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

Very little change has occurred in the vital statistics since last year.

A small number of cases of measles occurred and an isolated case of paratyphoid fever was reported. The source of infection was not discovered.

Apart from this, the general health of the area was maintained.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACTS 1948 and 1951

No action was necessary under the National Assistance Acts of 1948 and 1951 for the removal of persons in need of care and attention and no persons were buried in accordance with Section 50 of the 1948 Act.

GENERAL PROVISION OF HEALTH SERVICES Section A

1. Hospitals.

A General Practitioner Hospital with 13 beds is situated at Kingsbridge. Other hospitals which serve the district are at Plymouth and Totnes.

2. County Council Health Services.

Under the National Health Services Act, 1946, the Devon

County Council provides the following services:-

Domiciliary midwives, home nurses, health visitors, supervisory care of expectant and nursing mothers and children under five, ambulance services, vaccination and immunisation procedures, home-help services and the after-care of such persons.

Full details can be obtained from the County Medical

Officer at Exeter.

3. Mental Health.

Arrangements for treatment under the Mental Health Act, 1959, can be made either by the patient's own doctor or by the Psychiatric Social Worker, Mr. R. V. Townsend, Fore Street Clinic, Kingsbridge, Telephone 2178.

4. Laboratory Service.

Bacteriological examinations of pathological specimens and samples of milk, water and ice-cream are carried out at the Public Health Laboratory at Plymouth. The chemical analysis of water is undertaken by public analysts at Exeter.

5. Medical and Dental Services.

There are four general medical practitioners and three dentists in the town.

6. Mass Miniature Radiography.

A Mass X-Ray Unit visits the town regularly once a fortnight and members of the public are encouraged to attend for a chest X-Ray.

Section B.

ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

Water Supply.

The water supply to the area remained highly satisfactory. Work was started on the provisions of a reservoir at Centry which should have the effect of reducing the sometimes very high pressure and also providing more storage capacity.

I am advised that this should be in operation by the Spring

of 1969.

Drainage and Sewerage.

Additional sewers were brought into use during 1967 to serve the Council's Redford Estate and some small additions were made at Manor Park and Waterside Park.

The work of preparing all the plans and documents to build a new sewage disposal works for the town went on as fast as possible.

The site of the new works received outline planning approval, and progress has been made toward the design of the necessary pumping station, new trunk sewers, and other works, and in discussions with the land owner, the River Authority and the Rural District Council, in whose area the works will be situated.

Housing.

The Council's eleventh scheme, which had started after many troubles in 1966, was carried on and completed very satisfactorily in November 1967.

Concurrently the progress of dealing with substandard houses was in progress and, as a result 26 houses were considered by the Council. Of these, 11 became the subject of demolition orders. In the case of the remaining 15 undertakings either to reconstruct and repair, or not to re-use for human habitation, were accepted.

With these houses being dealt with, all the properties shown on the report to circular 55/54, together with some additions since, have been considered and disposed of, and the Council's clearance programme completed.

FOOD

The situation regarding the supply, control, and sampling of food remains as in previous years.

The numbers of types of food premises in the area are as follows: Greengrocer 5; Grocer 13; Butcher 5; Restaurants 5; Wet Fish Shops 2; Fried Fish Shops 2; Bakers 5 (only 2 actually bake).

In addition to the above, one person maintains premises for the reception, cleaning and preparation for sale of wet fish and thereafter sells from a properly constructed vehicle.

Happily, it was not necessary during the year to institute any proceedings against any trader for offences in connection with food or hygiene.

The practice has grown up in the past few years of the large multiple store firms refusing to accept lists of goods damaged or unsaleable or unfit, unless their store manager supports it with a condemnation certificate from the local authority. This has resulted in a great number of cans of goods of all descriptions being condemned and a larger number submitted for examination, even, on occasions, cans of prepared animal food, bird food and the like.

It is felt that this serves little public health purpose and is principally a book-balancing operation by the firms concerned. An attempt is being made to discourage the practice, particularly the keeping of large numbers of cans to obviate many visits, but at the same time it is necessary to encourage managers to seek advice immediately in any case of doubt.

The number of inspections of food premises in the year was 42. This number does not include re-visits where found necessary. The general standard of food premises in the town remains good.

The Method of Disposal of Condemned Food: In the rare cases where large amounts are required to be disposed of, this is done through a recognised firm specialising in the preparation of fertilisers, etc. In other cases, goods are removed by the refuse collection gang and buried at the disposal site.

It will be seen by comparison with previous years that the level of condemnation varies but little. This might well be taken to indicate a high quality of carcase presented for examination; it might equally well be regarded as indicating little progress in the fight against liver fluke infestation.
