

# General Provision of Health Services in the Area Staff

I have the assistance and co-operation of the Public Health Inspector, Mr. R. S. Porter, who holds the Certificate of the Royal Sanitary Institute as Inspector of Meat and Other Foods, Mr. C. G. Knott, Assistant, and of Mrs. I. M. Mann as Public Health Clerk.

# Laboratory Facilities

The Worcestershire County Council Laboratories are available for the chemical examination of water, milk and foodstuffs, and the work is carried out by the County Analyst.

All clinical bacteriology is carried out by the Public Health Laboratory situated at Worcester Royal Infirmary.

## **Ambulance Facilities**

For Infectious Diesases an ambulance is provided by the Regional Hospital Board, and operates from Hayley Green Hospital.

For other cases an ambulance service is provided by the County Council. A system of wireless control is based at the operational headquarters at the County Medical Officer of Health's offices at Love's Grove, Worcester; telephone numbers Worcester 21611/5.

The ambulance station at Kidderminster has been augmented and now operates on a fully manned twenty-four hour basis

# Nursing at Home

There are four District Nurses in the area, who also practise as Midwives and act as Health Visitors. Two other District Nurses and one Health Visitor also deal with portions of the area.

#### Infant Welfare Centres

There are six Infant Welfare Centres in the area — at Far Forest, Wolverley, Cookley, Chaddesley Corbett, Blakedown and Gorst Hill, where immunisation and vaccination is carried out.

The Welfare Centre at Wribbenhall is also used by residents of the area.

The Doctor is in attendance at the clinics on the following days:—

Far Forest — 2nd Tuesday even months.
Gorst Hill — 2nd Wednesday odd months.
Wolverley — 1st Tuesday each month.
Cookley — 2nd Friday each month.
Blakedown — 4th Thursday each month.
Wribbenhall — 3rd Tuesday each month.
Chaddesley Corbett — 1st Thursday each month.

## Hospitals

The Kidderminster and District General Hospital is available for all residents in our Area, but some patients are admitted direct or transferred to All Saints' Hospital, Bromsgrove, which is most difficult of access to their relatives.

For Infectious Diseases the Isolation Hospital at Hayley

Green is available.

#### Tuberculosis

This work is the responsibility of the Regional Hospital Board, who arrange santorium treatment when necessary. Dispensaries are held every Tuesday at 6.30 p.m., Wednesday at 10.0 a.m., and Thursday at 2.0 p.m., at the Kidderminster General Hospital, where Dr. R. Cronin attends.

The County Council are responsible for prevention and after-care and this work is administered locally by the After-

Care Sub-Committee.

## **Venereal Disease**

The Regional Hospital Board arrange for treatment and follow-up of these cases at the Kidderminster General Hospital.

# Sanitary Circumstances of the Area

Water

# Elan Valley Water Supply to Trimpley and Low Habberley

In July a routine sample of water was taken from number 3, Low Habberley, and a certificate was received from the County Public Health Laboratory stating that the water was unfit for drinking by reason of the presence of 35 parts per 100 ml coliform bacilli and part 1 per 100 ml Bact. coli.

The North West Worcestershire Water Board was informed at once and further sampling was carried out.

All consumers on the main were notified of the necessity to boil all drinking water until further notice.

Continuous flushing of the mains was carried out but the trouble was not eradicated.

Despite exhaustive investigations as to the cause by the Water Board and your Health Department, no certain source of pollution was discovered and it was decided to chlorinate the supply.

A temporary connection was made to the main supplying the Bridgnorth Rural District Council treated with chlorinated water. This work ensured a safe supply of water pending the installation of a new chlorinator on the existing main.

The Public Health Inspector submitted 27 other samples of water from the main sources of supply for the area for chemical and bacteriological examination. All the samples were satisfactory.

# Drainage and Sewage Chaddesley Corbett

The year has seen the near completion of the sewer connections on the line of the new sewer. A few properties remain to be connected, but all are the subject of major conversion schemes and are in hand.

This scheme has, in my opinion, been one of the major improvements which have been carried out in the District and has, without doubt, enhanced the beauty of this black and white village and proved of great Public Health benefit. Credit is due to all concerned, particularly the owners of properties and the occupants for their forebearing attitude during the years.

# Callow Hill, Rock

The provision of an adequate sewerage scheme for this area is even more urgent in view of the continuing modernisation of properties in this area and especially the installation of modern sanitation. It is again recommended that action be taken in the very near future.

#### River Pollution

#### River Stour and Canal

The pollution of the rivers and streams in the area still remains a serious problem but it is anticipated that action which will be taken under the Rivers (Prevention of Pollution) Act, will bring about a steady improvement in the future.

During the year the problem of the overloading of the sewers in the Blakedown area came to a head when it was proved that the present Disposal Works were totally inadequate to deal with the ever-increasing amounts of sewage.

Immediate emergency steps were taken to improve the effluent and the Council decided to push ahead with the enlargement of these works.

Both myself and the Chief Public Health Inspector cannot emphasise too strongly the absolute necessity for this work to be carried out without delay as there has been no major extension carried out to these works since they were installed in 1904.

# Immunisation against Diphtheria

Our efforts to persuade all parents to bring their children for immunisation continued as before.

A further 159 children under five years of age and 17 children from five to fifteen years of age were given primary courses of treatment and 174 were given booster doses.

No cases of Diphtheria were notified.

# Vaccination against Smallpox

During the year 38 persons were vaccinated and 19 were re-vaccinated.

As a result of frequent visits, personal contact and distribution of handbills of guidance there has been no need to bring to the notice of food traders any serious infringement of regulations. They have a good sense of their responsibilities to the general public and are willing to adopt any reasonable suggestion made by the Health Department.

The storage of food in deep freeze has received concentrated attention during the year, and the attention of all food traders has been drawn to the absolute necessity of maintaining the equipment in perfect condition and the continual turnover of stock.

#### Ice Cream

There is only one small ice cream manufacturer in this district, and this being a family concern of long standing is run under very good conditions. There has been no need to draw attention to any infringement of the Regulations

All other ice cream sold in the area comes from large concerns in other areas.

# Refuse Collection and Disposal

Until the end of March this service was carried out by three lorries. One S.D. Freighter with a crew of three, one 3ton Bedford Eagle lorry with a crew of three, and a Con-

tractor's lorry manned by two men.

The S.D. Freighter covered the parishes of Wolverley, Cookley, Churchill and Blakedown and Broome and gave a fortnightly service to these built-up areas. The Bedford dealt with the parishes of Chaddesley Corbett, Stone and Rushock and gave a fortnightly service. The parishes of Rock, Upper Arley, Kidderminster Foreign and Ribbesford were dealt with by the Contractor.

After that date, due to the delivery of a new 14 cu. yd. S.D. Fore and Aft Tipper, the Council were able to considerably improve the refuse collection schedule.

# Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960

The Kidderminster Rural District is such that many thousands of holiday makers spend considerable periods in caravans throughout the district. Up to the moment thirty-two sites comprising 604 caravans are licensed and facilities have been provided in accordance with the Model Standards.

It is pleasing to be able to record that almost without exception, owners and occupiers of sites have faced up to their responsibility and shown every co-operation.

A close touch has been maintained with the Worcester City and County Fire Brigade, and their suggestions with regard to fire fighting arrangements have been adopted.

The caravan dwellers themselves are almost without exception a good type who take pride in the maintenance of their caravans and sites.

There still remain a number of sites which are still in a state of flux with regard to the Town and Country Planning Acts.
