforming to Acts and regulations, 126. Boats with one or more infringements, 6. Boats left outstanding, 0. Persons found on boats—males 280, females 4, children 3.

The infringements of the regulations consisted of: Breach of Marking Act, 1; absence of registration certificate, 1; water vessels of insufficient capacity, 4.

I again certify to the general improvement and good condition of the boats coming under my inspection. Out of 132 boats inspected only six infringed the regulations.

BYELAWS RELATING TO NUISANCES.

Two breaches of these byelaws came under my notice, and were remedied.

CLOSING OF SCHOOLS.

The following schools have been closed on Medical Officer's order, signed by two members of the Council, during the year:—Infant School, Cookley, from Feb. 4th to 25th, through Whooping Cough. to July 30th, Measles. Stone School, Sept. 19th to October 6th, Measles. Stone again, from October 6th to October 21st, through Measles. Infant School, Wolverley, Oct 10th to 31st, Measles. Mixed Schools, Wolverley, Oct. 15th to 31st, Measles. Harvington Roman Catholic School, Oct. 15th to Nov. 4th, Measles. Infant School, Wolverley, Nov. 4th to 18th, Measles. SPECIAL INSPECTIONS.

In July inspected Brinton Park pool, in company with Dr. Bertram Addenbrooke and Mr. Shepherd, Surveyor, *re* complaint of parish Council. August 4th, inspection at Arley village on the complaint of Rev. W. Lea; defective drain inlets altered and ventilating shafts put in by Council. August 30th, inspection. with County Medical Officer of Health, of Stourport Road, Wribbenhall; 35 houses inspected. Sept. 23rd, with Dr. Addenbrooke, house to house inspection at Wolverley village. Dec. 16th and 17th, inspection of Catchem's End and Wribbenhall houses and two schools, 306 in all. Dumbwells, 79; privy ashpits, 37; pan closets, 145; ashpits, 51; total, 312.

ANTHRAX IN CATTLE.

During the year there have been several cases of Anthrax amongst cattle. Every precaution was taken to prevent the disease spreading. The carcasses were burnt and the farm buildings whitewashed and disinfected.

WATER SUPPLY.

The Water supply of the district has been well maintained.

FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS ACT.

Workshops under Inspection: Tailors, 2; Wheelwrights, 1; Blacksmiths, 13; Builder and Coffinmaker, 1; Carpenters and Joiners, 6; Blacksmith and Wheelwright, 1; Carpenters, 2; Wheelwrights, 2; Dressmakers, 5; Tailor and Draper, 1; Builder and Carpenter, 1; Bakers, 13; Bootmakers, 5; Painter, 1; Builder and Contractor, 1; Iron Roof Maker and Carpenter, 1; Laundries 4; Cattle Crib, &c., Maker, 1; Photographer, 1; Dress and Costume Makers, 2; Saddler, 1; Carpenter and Coffinmaker, 1. Total, 66.

No lists of Outworkers have been received by me. The register contains the name of one only, that of a Tailoress.

The workshops are visited regularly, and on the whole are kept clean and satisfactory; the few exceptions were soon remedied.

CORRESPONDENCE.

Over 68 special letters have been written with reference to Scarlet Fever cases and other matters, &c. The nuisance cases have been abated without legal prosecutions. There are only eight outstanding cases.
