MEDICAL OFFICER'S ANNUAL REPORT

For the Year ended December 31st, 1907.

To the Chairman and Councillors of the Knaresborough Rural
District Council.

GENTLEMEN,

I have pleasure in laying before you my Ninth Annual Report as Medical Officer of Health for the Knaresborough Rural District for the year ended December 31st, 1907.

The increase in the population of the district has been **Population** very small during the year, the number of houses built, viz.

16, being less than one third of that in the previous year.

The estimated population of the district up to the middle of the year 1907 was 9,230.

The number of births registered in the district during **Births**. the year was 185, viz., 96 males and 89 females. This is 68 less than the previous year. The annual birth rate is 20 per thousand of the estimated population. In the

previous year the birth rate was 27'9. It is much lower than that for England and Wales for the same period, viz., 26.3 (the lowest on record). I cannot find any record of so low a birth rate for your district. I regret to have to record such unsatisfactory birth statistics.

Deaths.

The number of deaths registered in the district during the year was 106. This is exacrly the same as last year. The annual death rate is 11'48 per thousand of the estimated population. The death rate for England and Wales for the same period is 150 (the lowest ever recorded).

Deaths under one Year of age

The deaths in children under one year of age were II in number. Eight children did not survive one month, so that if we deduct these premature and weakly infants, the infantile mortality from actual disease is very small, even for a rural district. The infantile mortality for the year is 59'4 per thousand births registered. For England and Wales during the same period the mortality in infants was 118, or about double that for your district.

Causes of Death.

Under 25 years of age, the number of deaths was 29; between 25 and 65 the number was 36; and in persons over 65 there were 41 deaths. The principal causes of death were:—Phthisis and other Tubercular Diseases, 14; Heart Diseases, 11; Pneumonia, 9; Cancer, 7; Influenza, 5; and Scarlet Fever, 2. (See Table IV.)

Zymotic Diseases.

Zymotic Diseases caused 3 deaths. This gives a Zymotic death rate of 0.32 per thousand of the estimated population. The Zymotic death rate for England and Wales for the same period was 1'26, or about four times that in your district.

Phthisis and other Disease.

Phthisis and other Tubercular Diseases caused 14 deaths. Tubercular The numbers under this heading in previous years were: 1902, 5; 1903, 9; 1904, 11; 1905, 14; and 1906, 13. These numbers are not so satisfactory as I would like. I hope, however, by the more rigid inspection of meat and milk supplies now in force in the district, that the number of deaths from these causes will be much less. And also by adopting the system of voluntary notification of Phthisis I hope we shall be able to prevent the spread of the disease from the sufferers to those who come in contact with them.

The number of deaths due to Cancer was 7. The Cancer. death rate from this disease varies very little for your district from year to year.

Only one death from Diarrhœa occurred during the **Diarrhœa**. year. Not a single death had occurred from this cause for over two years previously.

The number of Infectious Diseases notified to me Infections during the year was 32. In previous years the numbers Notified. were:—1904, 58; 1905, 36; 1906. 51. They were as follows for the year 1907:—Scarlet Fever, 18; Diphtheria, 13; and Erysipelas, 1.

Scarlet Fever occurred in the following places:—Oat-Scarlet Fever. lands, 10; Follifoot, 3; South Stainley, 2; Farnham, 1; Forest Moor, 1; and Plompton, 1. There was no general epidemic of the disease, only isolated cases, having no apparent connection with each other, occurring.

The 13 cases of Diphtheria were distributed as fol-**Diphtheria**. lows:—Pannal, 7; Follifoot (Pannal end) 4; Goldsborough, 1; and Bilton, 1. There were two principal outbreaks in two families, one at Pannal Ash (five cases) and one at Follifoot (four cases). There were no deaths from this disease.

There was not a single case of this disease in the Enteric district during the year.

A few cases of Whooping Cough occurred, but they Whooping were of a mild nature.

Measles.

Measles broke out in several parts of the district, but by careful isolation of the cases in their own homes the spread of the disease was prevented.

Small Pox.

No case of Small Pox occurred during 1907.

Sewage Disposal.

The drainage of Pannal is now in hand. Its completion will remedy a vast number of insanitary places. small schemes for sewage disposal at Kettlesing, Follifoot, Ferrensby, Scotton, and Brearton will, I hope, be proceeded with as soon as Pannal is finished, as they are very much needed. The Pannal end of Follifoot will also require early attention.

Water Supply.

The district as a whole (with the exception mentioned below) is well supplied with pure, wholesome water. The villages of Hampsthwaite, Kettlesing, and Scotton require a better supply of water than they have at present.

Slaughter Houses and Inspection.

There are 13 Slaughter Houses registered in the district. These are regularly visited and the meat in them inspected. The carcase of a bullock affected with Tuberculosis was found in one Slaughter House. The diseased portions were destroyed. The entire carcases of two pigs, one affected with Tuberculosis, and one in a semi-putrid condition, were also destroyed.

Cowsheds.

There are 72 Cowsheds on the register. The condition of these has been generally satisfactory.

Factories and Workshops

The number of Factories and Workshops in the district is 71, viz., Factories (including Factory Laundries), 15; Work places (including Workshop Laundries), 11; Retail Bakehouses, 5; Domestic Workshops, 5; and other Workshops, 35.

Sanitation

No defect of sanitation of Workshops as regards Workshops cleanliness, air space, ventilation, or drainage of wet floors, was found.

There are five Retail Bakehouses in the district. These Retail Bakeh'uses comply with the Act as regards closets, drains, water cisterns of w.c.'s, sleeping places, and limewashing.

There are no Underground Bakehouses in the district. Und'rgr'nd Bakeho'ses.

There is no Home Work in the district within the Home meaning of the Act.

It is pleasing to me to be again able to place before you so satisfactory a Report on your district.
