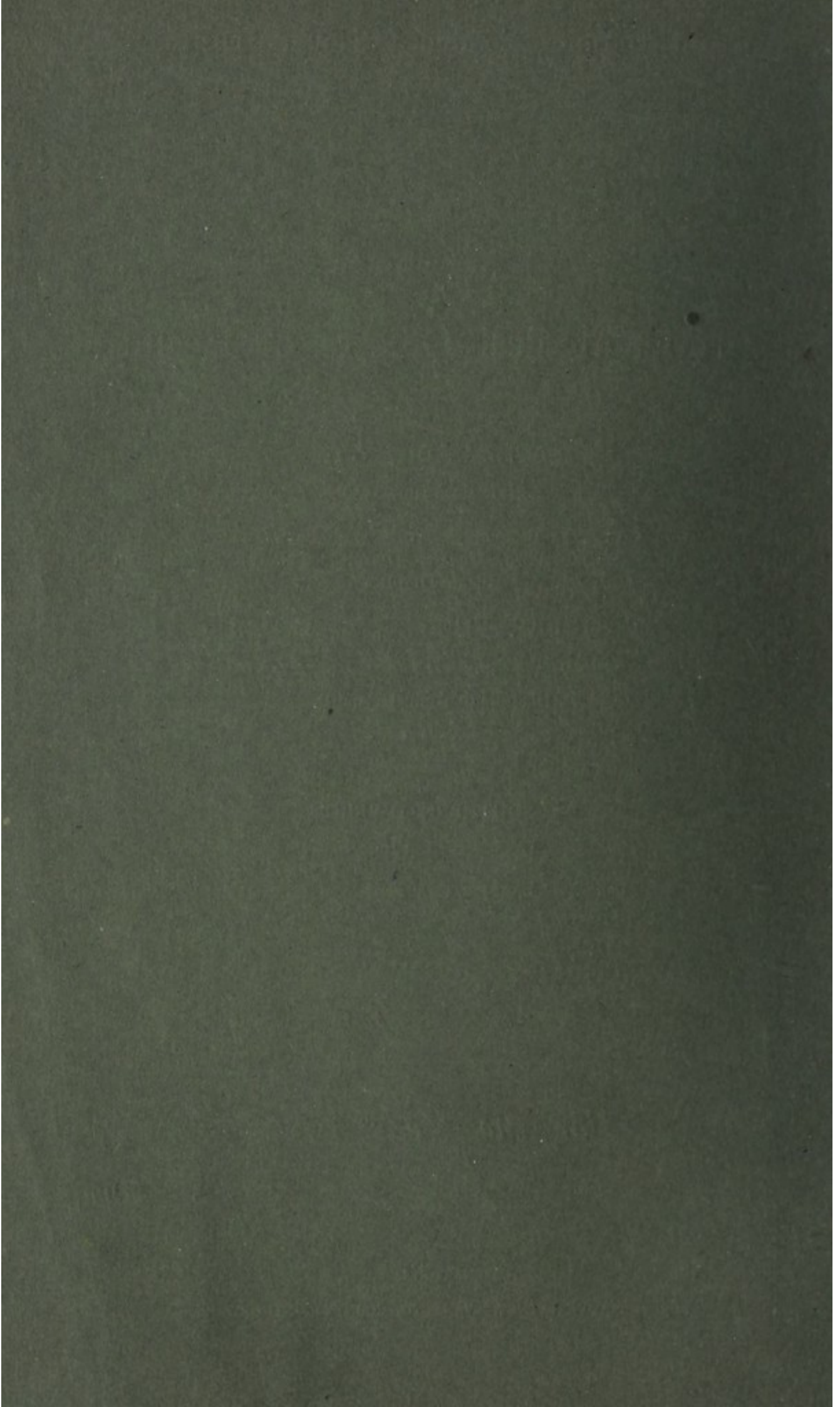

Annual report of MOH for 1952.

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Dr. T. H. PIERCE's Introduction.

To the Chairman and Members of the Caernarvonshire Joint Sanitary Authority.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

I beg to submit my Annual Report for the year ended December 31st, 1952, this being my Eighth Annual Report.

For the purpose of my Introductory Remarks all constituent Authorities in the Northern Area have been taken as one District and the following statistics of population are compiled from the Registrar General's figures for all Districts.

Statistics for individual Districts will be found in Section B—Tables in Common, and in Section C—Additional Local Reports.

SUMMARY OF VITAL STATISTICS FOR THE YEAR 1953.

The Registrar General's estimated mid-year population was 63,261 which was 332 less than in 1951. Bangor and Conway showed increases of 260 and 212 respectively, but all other districts showed decreases as follows:—

Bethesda, 1; Betws-y-Coed, 24; Llandudno, 460; Llanfairfechan, 66; Penmaenmawr, 123; Nant Conway, 60; and Ogwen 70.

BIRTH RATE.

There was a slight decrease in the Birth Rate from 13.99 per 1,000 of the population in 1951 to 13.44 per 1,000 in 1952.

The Live Birth Rate for England and Wales was 15.3 per 1,000 of the population which was the lowest recorded since 1941.

DEATH RATE.

There was a marked drop in the Death Rate from 16.02 per 1,000 of the population in 1951 to 14.09 per 1,000 in 1952. The General Death Rate for England and Wales was 11.3 per 1,000 of the population.

INFANT MORTALITY.

The Infant Mortality Rate dropped from 38.20 per 1,000 live births in 1951 to 27.06 per 1,000 in 1952, compared with 27.6 per 1,000 for England and Wales. In 1932 the Infant Mortality Rate for England and Wales was 65 per 1,000 live births, and 49 per 1,000 in 1942. In 1952, 15 of the 23 infant deaths occurred under the age of 4 weeks.

MATERNAL MORTALITY.

There were no maternal deaths during 1952 (i.e. deaths connected with childbirth and pregnancy).

CANCER MORTALITY.

The Cancer Mortality Rate increased from 2.51 per 1,000 of the population in 1951 to 2.81 per 1,000 in 1952. The Cancer Mortality Rate for England and Wales was also increased from 1.96 per 1,000 of the population to 1.99 per 1,000.

TUBERCULOSIS MORTALITY.

The Tuberculosis Mortality Rate was 0.41 per 1,000 of the population compared with 0.45 per 1,000 in 1951 and 0.55 in 1950. The Respiratory Tuberculosis Mortality Rate for England and Wales was 0.212 per 1,000 of the population which was a decrease of 23% from the previous year and less than half the figure for 1947. The Mortality Rate for other forms of Tuberculosis for England and Wales was 0.028 per 1,000 compared with 0.041 per 1,000 for 1951.

WHOOPING COUGH AND MEASLES.

There were no deaths from Whooping Cough or Measles during 1952.

DIPHTHERIA.

No cases of Diphtheria were notified during the year.

ACUTE POLIOMYELITIS.

Eight cases of acute anterior poliomyelitis (Infantile Paralysis) were notified during the year with one death giving a mortality rate of 0.01 per 1,000 of the population which was the same as that for England and Wales.

INFLUENZA MORTALITY.

There was only one death directly attributable to influenza giving a Mortality Rate of 0.01 per 1,000 of the population compared with 0.04 per 1,000 for the rest of England and Wales.

PNEUMONIA.

The death rate from Pneumonia increased from 0.28 per 1,000 of the population in 1951 to 0.37 per 1,000 in 1952. The Pneumonia death rate for England and Wales was 0.47 per 1,000 of the population.

