



ANNUAL REPORT ON THE HEALTH OF THE AREA DURING 1972.

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen:

I present herewith the Annual Report on the health of the area during 1972, drawn up in accordance with the requirements of the Department of Health and Social Security Circular 1/73, dated January, 1973. Included in this Report is the Report of your Chief Public Health Inspector.

Statistics

Apart from an estimated increase in population of two hundred and fifty persons, there is very little variation in the vital statistics as set out in the Appendix to this Report.

Notifiable Diseases

Very few were notified, but these included two cases of pulmonary tuberculosis. During the summer, a young hotel worker on the kitchen staff of a local hotel was found to be suffering from active pulmonary tuberculosis. The disease had been undetected for some months, so that some forty members of the hotel staff had been exposed to risk. Fifteen of these came from the Kingsbridge area, 3 from Plymouth, 6 from the rest of Devon, and 16 from other areas including Northern Europe. All were written to and advised to have a chest X-Ray. So far I have received no reports of any positive cases being detected.

An employee at a Plymouth food factory resident in your District was found to be suffering from infection with Salmonella typhimurium, which can cause food poisoning. He was excluded from work for nearly three months, until found to be clear of infection.

A family at Kingston was visited following the death of a parakeet from psittacosis, but no human cases of the infection were detected.

A farmer at Modbury contracted brucellosis (Undulant Fever).
Tests upon milk from the herd at this farm proved negative to

brucellosis.

The daughter of a farmer at Aveton Gifford contracted enteritis at about the same time as a salmonella infection had been detected amongst cattle at the farm. Tests upon the girl were negative.

Infections common to Farm Animals and Man

Amongst the four Rural Districts of South West Devon, (Kingsbridge, Plympton, Tavistock, Totnes), a total of thirty-one outbreaks of Salmonella infection and five outbreaks of Brucellosis were reported during 1972. This is an improvement over the 1971 figures (Salmonella 49, Brucellosis 6).

Thirty of the Salmonella outbreaks were due to Salmonella dublin, and one was due to Salmonella typhimurium. In these outbreaks 16 animals died. One of the cows in a Brucellosis outbreak was slaughtered.

Milk at all the farms was already sent for pasteurisation and no human cases of illness were discovered.

Water Supply Water Supply

Mains water is supplied by the South West Devon Water Board, and the supply has been excellent. The water is regularly sampled by the Board.

I am indebted to the Director of Water Supplies of the South West Devon Water Board for the following summary of analyses during 1972:

ANNUAL REPORT

THE CHIEF PUBLIC HEALTH INSPECTOR

FOR THE YEAR 1972

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen:

Herewith I submit my report on the work of the Public Health Department during the year ended 31st December, 1972.

SEWERAGE

Bigbury-on-Sea

The contact stabilisation plant continues to function very well, giving effluent standards of high quality.

Pumping equipment and controls are still presenting problems, and there is still some work outstanding on the sea outfall.

Brownston

The outfall from this small sewerage system remains completely unsatisfactory, discharging crude sewage to a stream feeding into the River Erme.

Loddiswell

Work on the scheme for resewering parts of the village and constructing a new sewage disposal works is progressing well, and should be completed early in the New Year.

Stoke Fleming

The consulting engineers have been asked to prepare a scheme for extending sewers and constructing a disposal works for this village.

Modbury

Approval in principle to a scheme of flood prevention and for sewerage and sewage disposal has been obtained. The necessary documents are now being prepared prior to obtaining tenders for this work.

Slapton Slapto

Improvements to the disposal works have been completed, and conditions are greatly improved.

Maintenance

Adequate maintenance of sewage disposal works has been difficult on occasions when staff have had to be diverted to sewer maintenance and blockages.

During the year the sewers at Torcross and Aveton Gifford were cleansed with specialist equipment hired for the purpose. This work proved completely satisfactory, and I hope in future it can be extended to other areas.

HOUSING

The number of houses dealt with formally was the same as last year, and there remains to be dealt with only a hard core of relatively few houses.

IMPROVEMENT GRANTS

There was a slight increase in the number of Improvement (discretionary) grant applications, and a small reduction in the number of standard grant applications.

