TO: THE CHAIRMAN AND THE COUNCILLORS OF DOWNHAM RURAL DISTRICT COUNCIL

Ladies and Gentlemen,

I have the honour to present the Annual Report for 1972.

The mid-year population of the area was estimated by the Registrar General as 24,320. There were 418 live births and 236 deaths giving a natural increase of 182. There was therefore a movement out of the area of 182 persons.

There were 8 infant deaths and this has naturally affected our figures unfavourably. There were no maternal deaths.

The pattern of deaths remains much the same as in previous years with the main causes shown as Ischaemic Heart Disease, Cerebrovascular Disease and Cancer.

The County Services in this department continues at level, with protection continuing to be given against measles and rubella. In general, the health of the school population remains satisfactory.

Smallpox vaccination is no longer recommended as a routine procedure in early childhood.

I would like to thank the Chairman and the members of the Public Health Committee for their constant interest and support, and to the staff of the Public Health Department for their co-operation throughout the year.

Section D

Report of the Senior Public Health Inspector

Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

A short report on the environmental health work of the Council follows. Discussion on the Reorganisation Proposals for Local Government, the National Health Service and Water and Sewerage administration provided the background for all the Council's work which was maintained at a high level, particularly in relation to housing. The number of grants made for housing improvement work started to rise dramatically towards the end of the year. It was obvious, however, that an environmental problem at Stoke Ferry due to the increase in production at the animal feed factory of Favor Parker Ltd., was becoming quite serious and solutions, particularly in relation to noise and dust nuisance were being sought.

I thank the Council and my colleagues for support, understanding and continual co-operation.

In the latter part of the year, complaints of nuisance from noise, dust and smell arising from the operations at the Stoke Ferry Mill of Messrs. Favor Parker Ltd., reached a climax in December. The firm had greatly expanded production of animal feed, and new grinding plant proved to be very noisy, the mill itself being situated in the centre of the village.

The firm had agreed, however, to employ Noise Consultants and carry out work shown to be necessary. A report was to hand in November which advocated lining the grinding houses with sound absorption material and the fitting of silencers to all five mill exhaust systems. It was considered that this should reduce sound levels outside the mill from the Noise Rating Curve between N6O and N65 to between N35 and N4O.

Favor Parker Ltd., accepted the noise levels as being too great and placed the necessary order with the Consultants at the end of the year; it was expected that the work would be completed within three months.

Smell seemed to arise mainly from the fish meal and fish oil components of the feed, and difficulty was expected in reducing this complaint. Measures to reduce dust were being prepared.

NOTICES

47 informal letters and 4 formal notices were served in addition to Housing Acts Notices, and in addition verbal notice was often sufficient to bring about improvements required.

31 Notices were complied with, as were 25 Notices served in previous years.

FOOD AND FOOD PREMISES

(a) General

At 31st December, the following food businesses were operating from premises within the District:-

- 8 Fried Fish and Chip Shops (in addition, two of the businesses operate mobile units).
- 15 Butchers Shops, all of whom manufacture sausages etc.
- 4 Licenced slaughterhouses, where 100% meat inspection is carried out by the Council's Officers.
- 5 Cafes.
- 46 Licenced houses, including 5 clubs.
- 2 Greengrocers.
- 92 General Food Shops.
- 1 Factory Canteen.
- 1 Flour Depot.
- 92 Businesses selling ice-cream, but no ice-cream is manufactured in the district.

There were no businesses operating mainly as poultry slaughtering premises or where imported food containers required to be opened and inspected.

It is considered that, generally, hygienic conditions were maintained satisfactorily at the food premises in the area, although much more frequent inspections were required than could be given by your staff. Several onion peeling premises became established in the district in September, but these were immediately closed when it was pointed out that the premises were not satisfactory as laid down by the Food Hygiene Regulations.

27 inspections at School Canteens were carried out by the County Council's staff during the year, and none of the foodstuffs inspected were unfit.

(b) Meat Inspection

No charges were made for the service as allowed by the Meat Inspection Regulations as all meat so inspected is for local consumption; in addition, no control on the hours of slaughter has been considered necessary.

