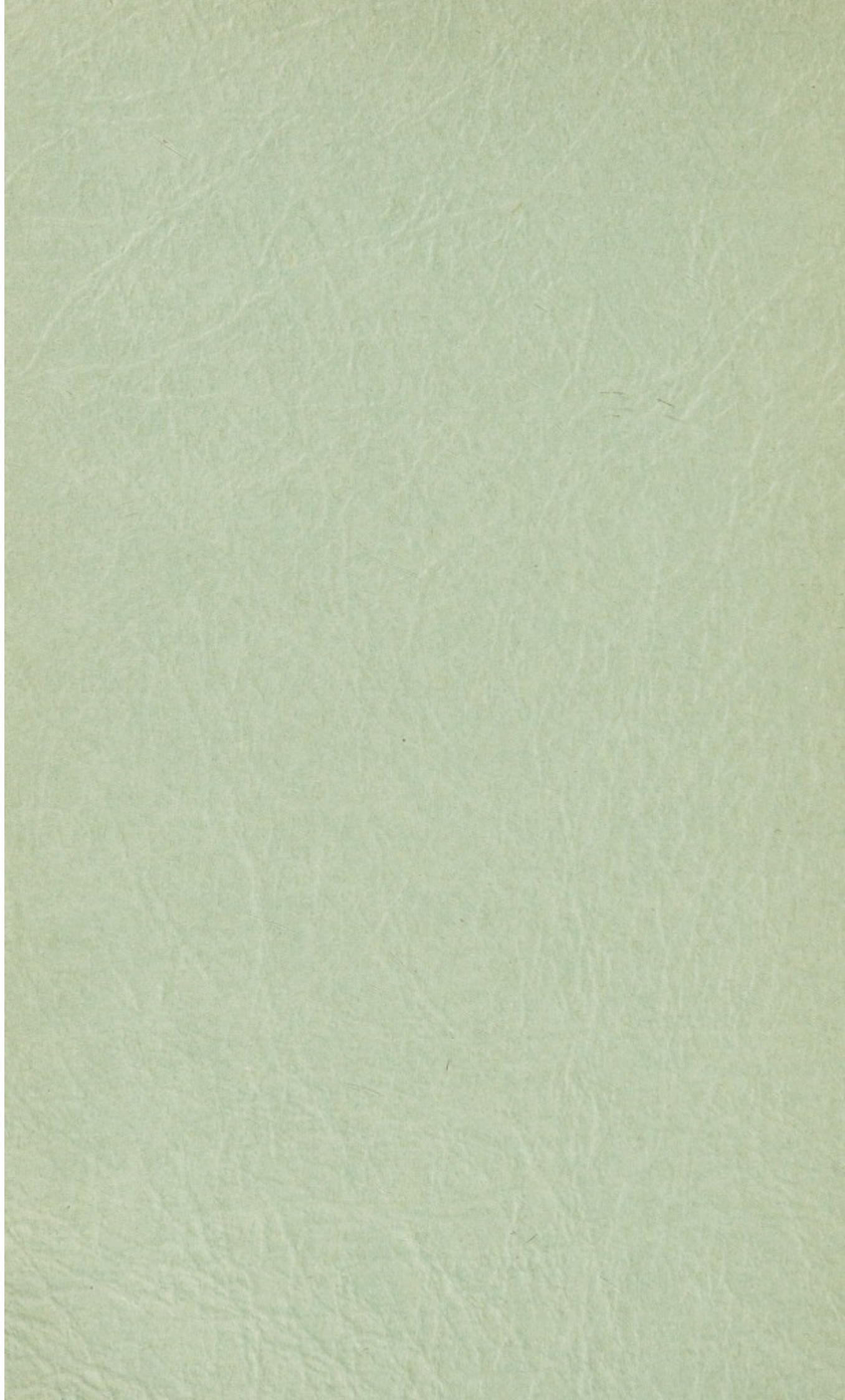

## **SECTION B.**

### **General Provision of Health Services in the Area.**

#### **Staff.**

I have the assistance and co-operation of the Public Health Inspector, Mr. R. S. Porter, who holds the Certificate of the Royal Sanitary Institute as Inspector of Meat and other Foods, and of Mrs. J. E. Johnson as Public Health Clerk.

#### **Laboratory Facilities.**

The Worcestershire County Council Laboratories are available for the chemical examination of water, milk and foodstuffs, and the work is carried out by the County Analyst.

All clinical bacteriology is carried out by the Public Health Laboratory, situated at Worcester Royal Infirmary.

#### **Ambulance Facilities.**

For Infectious Diseases an ambulance is provided by the Regional Hospital Board, and operates from Hayley Green Hospital.

