GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

The Public Health Officers of the Authority are a Medical Officer of Health (also Medical Officer of Health of Plympton Rural District, Kingsbridge Rural District and Salcombe Urban District).

Deputy Medical Officer of Health (occasional).

One full-time Engineer, Surveyor and Public Health Inspector.

LABORATORY FACILITIES. The Public Health Laboratory Service provides a service at the South Devon and East Cornwall Hospital, Plymouth, for the investigation of communicable diseases and the examination of milk, water supplies, ice cream and foodstuffs, etc.

PERSONAL HEALTH SERVICES. The Devon County health handbook gives details of the various services provided in the district by the County.

WATER SUPPLY. The supply provided by the South West Devon Water Board is adequate in quantity and of good quality. The water is tested frequently by the Board for contamination, copies of the results being forwarded to the District. The water is also treated at source to reduce plumbo solvency.

The supply contains practically no fluoride. The addition of fluoride has been discussed. There is still considerable resistance to this measure in the District despite the fact that all authoritative international medical and dental bodies are of the opinion that it is of great value as a public health measure, and that there is no risk attached to its use. It is amazing that those people with young children do not cry out more loudly for action.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE. The development of new housing estates meant that three fairly large extensions of the sewerage system (two by private enterprise and one by the Council) were made during the year.

Toward the end of the year the Council authorised the Engineer to begin sampling, analysis and research into the sewerage system so that adequate information can be obtained to enable the future policy to be properly considered. Undoubtedly the treatment of the sewage to produce an effluent which can be put, if necessary, into the Estuary without harm or nuisance will be very expensive, nevertheless when other Authorities bordering the Estuary are taking steps to put only satisfactory effluents into it, and while the River Board are getting greater powers it becomes very necessary. Apart from these reasons the removal of the Town's sewage from the Estuary will be of great value to all the inhabitants, many think a value greater than the cost.

HOUSING. The work of laying out the roads and services for the Council's eleventh housing scheme started during 1964 and was about 60 per cent completed at the end of the year.

With the completion of scheme 10 the slum clearance programme halted, until more new houses become available. One house only was dealt with in 1964. Although the worst houses have now been dealt with, there are still some left which may have to be demolished.

FOOD

The numbers of types of food premises in the area are as follows :—

Greengrocer, 5 ; Grocer, 13 ; Butcher, 5 ; Restaurants, 5 ; Wet Fish Shops, 2 ; Fried Fish Shops, 2 ; Baker, 2.

In addition to the above, one person maintains premises for the reception, cleaning and preparation for sale of wet fish and thereafter sells from a properly constructed vehicle.

The number of inspections of food premises in the year was 41. This number does not include re-visits where found necessary. The general standard of food premises in the town remains good.

The Method of Disposal of Condemned Food : In the rare cases where large amounts are required to be disposed of, this is done through a recognised firm specialising in the preparation of fertilizers, etc. In other cases, goods are removed by the refuse collection gang and buried at the disposal site.

Following the news of the Aberdeen Typhoid Outbreak, it was necessary for all those in the district who might be concerned in the sale or distribution of canned meat to be visited to ensure that suspected batches were withheld. I am grateful to record that there was full and happy co-operation by those concerned.