Heart and Circulatory diseases accounted for 42.24 per cent. of all deaths during 1952 and 16.82 per cent. of the deaths were caused by cerebral hæmorrhage and other cerebral conditions.

INCIDENCE OF NOTIFIED INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

During 1952, 411 cases of infectious diseases (excluding Tuberculosis) were notified compared with 1,604 cases in 1951 and 675 cases in 1950.

The infectious diseases notified consisted of 66 Scarlet Fever; 128 Whooping Cough; 113 Measles; 20 Dysentery; 4 Cerebro spinal meningitis; 15 Pneumonia; 1 Ophthalmia Neonatorum; 5 Food Poisoning; 1 Puerperal Pyrexia and 9 Erysipelas.

Table "A" below shows the number of male and female cases of Scarlet Fever, Measles and Whooping Cough notified, divided up into different age groups. Table "B" gives the case rates for 1952 and 1951 of certain notified infectious diseases per 1,000 of the population for the Northern Area compared with those for England and Wales.

COMPARABILITY FACTOR.

The Registrar General has issued figures known as Comparability Factors for Births and Deaths. These are numbers by which the Birth Rates and Death Rates for individual Districts should be multiplied in order to give a truer comparison of the rates, thus compensating for the fact that some districts have a population of more elderly people than others. The following are the Comparability Factors for the various districts.

TUBERCULOSIS.

During 1952, 81 Pulmonary and 16 Non-Pulmonary cases of Tuberculosis were added to the Tuberculosis Registers. These included Transfer Cases from other areas. In addition, 8 previously un-notified cases were added to the Registers on receipt of Death Returns from the Registrar General and local Registrars. The 81 Pulmonary Cases consisted of 42 males and 39 females and non-Pulmonary of 6 males and 10 females.

HEALTH SERVICES.

MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE.

This section of the Public Health Administration is under the control of the County Medical Officer of Health and his staff.

TUBERCULOSIS.

Most patients are treated at the Chest Clinic, Abbey Road, Bangor, and the Llandudno General Hospital, but a few from parts of Penmachno are seen at the Machynlleth Chest Hospital.

Patients requiring Sanatorium treatment may be admitted to any of the following Sanatoria :— North Wales Sanatorium, Near Denbigh ; Llangwyfan (attached to the North Wales Sanatorium) South Wales Sanatorium, Tregarth ; Bryn Seiont, Caernarvon ; Llangefni, Anglesey ; or the Penhesgyn Open Air Home, Menai Bridge.

LABORATORY WORK.

Bacteriological examination of Milk, Ice-Cream, water, swabs etc., are carried out at the Public Health Laboratory, Conway. Chemical Analyses, both qualitative and quantitative, are carried out by the Public Analyst, at Chester.

VENEREAL DISEASES.

Venereal Clinics are held at the Caernarvonshire and Anglesey Infirmary, Bangor, and at the Llandudno General Hospital.

HOUSING.

During 1952, 342 houses were completed by the various Local Authorities in the Northern Area of Caernarvonshire and more were under construction. In 1951, 303 houses were completed for the same districts.

Dr. I. P. NELIS' Introduction.

To the Chairman and Members of the Caernarvonshire Joint Sanitary Committee.

MR. CHAIRMAN, LADIES AND GENTLEMEN,

There has been a satisfactory year in the Southern District of the Combine, although Water and Sewerage Schemes have often been curtailed. This has resulted in essential services being held back and the expansion of the various districts so prevented.

Inquiries have been conducted with infinite understanding, often resulting in a modified scheme being accepted by the Authority concerned so that a beginning can be made until such time as the whole area can be included and the original plan carried out. This is heartening for all concerned.

The alteration of so many Public Health regulations as well as the National Health Scheme, and the re-orientation of established Institutions and Hospitals has had a fundamental effect on all routine Health Services.

Many of the powers held by the Local Authority have passed into other hands, and even where some responsibility remains the officials find administration difficult with no great improvement in the result. Where the new drastic changes in Milk Regulations are enforced, serious consequences in the curtailment of supply has been reported in one of the great centres. In this area enormous numbers of new investigators and inspectors spring up to supervise this industry. The farmers now say they are never seen, and that they miss the personal visit of the Sanitary Inspector even though he might urge white-washing of cow sheds.

Again it is remarkable how people accustomed to the visit of the Relieving Officer seem lost after generations of guidance. I have seen real suffering among the mental deficient. The 'office' for 'relief' opens the door to the same abuse as before with the addition of such palpable new ones: by merely counting the number of Council Houses where a tenant works as against those where the rent is received by post, an indication is readily calculated.

One of the anomalies of this new legislation is that the function of sending old and infirm persons to Institution by the District Medical Officer, which in the past was much criticised, has been devolved upon the Medical Officer in a more responsible form than ever under the National Assistance Act, 1948, Section 47. With no personal knowledge, as the Parish Doctor had under the old system, only hearsay, and pressure from those whose interest it might be to be rid of the helpless individual.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

I have to report that there has been a steady falling off in notifications of every kind, from all medical sources, as compared with a few years ago. Diphtheria no longer appears on the list of infectious diseases as before, with the heavy mortality of children on the threshold of life. This is due to the universal immunisation in infancy, but vaccination against smallpox is no longer a mother's earnest care, and more is the pity. Poliomyelitis has again passed us by. If the notifications were reliable, I would congratulate the Districts, but like other established customs, I am led to the conclusion by my own observations that, where pathological verification is sought, only the Government Laboratory feels it incumbent upon themselves to carry out this statutory obligation.

I am told by Practitioners that by notification they lay themselves open to so much worry and friction, with sometimes the loss of whole families of panel patients, that they prefer to forgo the fee. The risk of being sued is as nothing compared to the protests from patients who find themselves inundated with visitations, advisers, health visitors and school inspectors insisting on medical certificates for a child to go to school, or to keep away from school, all causing parental annoyance with the medical adviser. In the past there was some privacy, especially in cases of Tuberculosis, but now their condition is advertised from end to end of a District and people will do anything to escape scrutiny with consequent curtailment of liberty in every direction; they only

want to get away in spite of the increased funds they can claim, with free milk, etc., so long as a family remains under supervision. Only the very severe cases sent out of a Sanatorium are easily contacted once they have experienced some of the publicity entailed they migrate, and spread the disease in a new environment. It is true that Tuberculosis cases are often very difficult to trace

A matter that has interested many Council members at different times is the number of cases that die of heart diseases and again Malignant disease, variously called Sarcoma Carcinoma, cancer etc in the Death Certificate. In the past "Heart Failure" was accepted by the Registrar General, but of late greater accuracy of Certification is enjoyed. Thus Coronary Thrombosis, where death is sudden, might often be mistaken for Cerebral Haemorrhage or 'stroke'. Only lately has cancer of the lung become recognised. Could not many of these cases have been taken variously for pulmonary Tuberculosis, broncho-pneumonia or chronic bronchitis with heart failure, so commonly seen on death certificates? Only post mortem would have shown some of these conditions in the past, but X-Ray and the early examination of people who feel ill or have frequent relapses is the only certain way to diagnosis, and with early diagnosis, how many of these have been ameliorated and life prolonged. Even coronary thrombosis may be prevented in a measure.

SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES IN THE BOROUGH.

PUBLIC ABATTOIR.

The Government Slaughtering and Meat Distribution Scheme remains practically the same as at its inception in January 1940, when the Abattoir was taken over by the Ministry of Food. The slaughtering, which is concentrated in the City, supplies the needs of Bangor, Bethesda U.D.C. and Ogwen R.D.C.

