To the Chairman and Members
of the Kingsclere and Whitchurch Rural District Council:-

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

As your Acting Medical Officer of Health, I have the honour to present my Annual Report on the health and sanitary circumstances of your district for the year 1964.

The year showed a further increase in population and the Registrar General's mid-year estimate of population was 25,230 an increase of 660 over the previous year. As in preceeding years part of the increase is due to emmigration as the net gain of births over deaths was only 276,


There are no significant variations in the local vital statistics from the national figures due to the small number of persons living in the Rural District.

The Bourne Valley Sewerage Scheme was started in 1964 and is progressing satisfactorily. The Echinswell and Sydmonton Schemes have been agreed and it is contemplated that tenders will be invited for this work in 1965. There has been no further progress to sewer the North West Area of the District.

I should like to thank the Chief Public Health Inspector for compiling his section of my Annual Report, and to him again and all the other members of the Public Health Department for their help during the eight months that I have been your Acting Medical Officer of Health.

Vital Statistics

1. Live Births

Live births registered during 1964 amounted to 498, 234 males and 264 females.

The Live Birth Rate, corrected for age and sex distribution by the Registrar-General's comparability factor, was 19.3 per thousand population.

The rate for England and Wales was 18.4 per thousand.

2. Still Births

The number of still births was 6, giving a still birth rate of 11.9 per thousand births (live and still).

The figure for England and Wales was 16.3

3. Deaths

The total number of deaths registered during 1964 amounted to 222, 116 males and 106 females.

This gives a local death rate, corrected by Registrar-General's comparability factor for age and sex distribution of 10.2 compared with 11.3 for England and Wales.

The Infant Mortality Rate was 22.0 compared with 20.0 for England and Wales.

Causes of Death

Heart Disease accounted for 89 deaths, 49 males and 40 females and of these, 44 were due to coronary artery disease, 28 male and 16 female.

Apoplexy or Vascular Lesions of the Central Nervous System accounted for 37 deaths, 17 male and 20 females.

Cancer This caused 14 deaths.

Respiratory Diseases 14 deaths, 4 male and 10 female. This was 50% less than last year and was due probably to the milder winter.

Accidents accounted for 14 deaths, 9 males and 5 females and of these all male deaths were due to motor vehicle accidents.

Suicide There was one female suicide.

Infantile Mortality

11 deaths of infants under one year were recorded in 1964, giving an Infantile Mortality Rate of 22.0 per thousand live births, compared with 20.0 for England and Wales.

Vital Statistics

Neonatal Mortality

Six deaths were recorded in the first month of life giving a Neonatal Mortality Rate of 12.0 per thousand live births.

Early Neonatal Mortality

Six deaths occurred in the first week of life giving an Early Neonatal Mortality Rate of 12.0 per thousand live births

Perinatal Mortality

The Perinatal Mortality Rate which is the sum of the still births and the early neonatal deaths per thousand births (live & still) stands at 23.8 compared with 20.6 last year.

Immunisation and Vaccination

During 1964 vaccination against poliomyelitis continued in all age groups using the Sabin type oral vaccine, which is considerably easier to administer. The immunity obtained is acquired very quickly and is longer lasting than that obtained by the previous methods of vaccination.

A boosting dose is also given to all children as soon as they enter Primary schools.

Diphtheria, Whooping Cough and Tetanus

Immunisation against these three infections was continued using most frequently triple antigen, although combined antigens were sometimes employed when whooping cough vaccine was withheld for medical reasons.

Vaccination Against Smallpox

Due to a change in ministerial policy, Primary Vaccinations are not carried out now until, after the first twelve months of the child's life.

District Health Sub-Committee

The Andover and Kingsclere District Health Sub-Committee is a Sub-Committee of the Health Committee of the Hampshire County Council. As each district Council appoints three Councillors and two co-opted members representing voluntary organisations it has available a considerable amount of valuable information concerning the three districts.

Reports are submitted on infectious disease, births and deaths, registration and inspection of nurseries, immunisation and vaccination, midwifery and maternity services, home help services, district nurses' accommodation and 'Meals on Wheels', in which all three districts have a common interest.

In addition, the Sub-Committee appoints district nurses and midwives, submits financial estimates for the Home Help Service and deals with such matters as the distribution of Welfare Foods and other activities concerned with Child Welfare Centres.

Public Water Supplies

In the case of aged and infirm occupiers living on their own, arrangements are made upon request for the refusebins to be collected from the back doors.

The Council's fleet of refuse freighters consists of five vehicles, details of which are given below:-

The Chelsea type side loader is used as a standby vehicle and is also brought into use to cope with holiday periods.

The refuse is disposed of by burying in large disused pits but is first fired before being bull-dozed and covered, this reduces the fly and rat menace considerably, but a certain amount of treatment is also carried out to control both fly and rat menace.

The tips are situated at Juniper Down, Stoke, Cowdown, Hurstbourne Priors, Oxford Lane, Ashford Hill and Nutley Bottom, Ashe. Fortunately, these tips are situated well away from any dwellings and the firing does not, therefore, cause any nuisance.

The labour force consists of 4 Loader-drivers, one spare Loader-driver, 8 Loaders and 2 Tip-men. Reserve labour being available from the Depot, Whitchurch.

Sewage Disposal

There are three major sewage works in the Rural District, situated at Kingsclere, Overton and Whitchurch.

The Tadley Sewage Works are situated at Silchester, which is in the Rural District of Basingstoke.

Kingsclere Sewage Works, Union Lane, Kingsclere, deals with the sewage from the village of Kingsclere. These works are gravity fed. The volume of sewage dealt with during the year was 29,606,100 gallons.

Proposals are in hand to enlarge these works to sewer the village of Ecchinswell and discharge into the Kingsclere disposal plant.

Overton Sewage Works, Southington, deal with the sewerage from the villages of Overton and Freefolk. The sewage from Freefolk being pumped to the pumping station at Overton. The volume of sewage dealt with during the year was 63,290,000 gallons.

Whitchurch Sewage Works, off Winchester Road, Whitchurch, deals with the sewage from the village of Whitchurch. The pumping station is situated at the Council Depot, and the sewage is pumped from there to disposal works, where it is treated by broad land irrigation. The volume of sewage dealt with during the year was 47,867,500 gallons.

Tadley Sewage Works, Inhams Copse, Silchester. These Works deal with the sewage from the village of Tadley, the A.W.R.E. Housing Estate in Baughurst, and the A.W.R.E. and their Housing Estates in the Rural District of Bradfield, Berkshire. The quantity of sewage dealt with during the year was 172,006,000 gallons.

It is estimated that the population served by main drainage is 12,000 and the population served by the small sewage disposal plants dealing with Council Estates 1,100 making a total of 13,100 on water borne drainage.

Towards the end of the current year work was commenced on the scheme to provide mains drainage in the Parishes of St. Mary Bourne and Hurstbourne Pri

Council House Disposal Plants

There is also a sewage works situated at Bishops Green, Ecchinswell, owned by the Air Ministry. These works take the domestic sewage from Greenham Common Airfield (situated in Berkshire) and the Council, by agreement, discharges the domestic sewage from some 100 dwellings at Bishops Green into these works.

In addition to these major sewage works there are 20 small sewage disposal plants dealing with sewage from the undermentioned Council House Sites:-

The quantity of sewage treated by the above small plants annually is 9,307,500 gallons.

In the areas not served by main drainage, the drainage system is by a means of septic tanks, cesspools and earth or pail closets, and a night soil collection service is provided for the emptying of pail closets.
