SECTION B.

General Provision of Health Services in the Area.

Staff.

I have the assistance and co-operation of the Sanitary Inspector, Mr. R. S. Porter, who holds the Certificate of the Royal Sanitary Institute as Inspector of Meat and other Foods, and of Miss J. E. Mantle as Public Health Clerk.

Laboratory Facilities.

The Worcestershire County Council Laboratories are available for the chemical examination of water, milk and foodstuffs, and the work is carried out by the County Analyst.

All clinical bacteriology is carried out by the Public Health Laboratory, situated at Worcester Royal Infirmary.

Ambulance Facilities.

For Infectious Diseases an ambulance is provided by the Regional Hospital Board, and operates from Hayley Green Hospital,

For other cases an ambulance service is provided by the County Council, and operates from Kidderminster.

Nursing at Home.

There are four District Nurses in the area, who also practise as Midwives and act as Health Visitors, an additional Nurse having been appointed for Cookley, Churchill and Blakedown and Broome. Two other District Nurses also deal with portions of the Area.

Infant Welfare Centres.

There are four Infant Welfare Centres in the Area—at Far Forest, Wolverley, Cookley and Chaddesley Corbett, where Immunisation and Vaccination is carried out.

The Welfare Centres at Wribbenhall and Hagley are also used by residents of the Area.

Hospitals.

The Kidderminster and District General Hospital is available for all residents in our Area.

For Infectious Diseases the Isolation Hospital at Hayley Green is available.

Tuberculosis.

This work is the responsibility of the Regional Hospital Board, who arrange sanitorium treatment where possible. Dispensaries are held every Tuesday at 6 p.m., and Thursday at 2 p.m., at the Kidderminster General Hospital, when Dr. R. Cronin attends.

The County Council are responsible for after-care and this work is administered locally by the After-Care Sub-Committee of the Divisional Area Committee.

Venereal Disease.

The Regional Hospital Board arrange for treatment and follow-up of these cases at the Kidderminster General Hospital.

SECTION C.

Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.

Water.

The Council own approximately 70 miles of water pipes, and the water in the Rural District is supplied by:—

- (1) The Council's Borehole at Cookley.
- (2) The City of Birmingham Elan Aqueduct.
- (3) The Stourbridge Water Board.

The supply is satisfactory both in regard to quality and quantity.

At regular intervals throughout the year the Sanitary Inspector submitted samples of water from the three main sources for chemical and bacteriological examination by the County Analyst. All the samples were satisfactory. The following are copies of the Analyst's Certificates on three samples submitted to him.

The above figures are approximate. Included in the 779 houses supplied from standpipes are several areas of bungalow development and a "squatters" camp.

Drainage and Sewerage.

Work on the main sewerage scheme for the villages of Wolverley

and Cookley is progressing steadily.

The situation in the village of Chaddesley Corbett is unchanged since my last report, and it is considered essential for the health of the inhabitants of the village that a satisfactory system of drainage be installed at the earliest possible moment. It will be seen from the Sanitary Inspector's Report that every effort is made to alleviate the unsatisfactory conditions which exist.

In those areas where the provision of a sewerage scheme cannot be forseen work has continued on the conversion of insanitary privies and pail closets to water carriage or some other

satisfactory system.

River Pollution.

The River Stour, which runs throught the District, has shown no improvement during the past year. The pollution entering upstream appears to be as great as ever. It is hoped that the authorities concerned will take some active and energetic steps to remedy this.

All existing sewerage schemes have proved satisfactory during

the year.

Prevalence of and Control over Infectious and Other Diseases. Immunisations against Diphtheria.

The importance of early immunisation of infants against diphtheria, and the necessity for a reinforcing dose on entering school is constantly brought to the notice of all parents. The response has been fairly satisfactory, but there is still room for improvement.

A further 124 children under 5 years and 40 children from 5 to 14 years of age were given primary courses of treatment during the year, and 139 were given booster doses.

No cases of diphtheria occurred in the district during the year.

It was not necessary to take any action under the Public Health Act (Prevention of Tuberculosis Regulations) 1925, or under Section 172 of the Public Health Act, 1936.