The policy of improving the Abattoir was continued, and 1952 saw the provision of new office accommodation for the respective staffs.

Although the inspection of carcasses was often delayed during periods of heavy killing as a result of late work, 100% meat inspection was maintained.

No serious outbreak of infectious disease took place during the year. Scarlet Fever was higher than has been the average for the past few years, but fortunately it did not spread, and the cases notified were of a mild type. The Measles notifications are the lowest for many years, and compare favourably with the figure for 1951. Diphtheria is still conspicuous by its absence. The immunisation campaigns begun in 1941 and vigorously carried out ever since have reduced the disease in this country to negligible proportions. Included in the new cases of Tuberculosis were 6 males (Pulmonary) and 9 females (8 Pulmonary, 1 Non-Pulmonary). It would seem that for the present the upward trend in the incidence of this disease is controlled, if judged only by the number of notifications received. But it is doubtful if this can be maintained. Better methods of diagnosis, including mass radiography throughout the Country are sure to find more cases, particularly those in the early stages of the disease. At the close of the year the total number of cases on the T.B. Register was 133 (134 in 1951) of whom 16 received treatment in Sanatoria. There were 6 deaths, 6 cases notified as recovered, and four cases left the district.

DISINFECTION.

As a result of Infectious Disease the infected rooms, hospital wards, etc., are disinfected with formaldehyde gas. The homes of tuberculous persons are similarly treated when removed to a sanatorium, or when deaths occur from tuberculosis, cancer or other infectious disease. Disinfections were carried out.

MILK SUPPLY.

At present three classes of milk are retailed in the City, Tuberculin Tested, Heat Treated and ordinary Ungraded. Two local firms produce and supply the Heat Treated Milk, and a third is expected to be licenced in 1953. These are the two largest retailers, so it is safe to assume that the greater proportion of the population is getting the Heat Treated Milk. The milk sold under the designations "T.T. (Pasteurised)" and "Pasteurised" undergoes a process conforming with official regulations.

Close attention was given to the Bacteriological quality of Milk sold within the borough, and 116 samples of milk were procured and submitted for examination. I am pleased to report that there was no complaint of sour milk during the summer season. The following table gives the results of samples taken:—

ICE CREAM.

142 samples of Ice Cream were submitted for analysis and the results were quite satisfactory.

Grade 1 and 2 which are regarded as Satisfactory, this year accounted for 90.8% of the samples, leaving 9.2% in Grade 3 (Moderate quality), and none in Grade 4 (Unsatisfactory).

Following careful investigations it would appear almost certain that the samples in Grade 3 were below standard because the dealer allowed the temperature of the refrigerator to rise above freezing point, either by design to save electric current, or by accident. Once ice cream softens it is an ideal medium for the growth of bacteria which aid decomposition. In all cases the vendors were warned against this practice.

BAKEHOUSES.

The position remains unchanged from that reported last year and all ten bakeries in operation were carried on satisfactorily. It is pleasing to note than some local bakers have taken advantage of improved supplies of wrapping paper and machinery and are now supplying loaves sliced and wrapped for a small additional charge. It is hoped the public in general will also see the advantage and support this desirable practice.

FOOD PREPARING PREMISES.

There are 20 food preparing premises in the Borough registered under the Food and Drugs, Act, 1938. Visits of inspection have been carried out, attention being directed to the condition and cleanliness of premises, utensils, machinery, etc., and the personal hygiene of the employees.

FISH FRIERS.

There are 13 registered fish friers in the borough and periodical visits have been paid. On the whole the general state of cleanliness has been well observed. Defects were found in the paving and washing facilities at two premises, these were all quickly rectified by the proprietors.

LICENCED PREMISES.

The 32 public houses in the borough were inspected and with one exception had reasonably good facilities, including hot water, for the proper cleansing of glasses, etc. The majority of the Licensees used a suitable detergent in the water for this very important operation. Considerable structural improvements have been carried out recently incorporating new or amended sanitary amenities and include improvements to the living as well as the business parts of the premises. The sanitary arrangements were found satisfactory at time of inspection.

HOUSING AND SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES.

The maintenance of dwelling houses in a habitable condition has continued to be one of the major tasks of the department, and one of the most difficult. Delays in the execution of work under notice increased appreciably during the year due in some measure to the natural reluctance on the part of the landlords to face heavy repair bills, but due also to material and labour difficulties.

Two properties were reported unfit for human habitation, and notices were served under Section 9 of the Housing Act, 1936. In both cases the owners elected to carry out the extensive and costly work involved, and at the close of the year the repairs had been executed. A part of a further property was closed under the provisions of Section 12 of the Housing Act as unfit for human habitation. The main reason for closure was excessive dampness which could not be remedied except at prohibitive cost.

Numerous investigations were carried out in the homes of applicants for council houses who reported serious overcrowding. When such cases are verified, full particulars are transmitted to the House Letting Committee supporting the applications on Public Health grounds to relieve the overcrowding.

SHOPS ACT INSPECTION.

Shops in Bangor form a large part of the working community. The administration of the Shops Act and Conditions of Employment have caused very little trouble and where infringements have occurred interviews with the employers have put matters right.

During the year four shopkeepers indicated that, as permitted by the Shops Act, 1950, they were to change the early closing day from Wednesday to an alternate day. Inspection in connection with these matters show that there is a small amount of trading on Sundays and on the early closing day, more particularly in the smaller shops. In the main the goods sold are those allowed in the Act. In one case where goods not exempted were reported to be sold a written warning was given.

FACTORIES ACT, 1937.

35 Visits have been made to factories and workshops, mostly relating to notices received from H.M.I.F. These chiefly had to do with defective W.C. accommodation and minor contraventions such as lighting and cleanliness.

RODENT CONTROL.

The control methods recommended by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries are closely followed. Poisons used are Arsenious Oxide, Zinc Phosphide, Antu, and Warfarin. Whenever possible investigations are carried out to ascertain infestations and during the year the department dealt with infestations, principally of minor character, at 3 Hospitals, 12 College buildings, 2 Hotels, 5 Licenced premises, 2 cinemas, 2 schools, 5 cafes, 24 shops, 6 factories, 2 allotments and 41 dwelling houses. This work included eight on annual contract basis. The Council's refuse disposal tip and sewers were treated twice during the year.

GENERAL SANITATION.

Thirty-three notices to owners of properties requiring choked drains to be cleared, or defective drains to be repaired where complied with. Forty-five drain blockages requiring urgent attention were cleared by Corporation Workers; 18 notices requiring renewal of or repair to sanitary appliances received attention; five offensive accumulations were removed.

ERADICATION OF INSECT PESTS.

Nineteen cases of verminous infestation were dealt with. D.D.T. and Gammexane Insecticides were used successfully in all cases. The practice of issuing insect powder to tenants of houses has been continued and undoubtedly makes a contribution towards the control of pests in these houses.

SWIMMING BATHS.

There is no privately owned swimming baths in Bangor. The Council own one swimming bath, which cannot be considered satisfactory. There is no continuous treatment provided for the water, although chloride of lime is added by hand as required, the bath being emptied and filled according to the High Water level. This may mean that the water is not replaced for several days, three samples of water taken from the swimming bath for bacteriological examination were found to be satisfactory.

SMOKE ABATEMENT.

Occupiers of factories, workplaces, etc., generally complied with the provisions of the law in keeping their output of smoke to the minimum.

