## Water Supplies

The water in the area has been generally satisfactory both in quality and quantity.

The following table gives a summary of the samples of water taken during the year. The percentage of unfit samples appears to be unduly high, but they cannot be assumed to be a true representation of the area as the majority of the samples were taken upon receipt of complaints by consumers who were suspicious of the appearance or palatability of their drinking water, or where the water was suggested as a proposed private supply.

Upon receipt of the results of water samples from the Laboratories copies of the reports are transmitted to the consumer and/or persons requesting the analysis, and advice given as to the treatment where an unsatisfactory report is received.

## HORTON, LONGSDON AND RUDYARD WATER SCHEME

The scheme for the provision of a piped water supply for the parishes of Horton and Longsdon and part in the parish of Endon and Stanley which was commenced in December 1951 was completed during the year and by 31st December some 63 properties had been connected.
