

Section A. - Statistics and Social Conditions of the Area.

The area is mainly agricultural and residential.

There are a number of small industries in the town including a linen mill, an aerated water factory and shirt, gown and sports clothing factories.

Unemployment exists to a moderate extent.

The alteration in the Area has added certain Sanitary difficulties. The sewage disposal is in many cases unsatisfactory, particularly on Scotton Moor and Wetherby Road.

A few of the additional houses are unfit for habitation.

The comparable death rate is slightly below that for England and Wales and is exceeded by the birth rate.

The largest individual causes of deaths were heart disease, cerebral hæmorrhage, and cancer.

There is no apparent evidence that unemployment has exercised any significant influence on the health or physique of children or adults.

Section B.-Health Services for the Area.

The Harrogate Infirmary continues to supply most of the Medical and Surgical treatment in cases requiring admission to Hospital.

The Bath Hospital, Harrogate, renders specialised treatment in cases of rheumatism and skin diseases.

The Joint Isolation Hospital on Forest Moor takes care of cases of scarlet fever, diphtheria, and enteric fever, while a small Hospital on Killinghall Moor is always kept ready for the reception of cases of small pox.

Hospital provision for the area is regarded as adequate.

The Ambulance facilities are adequate and remain as before, the Ambulance maintained in Knaresborough being administered by a Joint Ambulance Committee of the Knaresborough Urban and Nidderdale Councils.

No new Clinics or Treatment Centres have been opened in Knaresborough during the year.

Section C.—Sanitary Circumstances of the Area. Water.

The supply of water from Harrogate has been excellent in quantity and quality; no analysis has been made or required by this Authority during the year.

Drainage & Sewerage.

Extensions of the Sewers to the Wayside Estate and the Housing Estate have taken place.

Rivers & Streams.

Considerable polution of the river is occurring from the Sewage Works: the necessary alterations were undertaken during the year.

Public Cleansing.

The dry house refuse is collected in covered motor lorries and disposed of at the Council's tip.

Factories and Workshops.

The factories and workshops were inspected 180 times; 4 nuisances under the Public Health Acts were found and the necessary work is in hand.

Camping Sites.

The number of sites used for camping in 1938 was 4. Licences were issued by the Urban Council for 3 sites. The estimated maximum number of campers resident in the area at one time during 1938 was 300.

Smoke Abatement.

Shops.

No legal action has been taken under the provisions of the Shops Act, 1934. Informal action has been taken in some cases.

Premises and Occupations Controlled by Bye-Laws and Regulations.

These are stone buildings, the ceilings rather low, but kept in clean satisfactory condition

Number of workshops—19, each inspected 8 times.

Baths or Pools.

There are no swimming baths or pools open to the public in the area.

Eradication of Bed-Bugs.

Number of Council Houses infested—1; disinfested—1. Other houses infested—3; disinfested—3.

The methods employed are fumigation with "Cimex" and spraying with "Pyagra."

Before removal to Council Houses, where necessary, the bedding is sterilized in a steam disinfector, and the furniture sprayed and fumigated.

The houses are subsequently inspected and fumigated if required.

Schools.

The sanitary condition, water supply, etc., of all schools is satisfactory. No school was closed for epidemic disease during 1938.

Section D.-Housing.

51 Council Houses was erected during the year and progress was made in the demolition of condemned houses.

A large number (55) of houses were erected by private enterprise during the year.

The total number of houses in the district is now 2,269.

Section E.-Inspection and Supervision of Food.

Milk.

All cowsheds and dairies have been inspected regularly. The premises have been found in a very satisfactory condition. The cows are properly groomed and washed before milking, and all the milk has been produced under clean conditions. One licence was granted during the year for Grade A (T.T.) Milk.

Meat and Other Foods.

Bakehouses have been kept in a clean and sanitary condition.

As previously reported, two slaughter-houses are old registered slaughter-houses in bad positions and surrounded by dwelling houses. All are kept clean.

Nutrition.

No educational work on the subject of nutrition has been undertaken by the Council.

Section F.-Infectious Disease.

Scarlet Fever was very prevalent during the year. No vaccinations were performed by the Medical Officer of Health under the Public Health Regulations, 1917.

Under arrangements made by the County Council a number of children were immunised against diphtheria by the Medical Officer of Health during the year. No case of diphtheria has occurred in the town of Knaresborough. Four cases notified from Knaresborough proved, on admission to Hospital, not to be diphtheria.

The remaining four occurred at the Sanatorium, diphtheria bacilli occurred in all the four cases but only one had symptoms of diphtheria.

Dwelling-houses have been disinfected after cancer cases and on one or two occasions for vermin.

The usual rat week occurred during the year.