SANITARY SUPERVISION OF PLACES OF ENTERTAINMENT

The cinemas and other popularly used halls have been periodically inspected with regard to their sanitary accommodation. The managements have been found anxious to maintain the conveniences in a satisfactory condition and any defects found are at once remedied.

MOVEABLE DWELLINGS.

The Camping Ground at Wayside, Menai Road, is used for occasional camping mainly by Caravan Club Members, and the owner has indicated that he has no intention of applying for a licence to use the site for permanent camping.

The camp was visited during the busy summer season. Lavatory accommodation, water supply and refuse bins are available in accessible positions, and no nuisances were observed. It was not found necessary during the year to deal with the casual camping by caravans on unauthorised land in the borough.

NATIONAL ASSISTANCE ACT, 1948.

Action under Section 47 of this Act was proposed in one case for the removal of an old person in need of care and attention to suitable premises. Eventually the patient was persuaded to go voluntarily and was admitted to the C. & A. General Hospital, and later to an approved Institution.

HOUSING WORK.

MAINTENANCE.

The Direct Labour depot dealt with 1850 items of maintenance during the year. In addition the painting staff completed the external painting of 175 houses.

NEW HOUSES.

The Coedmawr No. 2 Contract was completed during the year. The remaining 24 houses in this contract of 46 houses being occupied, Contract No. 3 consisted of 32 houses was commenced and 15 houses completed and occupied.

Contract No. 4 of 24 houses of the Ministry's "Peoples Home" type was started.

4 shops with flats over (2 with garages) were also completed and occupied in the Coedmawr Estate.

The 12 Huts of the Non Traditional type in Britannia Street was nearing completion at the end of the year.

Maesgeirchen Estate Extension for 154 houses was approved by the Ministry.

SEWERAGE AND FLOOD PREVENTION.

Regular inspections of the systems maintained.

Approval was received for the culverting of the remaining lengths of the River Adda in the built up area.

WATER SUPPLIES.

The service was maintained without undue strain, and extensions to Housing Estates were carried out.

The renewal of the Caernarvon Road main was started in the last quarter. Waste Prevention was again given due attention.

REPORT OF THE SURVEYOR AND SANITARY INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1952.
(J. G. EVANS, M.S.I.A., A.R.S.I.)

HOUSING.

Twenty-eight new permanent brick houses have been completed by the Council during the year. This brings the total number of houses owned by the Council to 241. A further scheme for 50 houses is being prepared by the Council.

WATER SUPPLY.

The main source of supply is the Afon Gaseg which yields a plentiful supply of good water. The water is chlorinated and distributed by gravitation. The distribution system requires improvements and the Council have engaged a firm of Consulting Engineers to prepare a scheme of improvements.

SEWAGE PURIFICATION.

A 6 acre land irrigation purification system is used and all the Council houses and the majority of private houses are connected to the sewer.

REFUSE COLLECTION.

Weekly collection is carried out by Council lorry and workmens and the refuse disposed of by controlled tipping.

DISINFECTION.

Disinfection is carried out after cases of infectious diseases.

RODENT CONTROL.

Systematic inspection and eradication is carried out.

MEAT SUPPLIES.

All meat is imported from Bangor.

PARKS.

The Council possess a park which includes a Bowling Green and Tennis Courts.

SANITARY INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

HOUSING.

Much of the Sanitary Inspector's time has been spent in assisting the Housing Committee in the allocation of "Points" values to applications for houses,

In spite of the large number of new houses, maisonettes and flats built by the Council (426) and the contribution of private enterprise there is still a large waiting list of applicants. It is true to say that many of the worst cases have been dealt with, and very little overcrowding remains. The type of overcrowding now met with is brought about on the marriage of sons or daughters who for lack of other accommodation continue to live in the parent's house.

Perfectly satisfactory conditions, where two or more unmarried sons or daughters occupy a family bedroom, can be disrupted out of all proportion on the marriage of one or more of the family; and what previously was a happy home becomes a very unhappy Bedlam. This transformation can come about in a very short few months and is only one of the problems of record keeping in respect of Housing Applications.

It is noticeable that we get very little help from applicants themselves. Instances are not uncommon where addresses have been changed and two or more children have arrived over a period of a few years without any information having reached the office. This may well be detrimental to the applicant, and while every endeavour is made to keep applications up to date, there should not be any necessity to waste time tracing applicants and a little help on behalf of applicants would be appreciated.

In the light of experience, the Housing Committee decided last year to revise the method of awarding points. This like the previous system, is still imperfect, but it is a very valuable guide, and like every other system dealing with the complex subject of human conditions must be applied with a great deal of human understanding. I must say at once that I have found the Housing Committee to be most considerate and conscientious in performing a very difficult and unenviable task.

CAMPING.

The licenced camping are as within the Borough of which there are seven, "Maesdolau", "Marl," "Bwlch," "Glan Morfa," "Bronant" "Bryn Gynog," "Bryn Morfa," and the Borough Camping Ground on Conway Morfa, continue to be well supported and meet an ever increasing need. Constant supervision is required in order to keep even a minimum degree of control.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT.

There has been very little activity in new industrial development. A large firm of Bread Bakers have taken over "Hadley Homes" (originally a convalescent Home for Birmingham sick children) and has commenced production on a bigger scale than anything previously known in this area. This seems to be the modern trend of bread production whereby the concentrated mass production of a huge concern is spread over a wider area. This may well be the end of the small one sack baker many of whom have ceased production in this area during the last twenty years.

BATHING POOL.

This large undertaking has now changed hands and preparations are well on the way for the opening season. It was opened for a short period during the late summer of 1952. Samples of water submitted to the Public Health Laboratory all proved satisfactory.

REFUSE COLLECTION.

New Building has added its worries to the task of refuse collection, and new itineraries have had to be devised to meet the new demand. Refuse collection from the new estates is not easy. Much more ground has to be covered per house than was hitherto necessary and the distance from houses to the point of loading is increased by the garden layout of the houses. Although so many new houses have been built and many hundreds of people rehoused, all the old houses seem to produce just as much refuse as they did before.

A new S.D. Refuse Loader purchased in May, 1952, has been a great asset in coping with the increased work. Six men can keep this lorry moving and there is still a little time in hand. The restrictions and price reduction in paper salvage has had its effect on the economics of refuse collection and we shall not be able to buy a £1,500 collection vehicle out of our receipts this year. However we find that it still pays to collect and bale paper waste for sale as salvage.

REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1952.

(MR. T. F. ROBERTS, M.S.I.A.).

FOOD.

(A) MILK.

The main supply for the town is provided by the Conway Valley Creameries. This supply is derived from local farms in the Northern area of Caernarvonshire. Untreated milk is also supplied from local registered farms.

CHEMICAL ANALYSIS OF MILK.

During the year 22 samples of new milk were taken for submission to the Public Analyst. Of these 18 were found to be genuine and of good quality. Four samples were found to be below the required standard and letters of caution were sent to the producers.

BACTERIOLOGICAL EXAMINATION OF ICE CREAM.

Constant observations were made upon premises used in the manufacture or sale of Ice Cream. Twenty Seven samples of Ice-Cream were taken for Bacteriological Examination at the Public Health Laboratories at Conway. Reports not showing a "Highly Satisfactory" result were followed up with the result that subsequent tests from the same source shewed Grade I results.

RATS AND MICE (DESTRUCTION) ACTS.