Conclusion.

It is very pleasing to note the good progress made by the Council with the provision of adequate housing, water supplies and sewerage in the District. Existing services have proved satisfactory, but much remains to be done in all these fields even when proposed schemes have reached completion. One of the most urgent problems facing the Council is to bring the general level of housing and sanitation in the village of Cookley up to a satisfactory standard.

In the absence of further legislation under the Rent Restriction Acts, we shall continue to experience great difficulty in bringing the older type of cottage property in the District up to modern requirements. However, action will be taken whenever possible.

I should like to thank the Chairman and Members of the Council and all Officials for their help and co-operation during the year.

Gentlemen,

I have much pleasure in submitting my Annual Report on the Sanitary Administration within the Rural District for the year ended 31st December, 1952.

INFECTIOUS DISEASE AND DISINFECTION.

Number of visits made to premises re cases of infectious disease and disinfection: 68.

Disinfection of premises and articles which have been exposed to infection is carried out where necessary by means of disinfectant and formaldehyde lamps.

MEAT, MILK AND OTHER FOODS.

Meat.

All meat sold in the shops in the district comes from the Central Slaughterhouse in the Borough of Kidderminster.

It is pleasing to report that it has not been necessary to take any action with regard to any of the supplies.

The Butchers have maintained their premises in a satisfactory condition throughout the year.

No meat was condemned during the year.

Milk.

Close contact has been maintained with all milk distributors in the area and no infringements of the Regulations have been met with. The supply of heat treated milk by dealers from other districts is rapidly increasing with a consequent reduction in the quantity of raw milk consumed in the district. The majority of the raw milk is now supplied in bottles.

Other Foods.

All food premises in the area have been inspected regularly and it has been found that the shopkeepers have done their best to comply with the Byelaws. The majority of our village shops have been established for many years and their structural conversion to modern standards is very difficult. The Council are progressing with their sewerage schemes for several villages and this will make the position much easier with regard to sanitary accommodation.

Ice Cream.

Having only two small manufacturers of ice cream, the vast majority of ice-cream sold in the district comes from large concerns in other areas. This ice-cream is almost invariably supplied to the customer in cartons or wrappings.

It has not been necessary to draw attention to any infringements during the year.

Cafes, etc.

All cafes, etc., have been inspected and on the whole there has been little of which to complain. The majority of the premises with catering licences are existing country cottages serving occasional meals.

PUBLIC CLEANSING.

Refuse Collection and Disposal.

On 18th June, the Council took delivery of a new 8 cubic yard S.D. Freighter and as from that date refuse collection in the Rural Area has been carried out by two Council lorries and one Contractors lorry.

The built-up areas have received fortnightly collections and the sparsely populated areas monthly collections. Collections have again suffered because of the lack of a tip in the Blakedown area involving hauls to Wolverley tip of some six to seven miles. Every endeavour should be made to solve this problem.

In spite of its excessive use the Wolverley tip has given excellent service and caused no nuisance.

Night Soil Collection.

A weekly collection of night soil is made from Chaddesley Corbett Village. The work is done by a local contractor, who uses a motor lorry provided with suitable bins for the carriage of the night soil. No complaints have been received with regard to the manner in which this work is done.

The Council's proposed Sewerage Scheme for the village will render this service unnecessary, but as a temporary measure the system is as efficient as possible.

Cesspools.

Pending the installation of the Council's proposed sewers, nuisances from overflowing cesspools have again been dealt with by the use of a hired cesspool emptying vehicle. 190 cesspools have been emptied at the owners' expense, and the service has been considerably extended.

HOUSING.

1952 saw excellent progress with the Council's Housing Programme, 91 houses being erected as compared with 42 in 1951. This enabled the Council to deal with the majority of the very serious cases on the Waiting List and it is now apparent that most applicants now requiring accommodation are young married couples (with or without children) living in rooms.

It must be remembered however, that the Council will shortly be faced with the problem of re-housing families from houses which are waiting to be dealt with under the Housing Acts. In the main, this will affect the parish of Cookley where the general housing standard is low. The situation with regard to applications at the end of the year is shown in the following table:—
