FOR THE YEAR 1965

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to present the Report on the health of the district for the year 1965.

The area is mainly agricultural, although on the coast many of the inhabitants are employed in seafaring pursuits. The beauty of the whole area, coast and inland, attracts many visitors throughout the year, the largest number, naturally, being during the summer months. Catering for these visitors is one of the main sources of livelihood for many residents of the district. There are, situated geographically within the district, the Urban Districts of Kingsbridge and Salcombe.

PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA.

The personal health services are provided by various bodies, by far the greater part being under the control of the Regional Hospital Board, Devon County Council and the Local Executive Council. The environmental health services are controlled by the District Council.

The Public Health Laboratory Service has a laboratory in Plymouth for the investigation of communicable diseases and the examination of milk, water, ice cream, foodstuffs, etc.

The Devon County Health Handbook gives details of the health and allied social services in the County of Devon. Much of its information refers to the County as a whole, but there are details of the various services provided in this district.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

There were again this year only a few of the infectious diseases of childhood.

There were no cases of food poisoning.

WATER SUPPLY.

Water is supplied by the South West Devon Water Board. The sources remain the same being chiefly for this district from the Avon Reservoir, with additional water on occasion from the Ranney Works on the River Dart.

The water is treated by flocculation and filtration. It is chlorinated and the pH is adjusted. The quality is of a high standard and it is adequate in quantity for the needs of the district.

Copies of reports of all samples taken by the Board are forwarded to this department. We are grateful for all the information passed to us by the Board.

Samples of water are taken in schools by the County Public Health Department. Copies of these reports are received.

There are a number of small private supplies. Inspection of these and sampling of the water is carried out as necessary.

The amount of fluoride present naturally is negligible.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES.

A convenience at Malborough is shortly to be started. It is possible that others may be required at Wonwell, Soar Mill and Lannacombe, but they are not yet planned.

INSPECTION AND SUPERVISION OF FOOD.

This continues but is not yet as complete as one would wish.

ANNUAL REPORT

OF

THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR

FOR THE YEAR 1965

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

Herewith I submit my report on the work of the Public Health Department during the year ended 31st December, 1965.

SEWERAGE.

CHALLABOROUGH. Due to a public health nuisance arising, active consideration has had to be given to the sewerage of Challaborough, and the consultants are now in the process of gathering together the relevant details.

FROGMORE. A scheme is being prepared for Frogmore Stage II, and work should commence in the latter half of 1966.

LODDISWELL. The consultants have prepared a scheme for the re-sewerage of part of the village and the reconstruction of the disposal works, but work is not yet in hand.

SOUTH POOL. Work on the South Pool/Frogmore Stage I scheme is well in hand and the schedule of progress is being well maintained.

BIGBURY-ON-SEA. Work was carried out late in the year on the securing of the piers to the sea outfall at Bigbury-on-Sea.

OTHER SCHEMES. Other works or improvements will have to be considered at some time in respect of Stoke Fleming, Strete, Modbury and other villages where conditions are unsatisfactory.

MAINTENANCE. Maintenance continues by means of two mobile gangs. Due to the new sewerage schemes at South Pool, Frogmore Pumping Station and other works envisaged, reorganisation will have to be considered in respect of work schedules to provide adequate cover for the district.

HOUSING.

Work has continued in dealing with unfit houses, the numbers represented being similar to last year. Every endeavour has been made to assist owners to render closed properties fit for human habitation.

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS.

Approvals of discretionary grants were only half those of last year whilst the approvals for standard grants were almost twice that of last year. This will inevitably lead to less formal action in future to deal with unfit houses.

MEAT INSPECTION.

The numbers of carcasses inspected during the year was very nearly the same as the previous year. The amount of meat condemned was considerably less.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS.

Steady progress has been maintained in improving the standards of sites throughout the district, and the improvement programme on a number of sites has been completed.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL.

Weekly collection of refuse was continued during the year occasionally with some difficulty. The time when some of the smaller tips will have to be closed is rapidly approaching. Consideration will have to be given with regard to the best and most economical means to be adopted for the collection and transport of refuse to the point of disposal.

LITTER.

With the advent of the use of paper sacks and slatted covers for bin containers the efficiency of our litter collection has improved and the containers are more sightly. Thrice weekly collections of litter have been made from the principal beaches throughout the summer months.

GENERAL ADMINISTRATION.

The number of inspections carried out during the year was rather more than the previous year, although in this widespread rural area is no direct reflection of work done.

Office administration runs smoothly without complaint.