During the year 165 visits and inspections were made to rat infested premises. Drains have been inspected and tested, and any defects found have been remedied. Rat runs have been sealed up and where necessary, poison baits laid. Advice has been given to all complainants so desiring and leaflets supplied free of charge.

The Council's refuse tips have been baited at frequent intervals and a complete treatment of all sewer manholes was carried out twice during the year.

This disinfection work was carried in conjunction with the Ministry of Agriculture Infestation Control Department.

DISINFESTATION—ERADICATION OF BED BUGS.

The number of cases of verminous premises has considerably reduced during the past few years. Only 5 cases came to the notice of the Sanitary Inspector during 1952. These were treated with a special insecticide with excellent results. Bedding, clothing, etc., from the infected premises were, if necessary, treated at the Council's Disinfector Station. Re-visits to the infested premises were not necessary after the initial treatment.

REPORT OF THE ENGINEER AND SURVEYOR.

(MR. J. A. EDWARDS, B.Eng., A.M.I.C.E., A.M.T.P.I., Etc.)

During 1952 both the quality and the quantity of the water have been satisfactory. Bacteriological examinations of the raw water were made monthly at the Lakes Dulyn & Melynlyn and at the balancing tank at Llanbedr immediately before treatment. At the last-named point water is sterilized by the Chloramine Process, using injections of Ammonia and Chlorine gases, and bacteriological examinations are taken weekly at various points in the district network.

The results have been satisfactory and the majority of reports taken by an independent Analyst at Conway Public Health Laboratories shewed Ministry of Health Classification 1. No serious contamination has been experienced and any samples which have fallen below Classification have on subsequent tests from the same source, yielded Class 1 results, shewing that the original inability to obtain this standard had been, probably due to sampling errors.

There are 5849 properties in the District which are supplied with water direct. There are no properties in the town which are served by means of standpipes.

REPORT OF THE METEOROLOGICAL OBSERVER.

(MR. GLYN A. ROBERTS, F.R.MET.S., A.R.S.I.)

The Meteorological Station is situated at the Llandudno Cricket Ground and occupies a central position. The site is 13 feet above mean sea level.

The instruments comprise one Kew Pattern Barometer, Maximum and Minimum Thermometers, Wet and Dry Bulb Hygrometers, Grass Minimum Thermometer, Rain Gauge, Campbell-Stokes Sunshine Recorder, Barograph, Hygrograph and Thermograph. During 1953 it is hoped to install an Anemometer for recording the speed of the wind. All the instruments have been tested and certified at the National Physical Laboratory, and the Station is inspected annually by an Inspector from the Meteorological Office, Air Ministry.

Telegraphed reports are made daily to the Meteorological Office to assist the compilation of Weather Reports. Complete Weather Summaries are forwarded monthly to Air Ministry.

Reportes are made regularly to the Local Press, and from time to time special observations and researches are made for University Departments, Government Departments, Insurance Companies, Scientific Bodies and others.

Complete sets of Weather figures are available since 1909 and mean values and miscellaneous figures date back as far as 1861, when the late Dr. J. Nicol, M.D., Medical Officer of Health, commenced to make daily weather observations.

MISCELLANEOUS NOTES ON THE WEATHER OF 1952.

The Sunshine Total for 1952 was rather disappointing with only 1506.5 hours which is 33.8 hours less than the mean for the last 20 years. The year 1952 appeared to get off to a good start but April, June, and September lagged behind the average totals.

During 1952 Bright Sunshine was recorded on 326 days. April, July and August recorded bright sunshine on every day of the month. The day with the most sun was 7th June when 14.6 hours were recorded.

The Year's Rainfall total of 28.35 inches was $\frac{3}{4}$ of an inch less than the 10 years mean. (Last year we had a total of 36.32 inches). During 1952 there were 187 days with one hundredth of an inch of rain or more. The wettest day during the year was 13th February with 0.80 inches. The wettest month was October with 3.89 inches; the driest month was March with only 0.86 inches. The first six months of the year had considerably less rain than the last six months.

The highest temperature recorded during the year was 78° F on the 5th July but this figure becomes insignificant when one realises that on the 27th June, 1878 the temperature rose to 93 degrees F in the shade at Llandudno. This figure remains the highest temperature ever recorded in Wales. The lowest temperature recorded during 1952 was 26 degrees F (6 degrees of Frost) on 28th January, 29th November and the 2nd December.

The Last Spring "Air Frost" was during the early hours of the 1st April with 2 degrees of frost. The first "Autumn" frost was 18th November with a temperature of 32 degrees F (Freezing Level).

SUMMARY OF VITAL STATISTICS FOR THE YEAR 1952.

The estimated population furnished by the Registrar General for June 1952 is 3055 compared with 3121 in 1951 and 3165 in 1950.

The Birth Rate is 10.15 per 1000 of the population compared with 13.78 in 1951 and 12.64 per 1000 of the population in 1950.

The Infantile Mortality Rate is 32.25 per 1000 live births compared with 23.26 in 1951 and 11.1 per 1000 live births in 1950.

There were No deaths from Zymotic Diseases. (For Zymotic Diseases See Tables 2 and 3).

The General Death Rate is 14.73 per 1000 of the population compared with 18.58 in 1951 and 17.38 per 1000 of the population in 1950.

The Death Rate from Tuberculosis is 0.32 per 1000 of the population compared with Nil in 1951 and 0.94 per 1000 of the population in 1950.

The Death Rate from Cancer is 2.29 per 1000 of the population compared with 3.52 in 1951 and 4.45 per 1000 of the population in 1950.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

During 1952, only 3 cases of Infectious Diseases were notified, viz., 1 Meningitis; 1 Poliomyelitis; and 1 Pneumonia.

SANITARY INSPECTOR'S REPORT FOR 1952.

(MR. EVAN WILLIAMS, C.R.S.T., A.F.S. (ENG.).)

WATER SUPPLY.

The supplies from Aber Lake and Camarnaint Reservoir were adequate throughout the year. The Council's main was extended to the Gwyllt district, a matter of laying 800 yards of 3 inch asbestos main to supply houses previously supplied privately by the Gorddinog Estate. During dry periods these houses were without water for domestic use.

SEWERS.

The usual cleansing and inspections were carried out.

PUBLIC SANITARY CONVENIENCES.

All conveniences are cleaned daily, and during last summer three times daily. One Gents' convenience was reconstructed.

FOOD INSPECTION.

The usual routine inspection of shops was carried out, and the following food was voluntarily surrendered.

HOUSE REFUSE.

DISINFECTION.

During the year six cases were notified calling for disinfection of rooms.

HOUSING.

Forty houses were completed during the year, and the Council has two other sites ready for development.

REPORT OF SANITARY INSPECTOR AND SURVEYOR.

(A. CROWTHER, M.S.I.A., M.R.SAN.I.).

WATER SUPPLY.

The water supply position was generally satisfactory during the year. Emergency supplies with portable chlorination plant were put into operation during the Spring in case of drought but were disconnected in August.

Complaints of insufficiency of water in two parts of the district were found to be due to internal corrosion of the existing mains. The Council intend to carry out work of laying new 3" mains to both areas during 1953.

SEWERS.

The sewerage system operated satisfactorily. The excessive depth of the sewers causes some concern as any blockage may become an expensive operation if excavation is necessary. A system of regular inspection, flushing and cleansing has been commenced and no major excavation was necessary during 1952.

REFUSE COLLECTION.

