## GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

The Public Health Officers of the Authority are a Medical Officer of Health (also Medical Officer of Health of Plympton Rural District, Kingsbridge Rural District and Salcombe Urban District).

Deputy Medical Officer of Health (occasional).

One full-time Surveyor and Public Health Inspector.

LABORATORY FACILITIES. The Public Health Laboratory Service provides a service at the South Devon and East Cornwall Hospital, Plymouth, for the investigation of communicable diseases and the examination of milk, water supplies, ice cream and foodstuffs, etc.

PERSONAL HEALTH SERVICES. The Devon County health handbook gives details of the various services provided in the district by the County.

### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

WATER SUPPLY. Although the local Water Board was deeply occupied with various schemes for re-grouping and re-organisation these semi-political and administrative problems had no effect on the continued supply of water to the area.

During 1960 the quantity and quality remained at the former highly satisfactory levels, and although, because of the international situation, questions were raised about possible dangers to public health arising from the contamination of the supply by radio active fall-out or other nuclear means, from the information available to me I am satisfied that the public is, at present at any rate, facing no danger in this respect.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE. There were no large extensions to the system during the year nor were any untoward problems encountered.

I feel that, while on the whole the system is satisfactory it would not be waste of time if consideration could be given at some appropriate time in the future, to the question of improving the method of disposal.

HOUSING. My remarks for 1959 regarding the housing demand apply equally to 1960 and although the demand is small in proportion it is steady, and an amount of work on slum clearance awaits the building of new houses to provide the necessary alternative accommodation.

Toward the end of the year I am advised that the progress on the design of the new estate was slowed because of differing points of view between the Planning Authority, the Council and the Ministry, but I look forward confidently to much better progress in the future.

The first scheme for the modernisation of older council houses was completed and is highly successful. This policy is a good one and I fully endorse the wisdom of the Council in continuing this work with further schemes.

PUBLIC CLEANSING. This weekly collection of refuse remains as before but this year I was glad to see a modern dustless vehicle of the most advanced type in full use.

This innovation was, and is, a vast improvement on the previous "side loader" vehicle and has resulted in an improved service.

#### FOOD

1. The numbers of types of food premises in the area are as follows:

Greengrocer, 5; Grocer, 14; Butcher, 5; Restaurants, 5; Wet Fish Shops, 1; Fried Fish Shops, 2; Baker, 4.

In addition to the above, one person maintains premises for the reception, cleaning and preparation for sale of wet fish and thereafter sells from a properly constructed vehicle. 2. The number of food premises registered under Section 16 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, is as follows:

- 3. The number of inspections of food premises in the year was 42. This number does not include re-visits where found necessary. The general standard of food premises in the town is good.
- 4. The Method of Disposal of Condemned Food: In the rare cases where large amounts are required to be disposed of, this is done through a recognised firm specialising in the preparation of fertilizers, etc. In other cases, goods are removed by the refuse collection gang and buried at the disposal site.
- 5. It was not necessary during the year for any special examination of a stock or consignment of food to be undertaken.