Again, there was no evidence of tuberculosis in cattle and no case of cysticercosis.

Effective liaison is maintained with the Veterinary Officers of the Ministry of Agriculture at Norwich.

A table setting out the statistics follows later.

(c) Food Contamination

No serious complaint was made, and no formal action was necessary.

(d) Milk and Dairies

There were 9 distributors and 18 dairies as in 1971.

Six samples of untreated milk were submitted from the one producer/retailer in the area, and all were found negative to brucella abortus on biological examination.

Six samples of school milk were submitted for examination, and all satisfied the methylene blue and phosphatase tests.

OFFENSIVE TRADES

There were none established in the District.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS

During August there were, as far as could be ascertained, 148 permanent residential caravans in the district, 5 holiday vans (touring) and 15 holiday vans (static) together with fisherman's tents.

The largest sites are situated at Feltwell, Marham and Shouldham, and at the end of the year, action was being considered to secure the observance of licence conditions at several sites which were considered to have fallen below standard.

Again, there was no solution to the problem of an occupied van parked on a public road verge. No site had yet been established in the vicinity by the County Council for Gypsies and other itinerant persons under the Caravan Sites Act, 1968. There is no particular problem in this Council's district.

HOUSING

(a) General

As very full tables were submitted in 1971, a summary is provided this year, with a comparison of figures for previous years:-

The provisions of the 1969 Housing Act making Discretionary Grants much more attractive were beginning to have a dramatic effect, and the work of the Department was very greatly increased in this sphere.

45 of the Council's Houses were provided with washbasins during the year, and 24 houses were re-roofed and insulated to a modern standard.

The clearance of unfit property was continued at a reasonable rate as compared with previous years, as evidenced by the figures set out below:-

It was estimated that there were still some 600 very unfit dwellings in the District to be dealt with by demolition, extensive repair or modernisation.

By the end of the year, 395 Discretionary Improvement Grants had been given since October, 1951, and 623 Standard Grants since August, 1959.

(b) Rent Act, 1957

No applications were received for either Certificates of Disrepair or cancellation of existing Certificates.

(c) Waiting Lists for Council Houses

At 30th June, 1972, there were 520 individual applicants for accommodation, 84 of these being from persons living outside the district, 82 wanting exchanges to larger or smaller accommodation, 26 were under Notice to Quit, 17 awaited marriage and 46 lived with parents. 23 applicants lived in caravans.

PUBLIC CLEANSING

(a) Refuse Collection and Disposal

The once weekly kerbside collection under incentive bonus conditions continued and there were few complaints.

The Government called for a thorough survey of waste disposal sites, both in use and recently used and a good deal of work in compiling the information was necessary. It was considered essential, however, to really 'get to grips' with the pollution situation so that proper control of the deposition of toxic and other polluting wastes could be achieved as soon as possible. It was not thought, however, that a real problem existed in this District. Tipping ceased at Fordham, Wormegay and Feltwell in the Autumn, and cessation at Fincham was expected at an early date.

Adequate cover was applied, and it was expected that the Fordham Site would yield crops in the Spring of 1973.

The removal of several old car bodies was secured informally under the provisions of the Civic Amenities Act.

(b) Pail Emptying

A Contractor continued to collect in Ten Mile Bank, Downham West, Salters Lode and Fincham.

(c) Cesspool Emptying

An increased number of cesspools etc., were emptied, and two contractors carried out the bulk of the work. The charge of 63p per emptying regardless of tank capacity was continued. Increased attention was given to Council sewage installations.

DRAINAGE AND SEWERAGE

The County Public Health Engineering Department continued to supervise work on the first phase of No. 5 Area Scheme at Runcton Holme and Watlington, and the Works at Magdalen were commissioned during the year. At the end of the year, work at Watlington and Runcton was virtually complete, and a new Contractor had established site offices at Wiggenhall St. Germans for the second phase involving the Wiggenhall Parishes.

The Council approved the No. 6 Regional Scheme for Northwold/Methwold Hythe/ Brookville/Whittington/Stoke Ferry/Boughton/Wretton/Wereham/West Dereham and Crimplesham in January, and design work went ahead during the year, as it did for the proposed Marham Regional Scheme involving, in addition, the Parishes of Wormegay, Shouldham, Shouldham Thorpe and Fincham.

