#### SECTION B.

#### General Provision of Health Services in the Area

#### Staff

I have the assistance and co-operation of the Public Health Inspector, Mr. R. S. Porten who holds the Certificate of the Royal Sanitary Institute as Inspector of Meat and Other Foods, and of Mrs. I. M. Mann as Public Health Clerk.

#### Laboratory Facilities

The Worcestershire County Council Laboratories are available for the chemical examination of water, milk and foodstuffs, and the work is carried out by the County Analyst.

All clinical bacteriology is carried out by the Public Health Laboratory situated at Worcester Royal Infirmary.

#### **Ambulance Facilities**

For Infectious Diseases an ambulance is provided by the Regional Hospital Board and operates from Hayley Green.

For other cases an ambulance service is provided by the County Council, the operational headquarters of which are based at the County Medical Officer of Health's offices at Love's Grove, Worcester—telephone numbers Worcester 21611/5.

The ambulance station at Kidderminster operates a fully manned twenty-four hour service.

#### Nursing at Home

There are four District Nurses in the area, who also practice as Midwives and act as Health Visitors. Two other District Nurses and one Health Visitor also deal with portions of the area.

#### Infant Welfare Centres

There are six Infant Welfare Centres in the area—at Far Forest, Wolverley, Cookley, Chaddesley Corbett, Blakedown and Gorst Hill, where immunisation and vaccination are carried out.

The Welfare Centre at Wribbenhall is also used by residents of the area.

The Doctor is in attendance at the clinics on the following days:—

Far Forest — 2nd Tuesday even months.

Gorst Hill — 2nd Wednesday odd months.

Wolverley — 1st and 3rd Tuesday each month.

Cookley — 2nd and 4th Friday each month.

Blakedown — 4th Thursday each month.

Wribbenhall — 4th Tuesday each month.

Chaddesley Corbett — 1st Thursday each month.

#### Hospitals

The Kidderminster and District General Hospital is available for all residents in our area, but some patients are admitted direct or transferred to All Saints' Hospital, Bromsgrove, which is most difficult of access to their relatives.

For Infectious Diseases the Isolation Hospital at Hayley Green is available.

For maternity cases beds are available in the Croft Maternity Home, Kidderminster, and the Lucy Baldwin Maternity Home, Stourport-on-Severn, and for those requiring admission to hospital, All Saints' Hospital, Bromsgrove, and Loveday Street Hospital, Birmingham.

#### Tuberculosis

This work is the responsibility of the Regional Hospital Board, who arrange sanatorium treatment when necessary. Dispensaries are held every Tuesday at 6.30 p.m., Wednesday at 10.0 a.m. and Thursday at 2.0 p.m. at the Kidderminster General Hospital, where Dr. R. Cronin attends.

The County Council are responsible for prevention and aftercare and this work is administered locally by the After-Care Sub-Committee.

#### Veneral Disease

Owing to staffing changes and the relatively small attendances the Clinic at Kidderminster General Hospital was closed during the year. Facilities are now available at:

Worcester Royal Infirmary — Mondays, Tuesdays and Fridays.

Royal Hospital, Wolverhampton — Mondays, Tuesdays, and Thursdays.

Dudley Guest Hospital — Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays.

#### SECTION C.

## SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

#### Water

The major water supply in this district is obtained from the North West Worcestershire Water Board, with whom the closest contact is maintained. Results of the analysis of samples taken both mains and local are shared.

The Public Health Inspector submitted 36 samples of water from the main sources of supply for the area for chemical and bacteriological examination. All the samples were satisfactory.

#### **Chaddesley Corbett**

The new sewage disposal scheme is functioning satisfactorily and has brought about a great improvement in the sanitary conditions of this area.

#### Callow Hill

With further development occurring in this area the urgency of an adequate sewarage scheme is even more apparent and the Council are strongly recommended to proceed with this.

#### Blakedown

The Surveyor's Department continues to battle with a deteriorating situation in this area and despite every effort new plant is urgently required.

#### Upper Arley

Work has been in progress throughout the year on the new scheme for this village and its completion is anxiously awaited in order that the local sanitary conditions can be improved.

#### Immunisation against Diptheria

Our efforts to persuade all parents to bring their children for immunisation continued as before.

149 children under five years of age and 10 children from five to fifteen years of age were given primary courses of treatment and 220 were given booster doses.

No cases of Diptheria were notified.

#### Vaccination against Smallpox

During the year 90 persons were vaccinated and 3 were revaccinated.

There has been no necessity to bring to the notice of food traders any serious infringements of regulations. They have a good sense of their responsibilities to the general public and are willing to adopt any reasonable suggestion made by the Health Department. The storage of food in deep freeze has been very successfully carried out.

There are two race meetings at Chaddesley Corbett each year, the catering arrangements for which are in the hands of reputable firms of caterers. Considering that these meetings are for one day only, standards of hygiene have been very good.

Personal contact has again been maintained with all persons handling food in the district.

#### Ice Cream

Having only one small manufacturer of ice cream the vast majority of ice cream sold in the district comes from large concerns in other areas. This ice cream is almost invariably supplied to the customer in cartons or wrappings.

It has not been necessary to draw attention to any infringements during the year.

#### Refuse Collection and Disposal

This service is carried out by three S. and D. Freighters.

It is the Council's firm intention to considerably improve this system during 1966 in order to provide more frequent collections throughout the district.

Tipping is carried out at the tip at Caunsall and methods of

controlled tipping have been applied throughout the year.

The refuse has been tipped in fingers which have been

regularly covered with soil and ashes.

The refuse tip is sprayed with insecticide before covering and the nuisance from flies was kept at an absolute minimum.

A regular supply of soil for covering purposes has been

assured for future use.

The tip is surrounded with trees and bushes of several types and every endeavour has been made to retain as many as possible as they act as a very efficient screen.

#### Caravan Sites and Control of Development Act, 1960

The Kidderminster Rural District is such that many thousands of holiday makers spend considerable periods in caravans throughout the district. Up to the moment thirty sites comprising 604 caravans are licensed and facilities have been provided in accordance with the Model Standards.

It is pleasing to be able to record that owners and occupiers of sites have faced up to their responsibility and shown every co-

operation.

A close touch has been maintained with the Worcester City and County Fire Brigade and their suggestions with regard to fire

fighting arrangements have been adopted.

The caravan dwellers themselves are almost without exception a good type who take pride in the maintenance of their caravans and sites. In several instances Site Committees have been set up and these Committees have maintained the closest contact with the Council and its Officials.

#### Water Supply

Bacteriological samples of the water supplies in the Rural District are regularly taken and when necessary chemical analyses are made. Details of samples taken are as follows:—
