GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

The Public Health Officers of the Authority are a Medical Officer of Health (also Medical Officer of Health of Plympton Rural District, Kingsbridge Rural District and Salcombe Urban District).

Deputy Medical Officer of Health (occasional).

One full-time Surveyor and Public Health Inspector.

LABORATORY FACILITIES. The Public Health Laboratory Service provided a service at the South Devon and East Cornwall Hospital, Plymouth, on 3rd June 1953, for the investigation of communicable disease and the examination of milk, water supplies, ice cream and foodstuffs, etc.

PERSONAL HEALTH SERVICES. There has recently been published by Devon County a handbook giving details of the various services provided in the County.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

WATER SUPPLY (Moorland Supply) from South Devon Water Board.

The supply is satisfactory in quality and quantity.

The Avon Dam has recently been completed, forming a reservoir which it is hoped will provide an adequate reserve of water if we ever have a dry summer.

During the past year, 71 samples of Moorland Water were submitted for bacteriological examination. Results were as follows: Grade 1—68; Grade 2—3.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE. No major works have been carried out during the year.

PUBLIC CLEANSING. The system of collection and disposal remains as in previous years. The system is satisfactory and the only comment of interest is that the bulk is greatly increasing while the weight of refuse tipped is probably static.

HOUSING. The first contract for Old Persons Dwellings was started in May 1957, and while none were completed at the end of the year, I am advised that satisfactory progress was being made on them. A pleasing feature was the steps taken to ensure, as far as practicable, that the flats would be soundproof.

At the end of the year the Council owned 177 houses and 40 flats as the previous year.

Some progress was made on Slum Clearance and the first houses were considered by the Council and no decision arrived at before the end of the year. Concurrently with this, a scheme was in hand to build houses solely for the occupation of families displaced by Slum Clearance.

FOOD STUFFS CONDEMNED. 460 tins various, 330 lbs. dried currants, 4 jars various, 1 doz. frozen geese, 5 pkts. cheese, 8 doz. pies, 24 lbs. bacon, 1 loaf bread.

FOOD

1. The number of types of food premises in the area are as follows:

Greengrocer, 5; Grocer, 14; Butcher, 5; Restaurants, 6
Wet Fish Shops, 1; Fried Fish Shops, 2; Baker, 4.

In addition to the above, one person maintains premises for the reception, cleaning and preparation for sale of wet fish and thereafter sells from a properly constructed vehicle.

3. The number of inspections of food premises in the year was 32. This number does not include re-visits where found necessary. The general standard of food premises in the town is good.

4. THE METHOD OF DISPOSAL OF CONDEMNED FOOD: In the rare cases where large amounts are required to be disposed of, this is done through a recognised firm specializing in the preparation of fertilizers, etc. In other cases, goods are removed by the refuse collection gang and buried at the disposal site.

5. It was not necessary during the year for any special examination of a stock or consignment of food to be undertaken.

6. It is the policy to discourage the manufacture of icecream and, in fact, only one producer carries on business in the town. This is done in well-equipped modern premises with modern equipment in good condition. The normal shop or business selling icecream, sells only prepacked icecream from one or other of the major well-known manufacturers.

7. All occupiers of premises dealing in food should now be conforming to the Food Hygiene Regulations. It is only by constant education that conditions can be improved. I feel that the public can be a great help in this matter. If they complain to the proprietors or managers of shops when they see unsatisfactory practices, it will help to ensure that they are not repeated.
