

#### ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

#### MEDICAL OFFICER OF HEALTH

FOR THE YEAR 1964

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to present the Report on the health of the district for the year 1964.

The area is mainly agricultural, although on the coast many of the inhabitants are employed in seafaring pursuits. The beauty of the whole area, coast and inland, attracts many visitors throughout the year, the largest number, naturally, being during the summer months. Catering for these visitors is one of the main sources of livelihood for many residents of the district. There are, situated geographically within the district, the Urban Districts of Kingsbridge and Salcombe.

PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

The personal health services are provided by various bodies, by far the greater part being under the control of the Regional Hospital Board, Devon County Council and the Local Executive Council. The environmental health services are controlled by the District Council.

The Public Health Laboratory Service has a laboratory in Plymouth for the investigation of communicable diseases and the examination of milk, water, ice cream, foodstuffs, etc.

The Devon County Health Handbook gives details of the health and allied social services in the County of Devon. Much of its information refers to the County as a whole, but there are details of the various services provided in this district.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There were few cases of the infectious diseases of childhood. The one case of Sonne Dysentery occurred in a visitor to the district and no other cases arose from it. The number of new notifications of tuberculosis remained low.

WATER SUPPLY.

Water is supplied by the South West Devon Water Board. The sources remain the same being chiefly for this district from the Avon Reservoir, with additional water on occasion from the Ranney Works on the River Dart.

The water is treated by flocculation and filtration. It is chlorinated and the pH is adjusted. The quality is of a high standard and it is adequate in quantity for the needs of the district.

Copies of reports of all samples taken by the Board are forwarded to this department. We are grateful for all the information passed to us by the board.

Samples of water are taken in schools by the County Public Health Department. Copies of these reports are received.

There are a number of small private supplies. Inspection of these and sampling of the water is carried out as necessary.

The amount of fluoride present naturally is negligible.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES.

Work on the conveniences at Millbay, East Portlemouth, is likely to commence shortly. It is possible that conveniences will be required at Wonwell, Soar Mill and Lannacombe.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD

A considerable amount of work has been done inspecting food premises, but with so many people catering for visitors during the Summer, there is still a large amount left to be done, and continuing supervision is essential.

### THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR

FOR THE YEAR 1964.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

Herewith I submit my report on the work of the Public Health Department during the year ended 31st December, 1964.

SEWERAGE.

BROWNSTON. Conditions at this hamlet are still unsatisfactory and some form of disposal plant is urgently required.

GALMPTON. The construction of the sewers and disposal works and the installation of the pumping station is now complete. Some difficulties are being experienced in connection with the pumping station but I hope that these will be rectified at an early date.

SHERFORD. The system of treatment of the effluent by sand filters has not been satisfactory, particularly from the maintenance aspect, and it is intended to carry out modifications to these works.

WEST CHARLETON. The work of constructing new sewers and a new disposal works has now been completed.

SOUTH POOL. It is anticipated that the work in connection with the laying of new sewers and disposal works at South Pool will commence early in the New Year.

LODDISWELL. The consultants have prepared a detailed scheme for re-sewering part of the village and for the reconstruction of the disposal works. It is anticipated that work may start at the end of 1965.

OTHER SCHEMES. The construction of council house at Frogmore has necessitated the preparation of a scheme for this village. The scheme is to be phased and the first phase should commence early in the New Year. Conditions at Challaborough are still most unsatisfactory. The consultants have made a visit and are in the course of preparing a sewage scheme for submission to the Council. No progress has been made in connection with a scheme for Strete or for the improvement to the sewers and sewage disposal works at Modbury.

MAINTENANCE. It was anticipated that it would be necessary to have three mobile gangs in order to provide an adequate cover throughout the district. With judicious re-routing of the existing gangs this has not been necessary, but such an arrangement can only be of a temporary nature. HOUSING.

Formal action to deal with individual unfit houses has continued during the year. To a large extent progress has been geared to the Council House Building Programme, but the number of unfit houses left to be dealt with is relatively small.

#### IMPROVEMENT GRANTS.

The number of grants made during the year was approximately the same as last year although the number of applications increased.

The new Housing Act which empowers Local Authorities to compel the improvement of dwellings within certain limits is welcomed, and in due course will provide the means for ensuring that houses in the district are provided with the "standard" amenities.

#### MEAT INSPECTION.

There was a further reduction in the number of carcasses inspected during the year and in the number of visits made to slaughterhouses in the district. It seems likely, however, that the numbers now being inspected per annum will remain relatively constant.

### MOVEABLE DWELLINGS.

Steady progress has been maintained in improving the standards of sites throughout the district, and the improvement programme on a number of sites has been completed.

#### REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

The weekly collection of refuse throughout the district was maintained during the year, not without some difficulty during the summer months. As reported previously a number of the smaller refuse tips on the outskirts of the District are nearing the end of their useful life, and it seems probable that, in future, all the refuse collected in the area will have to be transported to Molescombe refuse tip.

# LITTER.

This represents a seasonal problem throughout the district although the slight improvement indicated in previous years has been maintained. The Council is anxious to improve the service in connection with the collection and disposal of litter, and next year receptacles incorporating paper bags are to be used.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

The number of inspections carried out during the year was roughly the same as those of last year but in relation to inspections in connection with sewerage it should be borne in mind that a number of inspections take up considerable time, especially when surveys and work of that nature are being carried out.

Office administration has improved enormously, with the new filing system proving most helpful and time saving.