A scheme for Wimbotsham was also being prepared by your Surveyor's Department in conjunction with the County Public Health Engineer.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948 - Sec. 50

No burials were carried out during the year.

DISEASES OF ANIMALS (WASTE FOOD) ORDER, 1957

Administration of this Order is delegated to the Council by the County Council. One person only is licenced. The aim of the Order is to see that the prevention of animal disease is minimised by proper sterilisation.

OPEN AIR SWIMMING POOL, WAR MEMORIAL PLAYING FIELD, DOWNHAM MARKET.

There were no public health problems, and the water and changing rooms were again kept by the staff in a first class condition.

The Joint Management Committee decided in April that the pool should be heated by an oil fired boiler, and a firm was instructed to prepare a suitable scheme for execution in the 1972/73 close season.

THE ANIMAL BOARDING ESTABLISHMENTS ACT, 1963

Four establishments at Methwold, Stoke Ferry, Runcton Holme and Wereham were licenced, and conditions were maintained satisfactorily. It had been agreed by the owner that the Methwold establishment should be re-sited at Methwold Hythe as soon as possible, planning permission having been obtained.

THE SCRAP METAL DEALERS ACT, 1964

At the end of the year 13 registrations were in force.

THE OFFICES, SHOPS AND RAILWAY PREMISES ACT, 1963

This Act makes provision for the safety, health and welfare of persons employed in shops, offices and railway premises.

The response to letters requiring compliance with various provisions of the Act was good, and it was not necessary to recommend any formal action. The reduction in the number of small businesses is indicated in the above figures.

WATER SUPPLIES

(a) Main Piped Supplies General

The District is well served by water mains, and the number of properties not able to have mains water is now very low. Quite a large number, however, are supplied by standpipes, and many terraces have joint standpipes. The policy of the Council is to require water to be provided in pipes inside the house whenever reasonable and practicable.

. The Wisbech and District Water Board were responsible for three sources of supply to the Rural District, viz., the morthern half from the River Nar and bore at Marham and the southern half from the bores at Denton Lodge, Feltwell and Beechamwell.

I am indebted to the Board's Engineer and Manager, Mr. C. Llanwarne, B.Sc.: Tech., A.M.I.C.E., A.M.I.W.E., for the following information:-

Water Analyses 1972 - Rural District of Downham

Frequent bacteriological examinations have been undertaken during 1972 on samples from the Board's sourceworks and the distribution system in this area. The results have been of a very high standard. Many chemical analyses have also been carried out.

All new mains were sterilised, samples taken and bacteriological examinations made before the mains were put into service. No connections were permitted until the water in the mains was of the highest standard of purity.

There was one case of contamination of the water supply during the year. On the 22nd September, 1972, a positive bacteriological sample was obtained from the outlet of Denton Lodge reservoir. Samples taken a few minutes earlier of both the raw water and of the chlorinated supply were excellent. Two repeat samples taken the following day from the outlet of the reservoir were excellent as were samples taken of the raw water and the chlorinated supply. All subsequent samples were excellent.

Out of the total of treated water samples and samples taken from consumers' taps 99.9% were negative on examination for organisms of the coliform group. This represents a very high standard of bacterial purity.

CLEAN AIR ACT, 1956

No action was necessary this year.

DESTRUCTION OF PESTS

(a) Rats and Mice

The Council employs one Rodent Operator who is provided with a small van and the necessary equipment. A lock-up store is provided for poisons and baits.

The Council is charged with the duty of ensuring that owners and occupiers keep their land free of rats and mice. Whilst free treatment or advice was given at domestic premises, a charge of 70p per hour was made at 24 business and 27 agricultural premises.

373 separate treatments were carried out and 1512 visits were made during the year.

(b) Other Pests

The refuse tips were treated regularly with insecticide against fly and cricket infestations, and private premises were occasionally treated for cockroach, flea, ant and silverfish infestations.

Twenty-eight wasps nests were also destroyed.
