GENERAL PROVISIONS OF HEALTH SERVICES FOR THE AREA

The Public Health Officers of the Authority are a Medical Officer of Health (also Medical Officer of Health of Plympton Rural District, Kingsbridge Rural District and Salcombe Urban District).

Deputy Medical Officer of Health (occasional).

One full-time Engineer, Surveyor and Public Health Inspector.

LABORATORY FACILITIES. The Public Health Laboratory Service provides a service at the South Devon and East Cornwall Hospital, Plymouth, for the investigation of communicable diseases and the examination of milk, water supplies, ice cream and foodstuffs, etc.

PERSONAL HEALTH SERVICES. The Devon County health handbook gives details of the various services provided in the district by the County.

NEW CASES AND MORTALITY DURING 1965

There were no new notifications during the year nor any case of death from tuberculosis in any form.

WATER SUPPLY. The supply provided by the South West Devon Water Board is adequate in quantity and of good quality. The water is tested frequently by the Board for contamination, copies of the results being forwarded to the District. The water is also treated at source to reduce plumbo solvency.

Despite my remarks in the 1964 Report and my obvious feelings on the matter, the decisions reached by all the Authorities responsible for the supply of water was that fluoride should not be added to the natural supply.

I can only hope that those members of the Authorities who are so firmly against the idea will be persuaded by wiser counsels to change their opinions in the future.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE. Small additions to the sewerage system took place in 1965 but not on the scale as in 1964.

During this year the Engineer carried out a series of sampling tests and research into the whole problem of providing the town with a modern system of sewage disposal. At the end of 1965 he had been so far able to clarify the position that the Council accepted his advice on the site of a new disposal works, and had commenced consultation with the adjoining R.D.C. on the relevant planning and technical matters.

I am hopeful that the present somewhat unsatisfactory position will be remedied within the reasonable future, and reports for the next few years will continue to show the position.

HOUSING. The site preparation work for the eleventh housing scheme was completed in 1965 and the contract for the building of 101 houses was put in hand.

In December, 1965, approval was received from the Ministry of Housing and Local Government to the acceptance of a tender.

FOOD

I have no particular comment to make regarding food — I am generally well satisfied with the situation. I feel it is of interest to say that during the year only one calf was submitted for examination for human food (more in hope than certainty) and the Public Health Inspector condemned it wholesale on grounds of immaturity and unsoundness.

Toward the latter part of the year, Mr. Hill was getting increasingly concerned with the situation at the slaughterhouse. The report for 1966 will clear this picture.

The numbers of types of food premises in the area are as

follows :-

Greengrocer 5; Grocer 13; Butcher 5; Restaurants 5; Wet

Fish Shops 2; Fried Fish Shops 2; Baker 2.

In addition to the above, one person maintains premises for the reception, cleaning and preparation for sale of wet fish and thereafter sells from a properly constructed vehicle. The number of food premises registered under Section 16 of the Food and Drugs Act, 1955, is as follows:—

The number of inspections of food premises in the year was 35. This number does not include re-visits where found necessary. The general standard of food premises in the town remains good.

The Method of Disposal of Condemned Food: In the rare cases where large amounts are required to be disposed of, this is done through a recognised firm specialising in the preparation of fertilisers, etc. In other cases, goods are removed by the refuse collection gang and buried at the disposal site.