For other cases an ambulance service is provided by the County Council, and operates from Kidderminster.

#### **Nursing at Home.**

There are four District Nurses in the area, who also practise as Midwives and act as Health Visitors. Two other District Nurses and one Health Visitor also deal with portions of the Area.

#### **Infant Welfare Centres.**

There are six Infant Welfare Centres in the area — at Far Forest, Wolverley, Cookley, Chaddesley Corbett, Blakedown and Gorst Hill, where immunisation and vaccination is carried out.

The Welfare Centre at Wribbenhall is also used by residents of the Area.

#### **Hospitals.**

The Kidderminster and District General Hospital is available for all residents in our Area, but some patients are admitted direct or transferred to All Saints' Hospital, Bromsgrove, which is most difficult of access to their relatives.

For Infectious Diseases the Isolation Hospital at Hayley Green is available.

### **Tuberculosis.**

This work is the responsibility of the Regional Hospital Board, who arrange sanatorium treatment where possible. Dispensaries are held every Tuesday at 6-30 p.m., Wednesday at 10 a.m., and Thursday at 2 p.m. at the Kidderminster General Hospital, where Dr. R. Cronin attends.

The County Council are responsible for prevention and after-care and this work is administered locally by the After-Care Sub-Committee of the Divisional Area Committee.

### **Venereal Disease.**

The Regional Hospital Board arrange for treatment and follow-up of these cases at the Kidderminster General Hospital.

## **SECTION C.**

### **Sanitary Circumstances of the Area.**

#### **Water.**

The Council own approximately 90 miles of water pipes, and the water in the Rural District is supplied by :

- (1) The Council's Borehole at Cookley.
- (2) The City of Birmingham Elan Aqueduct.
- (3) The Stourbridge Water Board.
- (4) The East Worcestershire Water Board.
- (5) The South Staffordshire Waterworks Company.
- (6) Kidderminster Corporation.

The supply is satisfactory both in regard to quality and quantity.

The Public Health Inspector submitted 19 samples of water from the six main sources for chemical and bacteriological examination. All the samples were satisfactory.

The above figures are approximate. Included in the 691 houses supplied from standpipes are several areas of bungalow development, and camping sites.

## Drainage and Sewerage.

The Wolverley and Cookley Sewerage Scheme is proving most satisfactory. There remain a few properties to be connected, including the Wolverley Elementary Schools, and it is hoped that there will be no further delay in completing the work necessary to bring them into line.

In areas likely to remain unsewered further progress has been made in conversion to water carriage to efficient private disposal plants.

As a result of the Council's progressive building programme, the number of cases of overcrowding in the Area has been reduced to very small proportions.

**Prevalence of and Control over Infectious and Other Diseases. Immunisations against Diphtheria.**

The rate of immunisation against diphtheria has not materially altered and parents are continually urged to take full advantage of the available facilities.

A further 95 children under five years and 22 children from 5 to 15 years of age were given primary courses of treatment.

No cases of diphtheria were notified.



### Vaccination against Smallpox

During the year 81 children under one year, 9 children from two to four years, 5 children from five to fourteen years, and 7 persons over fifteen years were given primary vaccination. Seven children from five to fourteen and 11 persons over fifteen were re-vaccinated.

## Milk.

There has been further evidence of the advantages gained from the wholesale pasteurisation of milk supplies. There has been no concrete evidence of the alleged sale of loose milk.

Efforts have been made to educate the consumers to clean thoroughly empty bottles before return to the retailer. This still remains a problem, but there is evidence of an improvement

## Ice Cream.

Having only one small manufacturer of ice cream, the vast majority of ice-cream sold in the district comes from large concerns in other areas. This ice-cream is almost invariably supplied to the customer in cartons or wrappings.

**PUBLIC CLEANSING.****Refuse Collection and Disposal.**

This service is carried out by three lorries. One S.D. Freighter with a crew of three, one 3-ton Bedford Eagle lorry with a crew of three, and a Contractor's lorry manned by two men.

The S.D. Freighter covers the parishes of Wolverley, Cookley, Churchill and Blakedown and Broome and gives a fortnightly service to these built up areas. The Bedford deals with the parishes of Chaddesley Corbett, Stone and Rushock and gives a fortnightly service. The parishes of Rock, Upper Arley, Kidderminster Foreign and Ribbesford are dealt with by the Contractor.

All these tips are regularly sprayed with D.D.T. and other insecticides and little nuisance has arisen from flies, crickets, etc.



### Night Soil Collection.

A weekly collection of night soil is made from Chaddesley Corbett Village. The work is done by a local contractor, who uses a motor lorry provided with suitable bins for the carriage of the night soil. No complaints have been received with regard to the manner in which this work is done. The tenants of the houses concerned are to be congratulated on the way in which they cope with the situation and there has been no cause to draw their attention to any matter during the year.

