To the Chairman and Members of the Cannock Rural District Council:-

I have the honour to make to you my Fifth Annual Report on the Health and Sanitary conditions of the district to cover the year 1943.

For the same reasons as in previous war years the report is still given in abbreviated form and is not printed.

Of the Infectious Diseases Scarlet Fever, Measles and Whooping Cough accounted for 87, 87 and 94 of the notifications. The fall in cases of measles was very marked. At 29 cases notified, Diphtheria also was considerably down on the previous year. With the increased number of children protected by immunisation, it is hoped that the number of cases will still further decrease.

The Local Birth Rate was higher and the Local Death Rate lower than the rates for the whole of England and Wales.

There has been no change of Staff during the year: the willingness and loyalty of the Staff has been throughout the greatest assistance to me.

I wish to record my gratitude to you, Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen, for your considerateness and help.

It was estimated that at 31st December, 1943. 61.39% children under 5 years had been Immunised, and 70.48% between 5 and under 15.

PUBLIC CLEANSING AND  
SALVAGE.

The year 1943 saw the introduction of Public Cleansing by direct labour. From 1st February the emptying of cesspools in those Parishes previously serviced by contractor was commenced, and in the following November a new refuse vehicle was purchased for the collection of refuse in the parishes of Penkridge and Lapley. These two undertakings proved very successful in spite of suitable labour being very difficult to obtain. The parishes of Brewood, Cheslyn Hay, Saredon, Great Wyrley, Essington, Huntington, Featherstone, Hilton, Shereshill, Hatherton were as in previous years done by contract.

The Salvage Department which was set up in November, 1942, continued to do good work throughout the year.

ANTHRAX.

During the year 20 suspected cases of Anthrax were reported: two of these were confirmed.

WATER SUPPLIES.

The chief water supplies in the District are obtained from the South Staffordshire Water Works Co., and The Wolverhampton Corporation, who supply Cheslyn Hay, Great Wyrley, Huntington, Hatherton, Penkridge, and the larger portion of the parishes of Brewood Stretton, Essington, Shereshill, Featherstone, Hilton, Lapley, Wheaton Aston, and Saredon. The Stafford Corporation supplies Coppenhall and Dunston.