The new Shelvoke & Drewry Refuse Collection vehicle was delivered in June. The collection service has been improved from a fortnightly to a weekly service. The efficiency of this service is however still restricted by the lack of proper dustbins at many premises.

During the year, the tip was closed and the incinerator repaired and put into full use. This method has proved to be more extensive but definitely more satisfactory in every way.

Collection and baling of waste paper proved to be uneconomic and was discontinued.

HOUSING.

No new Council houses were built due to the Council experiencing difficulty in acquiring a suitable site. The Council have a programme for 30 houses to be built immediately when the problem of a suitable site is determined.

CLEAN FOOD CAMPAIGN.

A lecture was arranged in conjunction with the County Council scheme but the attendance was disappointing. A systematic inspection of food shops was commenced but not completed. Inspections so far reveal many contraventions of Sec. 13 of the Food & Drugs Act, 1938, and it is obvious that more attention will have to be paid to food shops than appears to have been made in the past.

CONCLUSIONS.

In July, 1952, Mr. J. Parry-Hughes, who had held the position of Sanitary Inspector & Surveyor for nearly 30 years, retired upon reaching the compulsory retirement age. I join with his former colleagues in wishing Mr. Parry-Hughes a long and happy retirement.

With the change of official occurring during the middle of the year this report is naturally not as comprehensive as may be desired.

One other reason which I feel it is my duty to point out however, is that where one official is required to carry out all the duties of Surveyor and Water Engineer as well as Sanitary Inspector, it is inevitable that many of the routine, but none the less important, duties of the Sanitary Inspector tend to be neglected.

I know that other Sanitary Inspectors holding joint appointments in different parts of the county share this view. Whilst appreciating that the remedy is by no means easy, I feel that attention of both the County Council and the elected representatives of the various local Councils should be drawn to this matter.

SANITARY INSPECTOR'S REPORT.

(MR. C. A. KORTEGAS, M.S.I.A.).

WATER SUPPLY.

LOWER CONWAY VALLEY.

The Lower Conway Valley Scheme was completed during the year and serves the parishes of Caerhun, Llanbedr, Henryd and part of Maenan. The Scheme cost approximately £95,000. Parts of the above parishes especially Maenan are still without an adequate supply of water, which necessitates water carrying during drought.

CWM PENMACHNO.

The completion in 1953 of the sewerage scheme for this parish will prove the need for a more satisfactory water supply and the Council has instructed its Consulting Engineers to investigate and report thereon.

LLAN PENMACHNO.

Continues fairly satisfactory. All supplies drawn from Afon Glasgwm being chlorinated and treated with sodium silicate. More adequate storage would improve the scheme considerably.

Water is carried to Ochr-y-Foel during drought.

EIDDA.

This scheme is satisfactory for present needs. Water purchased in bulk from Hiraethog R.D.C.

CAPEL CURIG.

Consultants continue to investigate the proposals for this parish. The needs of this parish are extremely urgent.

DOLWYDDELAN.

The scheme continues satisfactorily although the pressures are low in the higher parts of the village.

TREFRIW.

No shortage occurred during the year but the wastage gives rise to concern and although every effort is made to attend to this matter the lack of staff, both indoor and outdoor makes it impossible to give this problem the attention it deserves.

WATER SUPPLY TO NOT DOMESTIC CONSUMERS.

Supplies to certain non domestic consumers (Farms, Schools, Hotels & Factories) were metered during the year. Over 120 meters were fixed, the work being done by contract. The supervision of this work took up a considerable amount of time, and I also read the meters each quarter.

SEWERAGE & SEWAGE DISPOSAL.

CWM PENMACHNO.

It is hoped that this scheme will be completed in 1953.

ROWEN.

Consultants were instructed to prepare a scheme for this village and there is evidence that a Public Inquiry will be held in 1953.

YSBYTTY, LLANBEDR, TALYBONT & CAPEL CURIG.

Instructions have been given to Engineering Consultants to report on the above villages.

DOLGARROG.

Consultants have reported on extension and improvements to the present scheme.

HENRYD.

Approval received to go to tender for the scheme.

REFUSE COLLECTION.

This service is undertaken by direct labour (2 vehicles with 2 Driver Loaders & 2 Loaders. at a cost of £2386 in 1952, included in this figure is the sum of £370/-/- for nightsoil collection. The service is not completely satisfactory, as no spare labour is available during holiday periods and in times of sickness. The work is getting behind and complaints commence to pour in,

REFUSE DISPOSAL.

Refuse has been tipped at Dolgarrog for the past 17 years, but owing to representations from the Dolgarrog Parish Council, that house holders complained of bad smells from the Tip (nearest house 440 yards from Tip) the Council decided to search for other sites.

A new site has been acquired at Cwm Penmachno, Trefriw and Dolwyddelan, but to date no suitable site can be found in the northern half of the district.

The Tips suffer from lack of attention as no labour is available for this purpose.

HOUSING.

29 new houses were completed by the Council during the year, viz., 2 at Cwm Penmachno, 4 at Llan Penmachno and 23 at Talybont.

The Forestry Commission also completed 3 houses at Llan Penmachno and 3 at Dolwyddelan. 2 new houses were completed by private enterprise.

Work was commenced during the year at Groesffordd—12 houses, and plans for Henryd and Trefriw were prepared.

During the year one of the largest property owners in the district, viz., the A.C.L. Dolgarrog undertook the complete re-roofing of 100 of their dwelling houses at a cost of £12,000. Complaints had been received by the Company for some years and in 1949 a sum of £4,000 was spent on water-proofing the roofs without success.

RODENT CONTROL.

No action was taken in this matter.

BOATING POOL—LLANBEDR.

This Pool was also being used for swimming purposes, and samples on analysis showed that the water (fresh water from a stream) was heavily polluted. The Trustees were informed and bathing was prohibited.

WATER SUPPLY.

Supplies controlled by the Council were sufficient to meet all demands throughout the year.

The work of extending mains to the Aberpwll area is progressing satisfactorily and will probably be completed within the next eight months. It is hoped that the extensions at Myrdd Llandegai, which form part of the same contract, will be completed before the end of the next summer.

The Inquiry for the proposed new scheme for the Aber District is still awaited.

SEWERAGE.

Work on the Tregarth, St. Ann's and Mynydd Llandegai Sewerage Scheme is in progress, and it is anticipated that it will be completed before the end of the next year. Due to difficult ground, there will still remain considerable work and expense in making connection to properties.

The result of the Inquiry for the Proposed New Sewerage Scheme for the Penrhos District has not been received.

HOUSING.

Twenty-four Council and three Private Houses were completed during the year.

Work on Council Houses allocated to Mynydd Llandegai, Tregarth, Talybont and Caerhun is in progress.

RODENT CONTROL.

Sewers are treated, at least, twice annually and this generally involves 'Block Control', in one instance extending to two small holdings.

All known points of infestations are periodically inspected, and treated as occasion demands. No major infestation was encountered.

PUBLIC SCAVENGING.

The work is satisfactorily carried out by contract ; four sites are in use for controlled tipping.

DISINFECTION AND DISINFESTATION.

Gammexane, Formaline spray and Fumigators are generally used. If found necessary, bedding is subjected to steam disinfection.

The Birth Rate per 1,000 of the population was 16.11, as compared with 16.32 in 1951. The 1952 rate for England and Wales was 15.3. The number of illegitimate births (live) recorded was 6.

The number of premises supplied from the Public mains was 3,600, and throughout the year the supply has been satisfactory.

RODENT CONTROL.