To a certain extent applications are still being made by applicants seeking to improve holiday accommodation, or to provide second homes, and I hope the Council will continue to resist making grants for such purposes.

It would appear from recent adverse publicity regarding this point that reconsideration should be given by Central Government to amendments in the law to make such applicants ineligible for grant purposes.

MEAT INSPECTION

The total number of animals inspected reduced slightly, but the percentage of animals affected by disease increased, with a resultant increase in the weight of meat condemned.

Income from meat inspection charges amounted to £98.82p.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS

Standards on the major caravan sites continue to improve, and apart from Beesands Green are satisfactory. In the latter

case, an appeal was heard in the High Court to determine the classification of a track leading to Beesands Cellars, and following the judgement it is hoped that a new layout can be agreed with the site operator and site licence conditions implemented in full.

REFUSE COLLECTION

The increase in the volume of refuse collected each year continues. The rise in the past year was 7%, and this trend is bound to continue. The demands on the collection service can be met more easily than those on the disposal service, where resources are not so readily available. Urgent action is necessary to extend tipping facilities at Molescombe Quarry.

OIL POLLUTION

Fortunately it was necessary to take only limited action during the year to deal with pollution of beaches. It is hoped that this trend will continue.

GENERAL

The number of sanitary inspections showed a decrease on the previous year. This was attributable to increased work in connection with Local Government amalgamation, and also to the increase in the volume of work in connection with refuse, sewerage, and improvement grants.

From statistics available it would appear that rodent control is making its mark in the District. There was a reduction in the number of premises inspected, and a significant reduction in those found to be infested, particularly by rats. The previous winter was mild, so I hope that this reflects a genuine decrease in the rat population, and if this is so it calls for extra effort in making a determined onslaught on these pests.

In conclusion, I would again thank all members and staff for their encouragement and support during the year, and in particular the staff of the Public Health Department, who have borne up manfully under considerable pressure at times.

INTERNATIONAL CERTIFICATES OF VACCINATION

In accordance with the requirements of the World Health Regulations certificates of Smallpox and Cholera vaccinations in respect of persons travelling abroad were authenticated by the Public Health Department. An average of twenty-five such certificates are dealt with each week.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT 1948 and 1951

No action was necessary under Section 47 of the 1948 Act, or under the (Amendment) Act, 1951, for the removal and detention of persons in need of care and attention.

No burials took place under Section 50 of the 1948 Act.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES

1. Hospitals

A General Practitioner Hospital with 13 beds is situated in Kingsbridge. The area is also served by hospitals at Plymouth, Totnes, Dartmouth and Torbay.

2. Laboratory Service

Bacteriological examinations of pathological specimens and samples of milk, water, and ice cream are carried out by the Public Health Laboratory at Plymouth. The chemical analysis of water is undertaken by Public Analysts at Exeter, and also by the South West Devon Water Board.

3. County Health Services

Under the National Health Services Act, 1946, the County Council provides the following services:-

Domiciliary midwives, home nurses, health visitors, supervisory care of expectant and nursing mothers and children under five, ambulance services, vaccination and immunisation procedures.

A chiropody service is in operation for the handicapped, the aged and expectant mothers. Clinics are held at Dartmouth, Kingsbridge, Salcombe, Stokenham, Thurlestone, and Yealmpton.

4. Social Services

The Area Director of Social Services at The Family Welfare Centre, Pomeroy House, Bridgetown, Totnes (Telephone: Totnes 3665), is responsible for providing a social work service under the Children's Acts, The Mental Health Act, 1959, and the National Assistance Act, to the elderly, the mentally ill, the physically handicapped, and homeless persons and families. The Social Services Department also

adminsters the Home Help Service, the Social Work Service to schools, the Occupational Therapy Services, and residential homes and centres.

5. General Medical and Dental Services

Three General Medical Practitioners live in villages in the District, and also seventeen doctors and ten dentists from adjoining towns serve the area.

6. Mass Miniature Radiography

The Unit visited Kingsbridge and Dartmouth regularly once a fortnight, and all persons living adjacent to those towns were easily able to obtain a chest X-ray.