The Council's proposed Sewerage Scheme for the village will render this service unnecessary, but as a temporary measure the system is as efficient as possible.

### Cesspools.

As the Council have been unable to continue hiring a Cesspool-emptying Vehicle, this work has been carried out by private contractors.

With the progress made and due to be made in the provision of Sewers, there is not sufficient work of this nature to warrant the purchase or permanent hire of a vehicle. The work done privately has been carried out satisfactorily and with no complaints.

### WATER SUPPLY.

The Rural District is very well supplied with water from several sources. Bacteriological samples are regularly taken and when necessary chemical analyses are made. Details of samples taken are as follows :

It was not necessary to draw the attention of any Licencee to any serious infringements of the Acts.

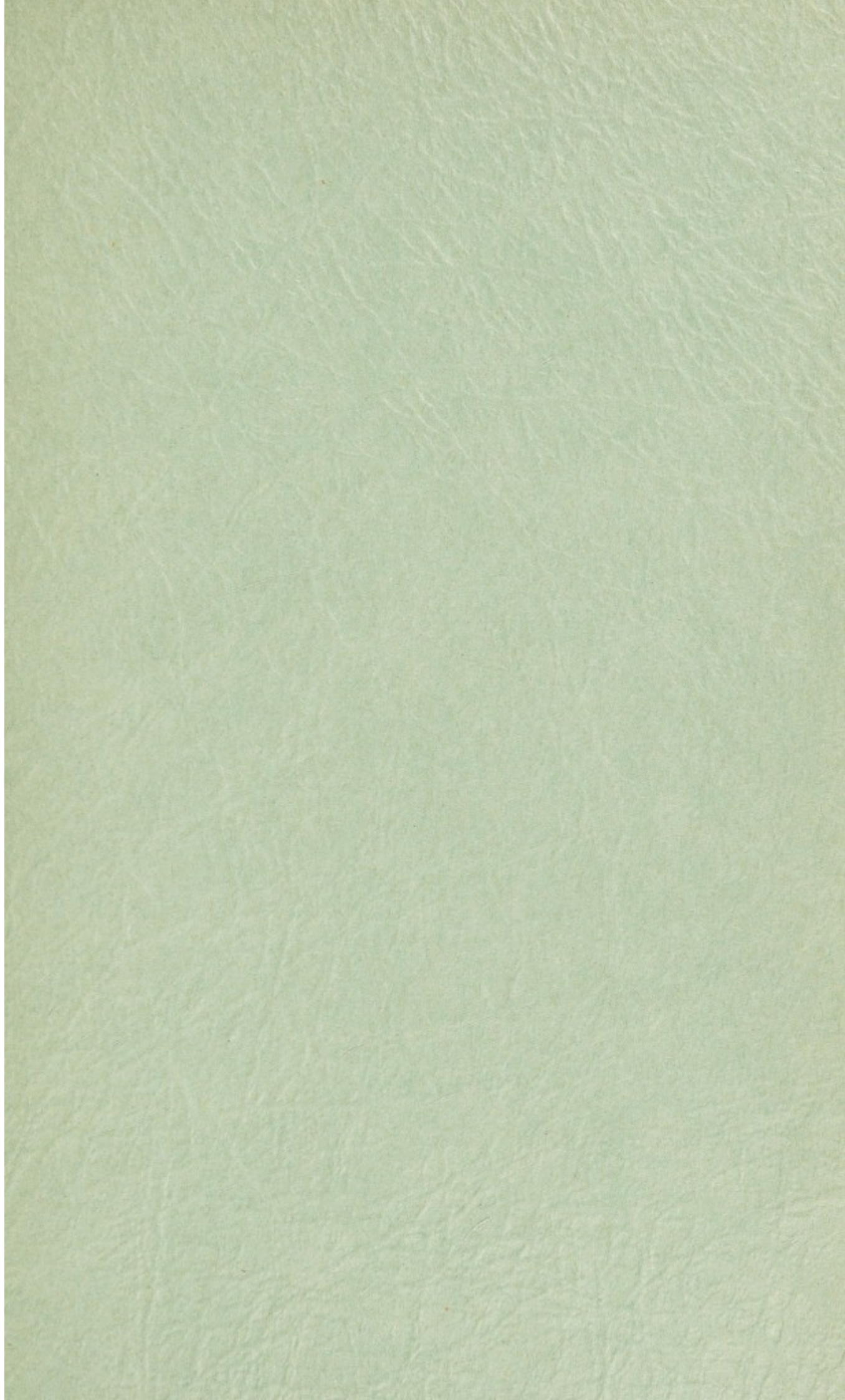