The number of complaints received was—42, being mainly dwelling houses. Inspections were carried out and enquiries made which included farms.

The Controlled Tip was serviced on five occasions with very good results, sewer treatments and maintenance services were also carried out.

REPORT OF THE SURVEYOR AND SANITARY INSPECTOR FOR THE YEAR 1952
(Mr. S. L. THOMAS)

WATER SUPPLY.

The supply of water to the town is still a source of concern to this Council. Trouble is still experienced in supplying the upper parts of the Town during the end of July and part of August. An emergency scheme was put into operation and the inconvenience caused in the part of the town affected was reduced to a minimum and was an improvement on the previous year.

During the year Water Engineers made a comprehensive survey of the system and three leaks were located. Some work was done during the latter end of the year but severe flooding and the main pipe line hindered repair operations.

82 Notices were sent out to stop the wastage of water, and the Council themselves overhauled the water fittings in their own houses. During the year 460 visits were made on water supply.

SEWERAGE.

The only trouble experienced was a break in the Western outfall which was repaired immediately.

SCAVENGING.

The system of daily sweeping of all roads except the Caernarvon Road was maintained throughout the year.

REFUSE COLLECTION AND SALVAGE.

The efficient system of refuse collection was maintained throughout the year with extra service provided to the Hotels during the season.

Although the price of baled salvage has dropped the Council decided not to break the contract with the people who receive it, so that a certain amount of salvage is still collected.

RODENT CONTROL.

A systematic inspection was made for, and the destruction of rats and mice during the year by a fully trained part-time operator. This inspection included all the farms in the area and regular treatment of the Council's property and refuse tip.

FOOD INSPECTION.

During the year every premises that handled food was visited and suggestions were made to improve the already high standard of Food Hygiene to comply with the County Council standard. All the people visited made efforts and twelve certificates were granted under the County Council scheme and the same number have only a little improvement to make before they too receive certificates.

Uncertainty of lease has made it difficult to effect improvements in a few cases.

117 visits were made during the year.

PUBLIC CONVENIENCES.

The Conveniences are cleaned out every morning with two and sometimes three visits from part-time attendant during the Summer months as trouble is very often caused by persons creating nuisances on the floors.

PLAYING FIELDS.

The Council possess a miniature golf course, a bowling green and children play ground. During the year under review big efforts were made to improve the fairways and greens of the golf course and the bowling green. These improvements were reflected in the increase in the number of people who used these facilities.

HOUSING.

The Council commenced the building of six new Council houses at the Tynrhos Estate and by the end of the year they were almost all finished. This completes the Tynrhos Housing Scheme.

GENERAL.

The Council have only five workmen, two of whom are employed regularly on house refuse collection, are on scavenging and public conveniences, the other two being employed on grass cutting which is proportionately large for the size of the town, and the care of the playing fields. All improvements are done during the Winter months.

WATER SUPPLY.

Sources—Murcwyp and Cwmceiliog, Llanaehaiarn. No major trouble was experienced during the year and there was no shortage of water.

The contract of laying the new 8" trunk main from Murcwyp to Creigiau Yokehouse, and a 6" main from there to the County School, together with alterations to the headworks, fixing of new meters, and the installation of two Wallace & Tiernan Gas Chlorinating Plants, one at Murcwyp and one at Cwmceiliog has been completed. Total cost of work £26,094.

Branch mains at Fourcrosses and Creigiau Yokehouse were also relaid.

SEWERAGE.

No further work was carried out during the year on cleaning the town sewers. There are still sections badly silted up with sand and gravel.

HOUSING.

10 permanent houses were completed during the year and a contract has been let for the building of another 26 houses on the Churton Street Estate.

The older houses are well maintained by the Council's own maintenance staff of one joiner, stone mason and plumber (his duties are divided between housing and water supply) and three painters are engaged during the summer months.

SCAVENGING.

The main streets are swept daily and the other roads once or twice weekly.

REFUSE COLLECTION.

Refuse collection is carried out by the Council's own staff. All premises are cleared once a week, houses in the central area, hotels, shops and bakehouses twice a week. During the summer months extra collections are arranged for Fish Shops and Hotels.

INFECTIOUS DISEASES.

No serious epidemic occurred during the year. Disinfection is carried out free after cases of infectious diseases, and if any bedding has to be destroyed the Council make a grant towards the purchase of new bedding.

RODENT CONTROL.

The Council's sewers are treated twice annually, and regular inspections and treatment of the district is carried out. The Refuse Tip is treated every three months.

FOOD INSPECTION.

Improvements have been carried out to a number of shops, and a constant supply of hot water provided for washing facilities.

During the year the Council adopted the new Code of Byelaws for the wrapping and handling of food.

HOUSING.

The Council now has 130 permanent houses and hope to complete the Pensyflog Estate of 118 houses in a few months. Consideration as to future development at Tremadoc where the Council owns 26 acres is to be given shortly.

WATER SUPPLY.

Piped water supply by the Portmadoc Water Company is available to all properties in the District and there were no restrictions during the summer months.

SEWERAGE.

Work is progressing with the provision of a new pumping station, disposal works and trunk sewers which will eliminate the present flow of crude sewage into the Cyt.

SCAVENGING.

The roads are swept twice weekly except High Street which is swept daily.

REFUSE COLLECTION.

All premises are cleared once a week and Hotels served twice or three times weekly.

SALVAGE.

The collection of salvage has been discontinued owing to the low prices offered making it an uneconomic proposition.

RODENT CONTROL.

Systematic inspections have been made of the Council's property and a trained workman deals with complaints as they arise. There has not been any infestation of rats and mice and the dumps and sewers remain very free.

FOOD INSPECTION.

Continuous inspections have been made of all premises handling foodstuffs and the high standard of food hygiene is a source of satisfaction.

SUMMARY OF VITAL STATISTICS FOR 1952.

The estimated population for 1952 was 23,550, a fall of 90 as compared with the figure for 1951. In the 1951 Report a population decrease of 520 was recorded.

The Birth Rate per 1,000 of population was 14.09 as compared with 13.92 in 1951. The Birth Rate for England and Wales was 15.3.

The General Death Rate was 15.30 per 1,000 of population, as compared with 19.29 in 1951. The Rate for England and Wales was 11.3.

There were no deaths from Maternal Causes during 1952. Two deaths were recorded in 1951. The 1952 Rate for England and Wales was 0.72.

There was no Zymotic Mortality during 1952. One death occurred in 1951.

Sixteen deaths were caused by Tuberculosis in 1952. Ten less than occurred in 1951 and 1950. The 1952 rate was 0.67 as compared with 1.10 in 1951 and 1.07 in 1950. The 1952 rate for England and Wales was 0.24.

Cancer caused 63 deaths during 1952 as compared with 60 in 1951. The rate for 1952 was 2.26 compared with 2.53 in 1951. The 1952 rate for England and Wales was 1.99.

One death was caused by Influenza making a rate of 0.04, compared with 19 deaths in 1951 and a Rate of 0.80. The rate for England and Wales was 0.04.

ANNUAL REPORT OF CHIEF SANITARY INSPECTOR. (Mr. J. CLOSS PARRY, M.R.SAN.I., M.S.I.A.)

1. HOUSING.

Housing receives the whole-hearted attention of the Council, and 110 houses were completed during the year, this brings the total owned by the Council to 971.

25 houses were built by private enterprise.

Rising cost is a grave concern of all, and deserving applicants are becoming reluctant to accept a Council House when the rent is 400% more than what they have been paying.

