## GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

The Public Health Officers of the Authority are a Medical Officer of Health (also Medical Officer of Health of Plympton Rural District, Kingsbridge Rural District and Salcombe Urban District).

Deputy Medical Officer of Health (occasional).

One full-time Engineer, Surveyor and Public Health Inspector.

LABORATORY FACILITIES. The Public Health Laboratory Service provides a service at the South Devon and East Cornwall Hospital, Plymouth, for the investigation of communicable diseases and the examination of milk water supplies, ice cream and foodstuffs, etc.

PERSONAL HEALTH SERVICES. The Devon County health handbook gives details of the various services provided in the district by the County.

### SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES OF THE AREA

WATER SUPPLY. The supply of water to the area remained, as before, the responsibility of the South Devon Water Board.

I have no need to comment on the quality of the supply which remained on its former highly satisfactory level. The board were concerned with one or two minor cases of a falling off in pressure during periods of very heavy demand, but, while these cases will be corrected with subsequent benefit to the convenience of the few houses concerned, the slight fall in pressure on occasion in no way affected the population from the public health point of view.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE. Toward the end of the year work started on a small extension to the sewerage system to make provision for the development of further land for housing purposes.

Apart from this, the existing system remained as before.

Consideration was given to the possibility of investigating a new machine for sewage disposal, but at the end of the year, information was still awaited from the manufacturers about the equipment, and I anticipate further information during 1962.

HOUSING. During 1961 the plans and other essential work for a new estate were completed and agreed by all parties concerned.

The contractors started work in November on the construction of roads, sewers, etc., and the house building contractors will move in as soon as possible.

As a complement to this, the slum clearance programme was considered and the methods of dealing with unfit houses, together with the timing, was decided. More of this will show in next year's report

A number of people applied for standard grants throughout the year, and in no case was it found necessary to recommend any grant to be refused.

While much publicity has been given, both nationally and locally, to the system of grants that are available, not overmuch use is being made of this service. While I am in agreement with the general idea, I feel that better financial arrangements ought to be available to those people wishing to become owner-occupiers of houses, with the possibility that new houses would then be built for owner-occupation.

The system of improving older houses, while in itself to be recommended, is in my view, apart from considerations of architecture and aesthetics, less to be preferred than the building of new homes.

PUBLIC CLEANSING. I have no need to comment on the system of refuse collection and disposal; it remains good from both aspects.

#### FOOD

1 The numbers of types of food premises in the area are as follows:

Greengrocer, 5; Grocer, 14; Butcher, 5; Restaurants, 5; Wet Fish Shops, 1; Fried Fish Shops, 2; Baker, 4.

In addition to the above, one person maintains premises for the reception, cleaning and preparation for sale of wet fish and thereafter sells from a properly constructed vehicle.

- 3 The number of inspections of food premises in the year was 37. This number does not include re-visits where found necessary. The general standard of food premises in the town remained highly satisfactory.
- 4 The Method of Disposal of Condemned Food: In the rare cases where large amounts are required to be disposed of, this is done through a recognised firm specialising in the preparation of fertilizers, etc. In other cases, goods are removed by the refuse collection gang and buried at the disposal site.
- 5 It was not necessary during the year for any special examination of a stock or consignment of food to be undertaken.
