STATISTICAL DETAILS OF CENSUS, 1911.

Area of District ... ... 7,786 acres

Land, 7,621 acres. Inland Water, 165 acres.

Population ... ... 12,551

Nett Population after deducting inmates of Institutions, 11,686.

Occupied Houses ... ... 2,782

Giving a density of occupation of 4.5 per house and about five per acre.

Geological Character.—East of the South - Western Railway the district is on the river drift gravels, to the west of this line it is mainly on the Bagshot formation except between Englefield Green and Virginia Water, where the London clay prevails.

Population.—In the last ten year census period 1901-1911 there was an average increase of population in the district of 65.6 persons per annum. In the year 1913, 124 deaths were registered in the district, of these twenty-one were of persons who were only temporarily residing in Egham, mostly at the Holloway Sanatorium. These have to be deducted and the deaths of seventeen residents of Egham who died away from home added. Thus making the actual number of deaths for the district. 120. During the year 251 births were registered, so that the increase of births over deaths is 131, for the year 1913. There are, however, a considerable number of empty houses and there are no industrial occupations to keep the young persons of either sex in the district. Therefore, it is estimated that at present a very small increase is taking place. The population estimated to the middle of the year is 12,679.

Housing.—The importance of the work done under this heading in connection with the health of the community can hardly be over-estimated. The dwellings of the working classes in Egham are almost entirely of a good type and are generally in a satisfactory state of repair.

Although very little building is going on there is no dearth of cottages, probably owing to families migrating in search of employment. Five new houses were built during the year and twelve plans passed.

Sewerage and Scavenging.—No part of the district is sewered. Scavenging of dry refuse is carried out by the Authority. In cases where difficulty has been experienced in disposing of the contents of pail closets by the occupants of houses, the Authority has undertaken the work.

Water Supply.—The mains of the South-West Suburban Water Company supply the greater part of the district. The water supplied by this company is of better quality than formerly. The more rural parts of the district depend chiefly on wells which, however, are getting fewer as the Water Company extends its service. Five samples of well water were submitted to analysis, two of which were condemned.

Isolation Hospital.—During the year an entrance lodge has been erected for the use of the porter, and the nurses' quarters remodelled. This has met a long-felt want.

An excellent ambulance has been purchased. A complete change of staff has been made and the various members work together in an efficient and harmonious manner. The buildings, &c., are well kept, clean, and the institution is thoroughly well administered. 33 cases—14 scarlet fever, 19 Diphtheria were admitted.

Notifiable Infectious Disease.—The number of cases of the various infectious diseases notified during the year are given in the subjoined table. The two previous years are given for comparison—

Scarlet Fever.—The number of cases (14) notified of this disease is much below the average of the last five years. One fatal case was registered. Two of the cases were imported, one person knowingly travelling in an infectious state and causing a spread of the disease in Egham.

Diphtheria.—An outbreak occurred in the autumn among the children at Bishopsgate School which had to be closed for a time. It was found that prior to the first case being notified many children in that part of the district had suffered from sore throat. Altogether 21 cases were notified, of which 5 proved fatal.

Tuberculosis.—Thirty-one cases of pulmonary tuberculosis and nineteen "other forms of tuberculosis" were notified. There is a certain difficulty in making an absolutely positive diagnosis in many of the latter class of cases. Treatment of this disease is undertaken by the County Council and persons are beginning to avail themselves of it. Ten deaths were registered from the various forms of this disease, being 0.78 per 1,000 of estimated population.

Non-Notifiable Infectious Diseases. — Whooping Cough.—This disease was prevalent in February and several cases were reported among the children attending Thorpe Road and Egham Hythe School. In the Autumn an outbreak occurred at Virginia Water and it was considered advisable to close the school for a period. One death was registered.

Measles.—A number of cases were reported from Englefield Green in February and March, and two fatal cases were recorded.

CHICKEN POX.—The number of cases of this complaint reported was very few. No special comment is necessary.

Schools.—The Elementary Schools of the district were frequently inspected, they are well maintained, always found to

be clean and with a sufficient water supply. In one or two cases the playgrounds require levelling, as in wet weather the water stands in pools.

Sanitary Work.—The Inspector, Mr. W. Simpson, reports having visited 198 premises during the year—14 complaints were received and 42 detailed inspections made.

Eighty-two nuisances were discovered.

Nuisances were abated on 31 premises, twenty formal notices were served, but in no instance was it necessary to institute legal proceedings.

Thirty-nine premises were disinfected after infectious diseases.

Five new water supplies from wells were inspected and assed.

Thirty-three samples of food were analysed under the "Sale of Food and Drugs Act," and one sample of sugar was found to be adulterated.

All the premises used for the preparation of food were regularly and frequently inspected, both by the Medical Officer of Health and the Sanitary Inspector. These were in nearly every instance found to be well kept, clean and satisfactory. In a few instances a few defects were noted and subsequently remedied by the owner or occupier concerned. No case of tuberculosis in animals or meat was discovered. The slaughter-houses were visited frequently while work was being done. The milk supply of the district is ample, both in quality and quantity.

The cowsheds, dairies, and milkshops were frequently visited and found to be clean, well kept and satisfactory.

Workshop and Factory Act.—The district is high-class, residential in character, and essentially non-industrial. Twenty-three workshops, including laundries and bakehouses were frequently inspected. One defect, want of separate closet accommodation was discovered and subsequently remedied. In every other instance they were found to be clean, well kept, and in accordance with the Act.

Vital Statistics.—The number of births registered in the year 1913 again shows a decrease and is the lowest recorded in the last six years—251. Males, 120; females, 131. Of these 19 were illegitimate. 247 were born in the district and 6 were born to residents of Egham, but temporarily living elsewhere.

One hundred and twenty-four deaths were registered in the district, twenty-one of whom were non-residents. Seventeen persons belonging to Egham died outside the district, making the nett deaths one hundred and twenty.

It will be seen from the above table that both the birth and death rates are again considerable below the average for the country.

Infantile Mortality.—Fifteen deaths of infants under one year were registered, the smallest number in the past six years. Not a single death occurred from Diarrhæa.