There are large numbers of young married couples living with their in-laws in Council Houses, and in many instances, creating overcrowding. Applicants of this type invariably receive the sympathetic consideration by the Letting Committee.

Action was taken under Section 11, Housing Act, 1936, and 29 families received alternative accommodation.

Undertaking operative in respect of 20 houses, were cancelled during the year, as the result of satisfactory repairs.

In the future the Council will be guided by the County Development Plan, to locate houses within reach of housing amenities.

2. SEWERAGE.

The Economies in Local Government Services, respecting sewerage and sewage disposal has hindered the Council to proceed with the works of sewage disposal for Llanrug, Cwmyglo and Bethel. These, together with the schemes for Llanberis, the Parishes of Llanwnda, Llandwrog, and Llanllyfni, are essential on public health grounds. Strong representations have been made, with the valuable help of the local Member of Parliament, to the Ministry, to permit the authorisation of the schemes for Llanrug, Cwmyglo and Bethel.

The delay hinders the erection of houses at Llanrug and Bethel. Land has been purchased in both areas and the other housing amenities are available.

A Consulting Engineer is preparing schemes for Llanwnda and Llandwrog Parishes.

Small schemes of sewer extensions were carried out at Nebo, Penygroes and Nant Peris. The expenditure on works of maintenance to the Council's sewers and sewage disposal works for the year was £8,850, equivalent to a rate of 2/10d., or an average of 18/10d. per house per annum.

3. WATER SUPPLY.

Except in the sparsely populated areas, the district has available water supply. The supply becomes more inadequate every year as the result of the erection of new houses with modern conveniences. The position is acute in the Parishes of Llandwrog, Llanwnda and Waenfawr.

The supply to Ceunant and district is unsatisfactory, a scheme is being prepared to improve the source.

A chlorinating plant was installed on the Mynydd Mawr supply.

Schemes have been prepared to the Ministry for a new supply and services at Allt Coed Mawr, and an extension of the main from Capel Glasgoed to Llanddeiniolen and Seion area. Approval to these schemes is awaited.

40 samples were taken during the year for bacteriological and chemical examination. 3 samples were not up to the required standard, and the Council instructed certain works to be carried out to improve the quality.

The expenditure on the maintenance to the water supplies amounted to £10,578.

4. PUBLIC SCAVENGING.

There are eight men employed on this work. The service is considered satisfactory. The expenditure for the year was £4,650 equivalent to a 2/2d. rate, or 9/10d. per house per annum.

Two 10 cubic yard Dennis vehicles were purchased to replace the light type Karrier lorries, and they are giving satisfaction.

In the Northern area suitable tipping grounds are becoming a difficulty.

5. RODENT CONTROL.

This work is carried out satisfactorily.

Properties inspected included 70 Local Authority properties; 247 dwelling houses; 63 business premises; 404 farms, and as a result 4 major and 183 minor infestations were discovered. The Council treated 140 premises.

6. FOOD SUPPLIES.

The new Food Byelaws have received the approval of the Minister, and the public are advised of their provisions.

The large number of tinned goods condemned had a foreign origin.

The standard of cleanliness in our food establishments is improving. The food handler appreciates, that a clean food product, clean premises, and personal cleanliness, is an asset to his business. In recent years the general public have become clean food minded. The refrigerator is becoming generally used.

There was one death from Maternal Causes during the year which made a Rate of 5.07. There was no Maternal Mortality in 1951. The 1952 rate for England and Wales was 0.72.

There was no Zymotic Mortality during the year.

The Infant Mortality Rate per 1,000 live births, was 28.74 as compared with 61.22 in 1951. The Rate for England and Wales was 27.6.

The death rate for Tuberculosis was 0.17 per 1,000 of population as compared with 0.35 in 1951. The Rate for England and Wales was 0.24.

Cancer caused 52 deaths during 1952, making a rate for 3.02 per 1,000 of population, as compared with 2.47 in 1951.

Two persons died from Influenza during 1952 making a Rate of 0.12. The Rate for England and Wales was 0.04.

REPORT OF THE SANITARY INSPECTORS.

(Mr. E. E. ROBERTS AND Mr. C. JONES.)

WATER SUPPLY.

During the year there has been a substantial increase in the number of consumers particularly for agricultural use, throughout the rural area where piped supplies were available. In addition, small extension schemes of existing sources have been carried out where supplies to meet the additional demand were available.

Despite the increased demand and the inadequacy of the supply during the summer months due to the popularity of the area in attracting a heavy seasonal of visitors, emergency measures taken by the Council to alleviate the difficulties, ensured a reasonable supply to all consumers.

There are many villages and small scattered communities which do not yet enjoy a piped water supply. The inhabitants of these areas are mainly dependent on public wells, all of which are maintained and regularly cleansed by the Council.

Periodical sampling of the various supplies during the year did not reveal any serious variation in quality although there are twenty six different sources of supply which entail much attention in constant maintenance.

SEWERAGE.

Three major schemes, one with sea outfall, have been added to the existing number of sewage disposal works which amounts to over thirty different plants throughout the Council's area. Every effort is being made to maintain supervision of these works to ensure a satisfactory standard of effluent, but it is emphasised that owing to the very limited labour available by the Council and difficulties of transport between the many disposal works, it has not been possible to give the constant and regular attention which is demanded to maintain a high standard of effluent. Again many of the smaller sewage disposal plants have by today become so heavily overloaded as a result of rapid progress of housing development, as to reduce their practical function to the point of serious impairment.

Numerous complaints of blocked drains and obstructions in public sewers have during the year been dealt with by the Department.

PUBLIC SCAVENGING.

The Council continue to favour a policy of collecting domestic and other refuse by contract. There are ten different contractors employed by the Council to carry refuse in the various parishes. The number of night soil collection has gradually diminished during the year. One of the major disadvantages of the existing system is that none of the contractors have a properly covered vehicle to carry the refuse and this gives rise to several complaints in the heavily built-up areas such as Nevin, Aberxoch, Chwillog, Criccieth, Pwllheli, &c. Generally this work is done quite satisfactorily by some of the Contractors, but complaints are made by the residents regarding the service of other contractors.

An outstanding aspect of this service during the year is the many requests made on the Council to increase and extend the collection areas. With few exceptions the Council agreed to meet these demands.

The disposal arrangements in the district at present vary from controlled tipping to indiscriminate dumping. It is the Council's policy to maintain only two controlled tipping sites centrally situated to serve all areas and much progress was made during the year to achieve this object. Out of 12 different dumping sites, three were closed and discontinued during the year and progress has been made in developing the controlled tipping site at Maesoglan to serve the Southern division and a portion of the Northern division.

RODENT CONTROL.

This work is carried out by a whole-time Rodent Operator, who is regularly assisted by the Council's trained employees.

On all the Local Authority's controlled land and premises including refuse tips, sewage disposal works &c., disinfection is carried out periodically.

Periodical inspection of all farms and private premises are carried out and disinfection of private properties is undertaken for a small charge.

DEVELOPMENT CONTROL AND BUILDING BYE-LAWS.

Numerous applications were received during the year for building and development consent. The allocation of building licences continues to be an unpleasant burden on the Council.

Owing to the rapid progress of development and the extensive area of the district it has not been found possible to keep the desired standard of supervision of buildings in their various stages of construction.

DISINFECTION.

Premises are disinfected with formalin spray and fumigators. When necessary contaminated bedding and bedclothes are destroyed and the owner compensated for his loss.
