### STATISTICS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE AREA.

Area—70,818 acres.

Population—11,950.

Number of Inhabited Houses at the end of 1955, according to the Rate Book—4,022.

Number of Unoccupied Houses—160.

Rateable Value—£69,308.

Sum represented by a Penny Rate—£276. 9s. 10d.

The Area is mainly an agricultural one, although on the coast line many of the inhabitants are employed in sea-faring pursuits.

There is an annual influx of visitors during the holiday season over the whole of the district, to which they are attracted by the favourable climate and the beauty of the surroundings.

### GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

The PUBLIC HEALTH OFFICERS OF THE AUTHORITY are a Medical Officer of Health (also Medical Officer of Health of Plympton Rural District, Kingsbridge Urban District, Salcombe Urban District, Kingsbridge and Salcombe Port Sanitary Authority, and Medical Officer to the South Devon Water Board).

Deputy Medical Officer of Health (occasional). One whole-time Surveyor and Sanitary Inspector.

One whole-time Sanitary Inspector.

LABORATORY FACILITIES. The Public Health Laboratory Service provides a service at the South Devon and East Cornwall Hospital, Plymouth, for the investigation of communicable disease and the examination of milk, water supplies, ice cream and foodstuffs, etc.

This Laboratory is of great assistance and I am grateful for

their willing co-operation at all times.

VACCINATION AND IMMUNISATION are carried out through the general practitioner service or at schools, school clinics and infant welfare centres by the County Council through the County Health Services. Supplies of Diphtheria antigen can be obtained from the County Medical Officer, 45, St. David's Hill, Exeter, and vaccine lymph from the Public Health Laboratory Service, 7 Dix's Field, Exeter.

NURSING ARRANGEMENTS.—District Nurses and Midwives (Devon County Council). There are seven District Nurses/ Midwives working in the area, including one County Staff Sister in charge of the group. Supervision is carried out by the County Nursing Officers. All midwives in the area are qualified to ad-

minister analgesics.

MIDWIVES.—The Midwives' Act is administered by the County Council which investigates cases of Maternal Mortality and Puerperal Disease. There are seven practising midwives in the District.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE CENTRE.—There is a centre in Kingsbridge which is open on Wednesday afternoons,

except on the first Wednesday in each month.

VENEREAL DISEASES TREATMENT.—At the Venereal Disease Dept., City Hospital, Plymouth. Female in-patients are also sent to St. Mary's Home, Exeter. A refund of rail or bus fare can be made in suitable cases by applying to the Medical Officer of the Centre.

Treatment is also available from a certain number of selected General Medical Practitioners specially approved for the purpose by the Ministry of Health. There is one such practitioner at

Modbury and another at Kingsbridge.

OPEN-AIR SCHOOL.—The Devon County Council maintain a residential home for the rehabilitation of delicate and debilitated children at Oaklands Park, Dawlish. There is also an open-air school for delicate children at Torquay.

ORTHOPAEDIC TREATMENT is available through the Devon Orthopaedic Association as In-patients at Exeter and Ivybridge; and for adults at Mount Gold Hospital, Plymouth. For Out-patients there is a clinic at Kingsbridge and the South-West Clinic which deals with this district as well, is held at Hartley House, Mannamead, Plymouth.

X-RAYS. The Regional Hospital Board have apparatus for examinations at their Chest Clinics at Exeter, Torquay, Barnstaple and Plymouth.

THE SOUTH HAMS COTTAGE HOSPITAL provides beds for 16 patients from Kingsbridge and the surrounding districts:

ISOLATION HOSPITAL. Cases of infectious disease are sent to the Scott Isolation Hospital. Patients are removed by the Plymouth Ambulance Service on behalf of the Devon County Council.

AMBULANCE SERVICES. The Ambulance Service throughout Devon is operated in accordance with Section 27 (2) of the National Health Service Act, 1946, through the agency of the Voluntary Organisations. Infectious cases in the Plymouth Infectious Area are carried, by agreement, in the Plymouth Infectious Ambulance.

DOMESTIC HELP SERVICE. In Kingsbridge there is a Home Help Service operated on behalf of the County Medical Dept. by the W.V.S. Home helps are also made available in other areas on application to the Devon County Council.

AGRICULTURAL SUPPLIES.

The South Devon Water Board continue to make the Moorland Supply available to farms in the district. SAMPLING.

During the year, 294 samples of Moorland Water were submitted for bacteriological examination.

It should be noted that the majority of samples falling within Grades 3—4 were taken from new mains in the course of sterilization prior to them being brought into supply.

### SEWERAGE.

- AVETON GIFFORD. The new sewage outfall for this village has been completed. The sewer was extended towards the Council's Housing Estate, the works which dealt separately with the drainage of these houses were by-passed, and the houses linked up with the main sewage system.
- BLACKAWTON. In order to obviate the overloading of the sewage outfall works, a new length of sewer has been laid through the main village street, and large quantities of surface water have been eliminated from the main system.
- Charleton. Approximately fifty yards of cracked and broken pipes have been replaced by new pipes on the 6in. sewer outfall, and the new piping surrounded by concrete to prevent further damage.
- CHIVELSTONE—EAST PRAWLE. To effectively treat the effluent from the sewage outfall before being discharged into the stream, a rotary filter, together with filter bed and humus tanks, have been installed.
- Churchstow. A revised scheme for draining the village of Churchstow is in course of preparation.
- Malborough. A new sewage outfall to deal with the sewage from houses on the Northern side of the village and from a nearby camp has been completed. The sewer has also been extended so that seven dwellings which had no drainage facilities could link up with the new sewage system.
- South Milton. Work on constructing a new sewage outfall for this village is in progress.
- STOKENHAM—CHILLINGTON. Schemes for dealing with the sewage from these two villages was the subject of a Ministry Inquiry. A tender has been accepted for dealing with the Stokenham sewage, and work will commence as soon as approval has been given by the Ministry to the accepted tender.

  The Council's Engineers have been instructed to submit a new

scheme to deal with the sewage of Chillington.

#### PUBLIC CONVENIENCES.

Two new public conveniences have been erected, namely: one at Bigbury-on-Sea (privately owned) and one at Outer Hope.

These facilities are of great benefit to the large number of persons who visit these popular seaside resorts.

### SANITARY INSPECTION OF THE AREA.

COMPLAINTS. 19 complaints were received and dealt with, six by formal action, and the remainder by informal action.

DISINFECTIONS. 14 premises were disinfected due to the occurence of infectious disease and a further six premises were

found to be verminous and were fumigated.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS AND CAMPING SITES. 18 inspections were made of various sites in the area. During the year 28 applications were received, nine applications related to individual caravans, eleven applications related to land used for camping purposes.

Most of the camping in the district is centred in four different

areas, namely:

Challaborough—Three licensed sites—one for 300 caravans,

one for 150 caravans, and one for 100 caravans.

Pennymore Lane—one licensed site for 40 moveable dwellings. Beesands Green—one licensed site for 100 caravans.

Stoke Fleming—one licensed site for 60 caravans.

### INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOODS.

REGISTERED PREMISES. A further three properties were registered under Section 14 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1948, for the sale of ice-cream. The total number of premises now registered for this purpose is 42.

Twenty-four samples of ice-cream were submitted to the Public Health Laboratory for examination and were graded as

INSPECTIONS. 82 inspections were made of shops, ice cream vendors, bakehouses, butchers' shops, dairies and other premises in the area.

### SLAUGHTERHOUSES.

There are six properties licensed as slaughterhouses, two of which are used by wholesalers and four by private butchers.

### MEAT INSPECTION.

Meat inspection duties take up a considerable amount of time of the Inspector engaged in this work.

For the period ended 31st December, 1955, the following work

was carried out:

No. of visits to slaughterhouses-797.

Mileage travelled in connection with this work—9,967.

Time spent on meat inspection duties—807 hours.

Carcases inspected: Bulls, 1; Cows, 338; Bullocks and Heifers 625; Calves, 304; Pigs, 1847; Sheep and Lambs, 4,845, making a total of 7960 carcases.

The amount of meat condemned was 9 tons 8 cwts. 2 qrs. and 12 lbs.

Arrangements have been made for diseased meat to be disposed

of to firms with sterilizing plant.

I am grateful to the Salcombe and Kingsbridge Urban District Councils for their assistance in this work when the Council's Inspector is away.

### REFUSE DISPOSAL.

The Council provide a fortnightly collection of incombustible household refuse throughout the district. This is disposed of in five refuse tips within the area.

Some difficulty is experienced in maintaining a fortnightly collection of refuse, due to the increased demand for this service and the limited capacity of the existing vehicle. Delivery was taken of a new Karrier Dual Tip Refuse Collector during the year, and this helped to maintain the service during the peak periods.

The Council is still actively engaged in the collection of salvage throughout the district, and a special collection is made for this purpose.

During the year ended March 31st, 1956, the following items were collected and sold:

Paper, 145 tons; Rags, etc., 5 tons; Non-Ferrous Metals, 4 tons; Iron, 15\frac{1}{3} tons; Glass, 1 ton; Bones, 19 cwts.; and Rubber Tubes, 3 cwts., making a total of 171 tons 7 cwts.

Regular inspections are made of all tips especially with regard to rodent and insect control.
